In anticipation of official reports of casualties in the war zones, The Advocate is making an urgent request for the cooperation of everyone receiving such reports and asks that they pass the information on to this newspaper promptly.

Although reports of casualties are attended with grief and the news is far from happy, nevertheless the public is entitled to know such things, and friends, as well as relatives, are anxious about all Eddy County boys.

Such messages come from the War and Navy Departments by Western Union telegram to the nearest of kin. The Western

Union is not permitted to disclose any message, even those of casualties, so the job of reporting them is difficult.

That is why The Advocate asks that persons receiving re-ports—good or bad—about any of the boys report them to this office, phone No. 7.

Even with this request made, there will be instances when the parents, in their grief, will forget to call, although their intentions are good. So neighbors and friends are asked to call likewise. Don't presume that we know all the news; call. We would rather have several telephone messages concerning the same subject than no information at all.

As your local news outlet, The Advocate is anxious to keep the reading public informed about our boys.

#### OPEN LETTER TO BUDDY MARLER

Dear Buddy:

When you brought us a letter the other day, regarding the tax on Japan, where he has served the stroys all error and the belief that dogs and how it might cause us to lose the war, perhaps you thought church for more than twenty-five Mind, the only immortality of man, it would receive little attention, because you are a 10-year-old boy. But that is where you are wrong; Mayor Emery Carper himself read it at a meeting of the city council Monday evening and the mayor and interesting lecturer. the councilmen gave it serious consideration.

For the benefit of those who have not read your letter, but who will read this column, let's repeat it here:

"To the City Council:

"Do you know you are liable to cause us to lose this war? "This is the reason: I had saved almost \$2 to buy Defense Stamps.

Now I have to buy dog tax. "Just think of the Defense Stamps we boys and girls could put in our books. This doesn't look fair to the boys who are fighting for

"Buddy Marler."

Mayor Carper and the councilmen are extremely proud of you in your stand and for your gumption and for the fact that you signed your letter, and so are we.

They and we commend you for wishing to put every penny you can into the purchase of War Stamps, as they are called now, in order to help the boys who are fighting for our freedom.

But, Buddy, even in war times we must have boys and girls at home, and boys and girls must have dogs to keep them happy. Dogs, you know, help boys and girls grow into fine, upright American citizens, into citizens who have the same spirit which you have displayed

On the other hand, dogs can become a community menace—if there are too many of them-and the only way that can be avoided is to have them registered and under police and city protection. The tax method is the only satisfactory way ever found to do this.

We want to see your dog protected, so he will not have to go the way of all stray dogs, to the dog pound.

The only way the police and dog catcher can distinguish between poor, homeless dog and a dog which holds a big spot in the heart of some boy or girl is to put a tag on the latter. Then the othere can be eliminated, thus saving the homeless kind from suffering and wandering around. Then the community will not have dozens of dogs trying to make their own livings from garbage cans. And then you can be assured that your dog is recognized by the law to be yours, to have had a tax paid for him, just like any other good citizen.

Mayor Carper, the councilmen and we believe you will see that this must be done, even if it does hamper the sale of War Stamps somewhat, for we must have happy boys and girls and dogs, all in comfortable homes and with food to eat, just as we must put every penny we can into the purchase of War Stamps and Bonds.

Just think it over, Buddy. Don't you think that protecting your dog by paying a tax on him, thus making yourself happier, is important in winning the war, too?

We have to have Buddys at home, happy future adult American citizens. We are sure the boys in the war zones will agree with that. None would want you to lose your dog. And they would know, also, that the next \$2 you save will go into the purchase of War Stamps.

Keep 'em flyin', Buddy!

#### SURE, WE KEEP 'EM FLYING HERE

#### LET THE CHIPS FALL WHERE THEY MAY

Nearly all who take up war work are under the illusion that, being a fine and noble thing, war work ought to change people's dispositions so as to produce the maximum of cooperating effort with the minimum having you and will extend a spirit of friction. Let us suppose that you are to sit on a committee or subcommittee. Among its members are Miss X, who used to be a mannish and cheeky young maid; Mr. Y, who used to be an interfering and narrow-minded old maid, and Mrs. Z, who used to be nothing in particular. You enter the committee room and see these three with a few others almost equally unpromising.

You, however, are not downcast. You feel the uplifting power of a great idea. You are determined to make the best of yourself and of everybody. But in less than five minutes Miss X is calmly offering the most absurd proposals. Mr. Y is objecting to the rulings of the chairman and implying that the committee ought to do nothing at all.

As for Mrs. Z, she voted both for and against the first resolution.

"Is it conceivable," you exclaim in your soul, "that these individuals can behave so in such a supreme crisis? They cannot realize that we are at war!" # That "STOP ORDER" Does Not Stop Building

Here's What the Building Supply News of Chicago, Ill., Says About Building:

Ever since October 9 and the famous "Building Priorities" regulation, the building industry has been kept in almost constant turmoil by repeated threats of "stop orders."

#### HERE IS WHAT THE ORDER SAYS:

No Civilian Building of Any Kind Will Be Permitted Except:

- 1. Residential construction, including farm home, costing less than \$500 on any one residence in any 12 month period.
- 2. Maintenance and repairs.
- 3. Farm production buildings (costing \$1,000 or less per structure).
- 4. All other civilian construction (commercial, industrial, recreational, etc.) costing \$5,000 or less.
- 5. Residential buildings desroyed by fire, earthquake, tornado, enemy action, etc., may be rebuilt.
- 6. Buildings under construction may, at present, be completed.
- 7. Any kind of civilian building for which a real need can be shown. A permit will be issued in that case.
