He said registration packets are available in the central administration office as well as in the elementary and high school offices.

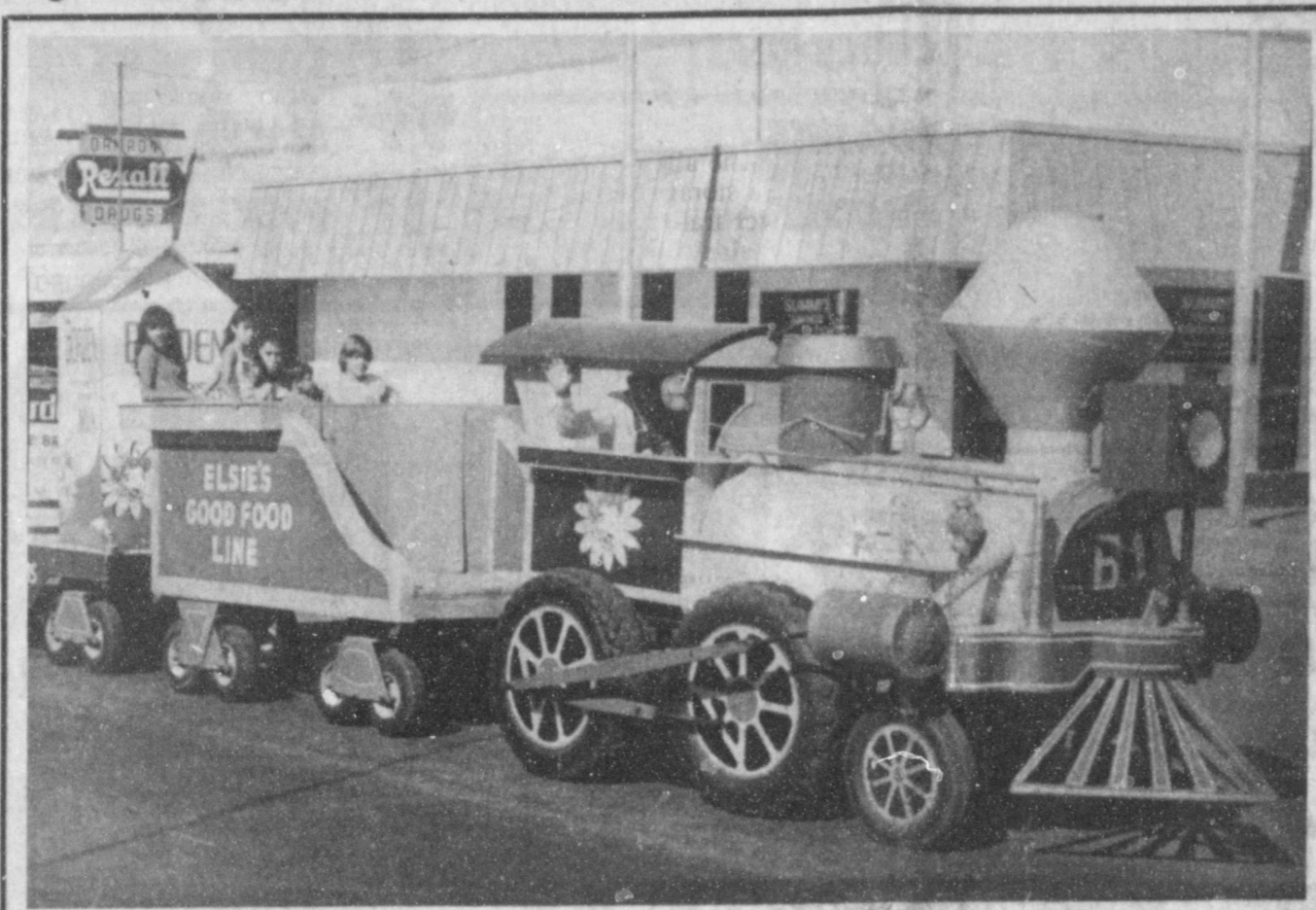
The superintendent also said it is particularly important that new students in Pre-kindergarten through grade four register immediately so that proper planning for room and teacher arrangements may be made.

Also, this year, with no sponsor for the annual parade, four local women, Nelda Merriott, Kathryn Taylor, Billie Downing and Bobbie Harrison agreed to take over the parade.

As they had only two weeks to coordinate the parade, it was fast and furious work, but they produced one of the largest parades held in Muleshoe in a long time.

They expressed appreciation for the many parade entries; to the workers who helped line up the entries; the police escort, including Sgt. Julian Dominguez, who led the parade, the city patrolmen and the county deputies.

MHS New Baseball Program Is Discussed

It was time for spring baseball to be discussed at the weekly meeting of the Muleshoe Rotary Club on Tuesday.

