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

# Three Write-in : DRAFT NUMBERS **Candidates** for: Council Elected :

Stroup, Nugent, Dunn \* Defeat Glasser, Brown, Green - Josey Wins - \* Mayor Carper, Brainard Unopposed.

Three new aldermen were elected Tuesday in Artesia in a write-in campaign, the move for which did not become known until election day, as Howard Stroup, Walter . Nugent and Harold (Dude) Dunn defeated A. G. Glasser, C. O. Brown and Arba Green, respectively in the first, second and fourth wards.

Emery Carper, mayor, and Fred Brainard, alderman of the third ward, succeeded themselves without opposition.

In the only race contested on the ballot, J. D. Josey defeated W. H. Ballard, incumbent, for police judge by a vote of 447 to 125. The results by candidates, precincts and totals.
