

It is about time some of the local gossip mongers took stock of themselves and quit spreading unfounded rumors, "so-I-hears" and depressing tales about men in the service, especially those who were sent to the Philippines.

It seems that anyone repeating such things would realize the demoralizing effect it must have on parents of boys in the war zones. p. m. And in spreading demoralizing rumors, the spreaders are assisting the Axis powers in no small way.

The Japs and Germans could wish for nothing more among the civilian population of the United States than rumors and stories which tend to put the people on needles and pins and to depress them.

Don't take up as fact everything you hear, even among your best OUR LADY OF GRACE CHURCH friends. Rather question such things and seek to learn the source. When backtracked - which seldom is possible - it usually will be found that the rumors were started with a purpose, in a seemingly offhand way, by persons who are believed to be harmless and to be dan Weishaar. good Americans.

They may be your next-door neighbors, people you have known for years. They may wave the American flag, even as you do. But that is no guaranty of their sincerity. You cannot tell who is working against the American war effort, so it is better to discount everything you hear and repeat only news from authoritative sources.

#### QUIT THAT CRINGING

While we are demanding that the United Nations assume the of-

fensive, let's have more of that spirit at home.

The government has become aware of the fact that we don't like of courtesy. the name "Defense Bonds" any more, and the next issue, due early in the summer, is to be called "War Bonds." That's better. Wouldn't "Victory Bonds" be better still?

Here in Charleston we live in a "defense" district. Let's quit calling it that. This is a War Production area. We are not going to run and hide our heads under the bed. We are doing our part to produce materials that will be used to blast the Axis off the earth. We are not going to keep this material here to defend our section from invasion; we are making it to send to the other side until the United Nations are strong enough to destroy those skunks.

"Civilian defense?" Why not really be preparing to knock the invader winding if he comes over? Blackouts? Sure, but why not be ready to shoot back? Fire wardens? Certainly, but wouldn't all civilians welcome some other method of attacking rather than hiding? How about Civilian Offense?

Let's quit remembering Pearl Harbor and start remembering Berlin, Tokyo and Rome-quit talking about slowing up or stopping third Thursdays; circles second and Hitler-start talking about eliminating and annihilating him. Let's fourth Thursdays; brotherhood, quit that squawking about the little, double-crossing Japs and start third Thursday. yelling for a chance to shoot their reptilian heads off. Let's quit deriding pompous, inept Mussolini and begin weaving a noose for him.

Keep Nazism and Fascism away from our shores? Hooey. What we want to be up and doing is spreading American democracy over the civilized world, carrying it to those enslaved little countries of Europe, those dictator dominated nations now beginning to struggle weakly against their bonds and lift their heads feebly in hope

We are preparing to take the offensive physically; let's take it psychologically-right now. Let's rear and charge and kick in the harness. Let's gripe at every delay. Let's cuss and damn and denounce and condemn every obstruction. Let's get good and mad. let's see red, boil over and explode all over the place.

"Bluebirds over the white cliffs of Dover?" To hell with that. Eagles, hawks, vultures over Germany, Italy and Japan—our eagles, hawks and vultures. Cut out the mournful, whining song about the brave boy that has gone to war. Sing and shout "Hold 'em boy; we're coming." Let the bands blare, the orators wave their arms and shout for freedom. Come on with those slogans with a cheer in them, those songs pitched on a note of triumph.

And when the boys depart for the war, cut out that mournful wail, swallow that lump in your throat. Quit that weak hand-clapping as they go by. Cheer them loud and long.

Damn defense. Up and at 'em, folks. We're getting fighting mad!—Charleston (W. Va.) Gazette.

Rescue Squads will be identified by a red ladder in white triangle set in blue circle.

There are many phases to rescue work in modern warfare. An "all clear" signal after an air raid may find civilians trapped in debris, shelters, flooded cellars, or exposed to danger from broken gas and water mains or unprotected electric wiring. Rescue parties must be ready to go into action at all times to extricate them.