Jim Crawford, in charge of the Rotary program, introduced the

new high school baseball coach, Jeff Anderson, to the Rotarians.

Coach Anderson, who was a pitcher for three years for the Chicago White Sox, spoke about the baseball program being instituted (for the first time), in the Muleshoe schools.

According to the coach, there will be approximately 22 members of a varsity team, and they will be competing in a district with four other teams.

He said 18-25 games will be played the first year, although he was not sure whether the MHS team will be competing in the northern district with all new teams; or with the more established baseball teams in the southern district.

Games will be played in the old Babe Ruth Baseball park on South Main Street. A lot of renovation will be done getting the playing field ready for competition.

At this time, some night games are anticipated, because the coach quoted, "kids get excited about playing under the lights."

He said January 30 will be the first day of practice for the MHS team.

Prior to the first games, Coach Anderson said he already has volunteers ready to work on the field. He anticipates perhaps moving light poles and the outfield fence, which he says needs to be moved back some

After a quorum arrived at the Muleshoe City Hall on Tuesday morning, a short meeting took care of all necessary business for the month of August.

Main item on the agenda was council discussion and approval of an Interlocal Governmental Cooperation Contract for Administrative Services between the City of Muleshoe and South Plains Association of Governments.

City Manager Dave Marr explained that the request is because of a paving grant for the City of Muleshoe.

SPAG acted as consultant for the grant application, and following approval of the paving grant, asked to administer the funds.

The city manager explained that this process will save the City of Muleshoe a lot of extra paperwork that will have to be done.

After deciding that an administrator would have to be hired to keep up with the paving funds, SPAG should be granted the contract. The city council went along with the decision and SPAG was approved as administrator.

The city manager also told the council members that the seal-coat contractor who was recently working in Muleshoe has filed for bankruptcy. The city has a list of local people who have various sums of money coming from the contractor.

Marr said persons with claims against the contractor should write to the City of Muleshoe with their claim.

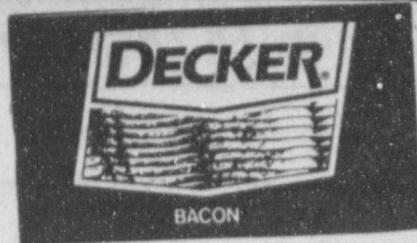
A budget work session was moved from Wednesday evening, August 17 to August 24.

According to consumer economics specialist Bonnie Piernot, a dependent child's belongings often will be covered on their parents' policy so long as the student lives in an organized living unit, such as a dormitory or fraternity/sorority house.

"When the student lives in an apartment, mobile home or rented house, it's less likely that the parents' coverage will apply," said the Texas Agricultural Service home economist. "Since policies vary, parents should contact their insurance agent."

If the student's belongings are not covered on the parents policy, tenants insurance is one solution, Piernot said.

"In case of fire or theft, tenants insurance is important, because a landlord's policy does not cover a renter's personal property," she said.

The specialist said that students may not realize how much of an investment they have in stereo equipment, a home computer, TV, clothing, furniture, or appliances until they have to replace them.

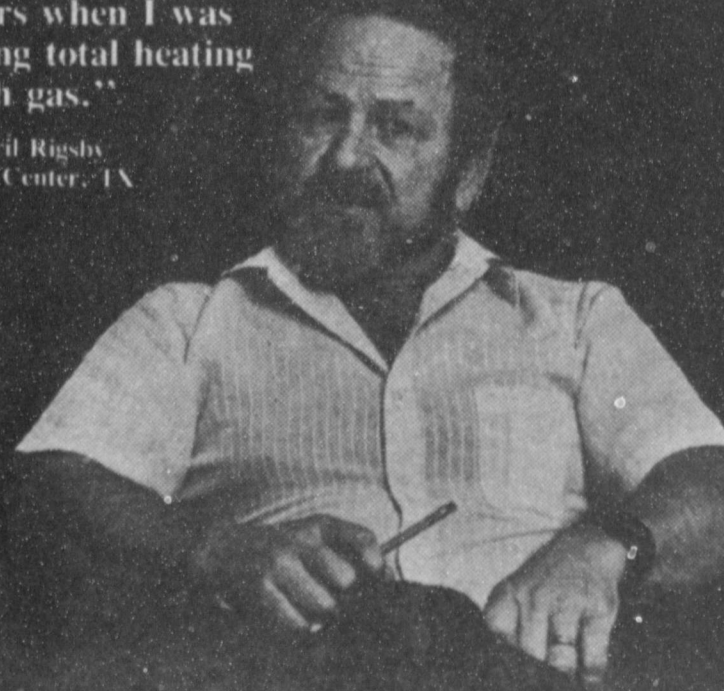

Although no retail rate selling electricity can be established until all cost factors have been determined, a rate has been tentatively suggested, under which a minimum bill of \$2.50 a month would pay for 100 KWH, enough for all these uses, lighting and operating of a washing machine, a radio, a water pump and one major appliance, such as a refrigerator.

Soil Tests Prove Vital

Farmers gearing up to plant wheat or other small grains this fall should get their soil tested soon, said Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A soil test is still the best way to determine fertilizer needs, Tanksley said. How much nutrient to apply depends on the level of that nutrient in the soil, crop residue levels, cropping history, available moisture, grazing practices and management schemes.

A soil test will determine the amount of residual nitrate-nitrogen in the soil and will reduce nitrogen recommendations by that amount, resulting in a direct savings to the farmer.

Soil incorporation, or knifing of fertilizer nutrients into a moist seedbed is important to reduce nitrogen volatilization losses associated with surface applied urea or urea-containing fertilizers, said Tanksley. This practice also allows placement of non-mobile nutrients such as phosphorus into higher moisture and the more active root zone of plants.

The Extension Service soil testing laboratories at College Station and Lubbock will analyze soil samples and make fertilizer recommendations. However, the recommendations are no better than the quality of the soil same analyzed. Therefore, soil samples should be truly representative of the field being tested.

Information on properly collecting and submitting a soil sample, along with fees involved, can be obtained from the county Extension office, said Tanksley.

Texas A&M professor says advertising benefits medical patients

COLLEGE STATION — Few doctors use advertising to increase their business despite a lift of the ban on doing so, apparently because many physicians still feel that "selling" their services is demeaning and inappropriate, says a Texas A&M University marketing professor.

Dr. Stephen McDaniel analyzed physician ads in the leading newspaper of 75 randomly selected U.S. cities. He found that physicians aren't taking advantage of ads as much as they could. In looking through 150 Thursday and Sunday editions, 122 physicians ads were found.

"When they do use advertisements, they aren't using them for persuading or reminding, but for simply providing basic information about their business, such as their address, phone number, or information that just makes people aware of the practice," said McDaniel.

"It seems there is still a reluctance on the part of the physician to advertise, although some studies, such as one conducted recently in Wisconsin, suggest that people are generally supportive of physician advertising," he said.

"Advertising itself does serve a definite social purpose and if carried out in a professional manner can serve individual physicians as well as their patients in a beneficial manner," McDaniel explained.

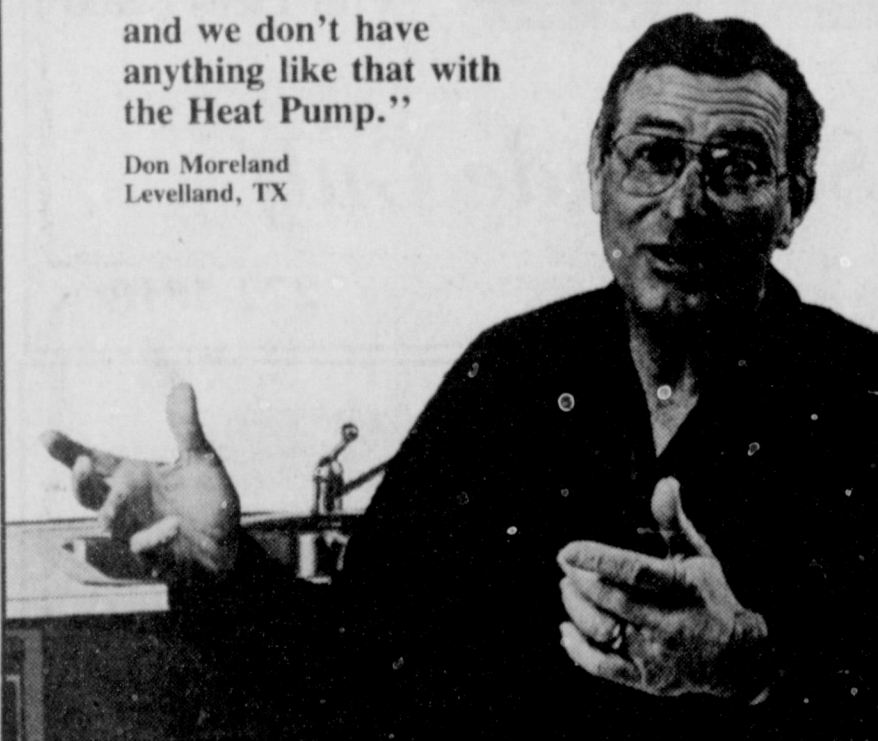

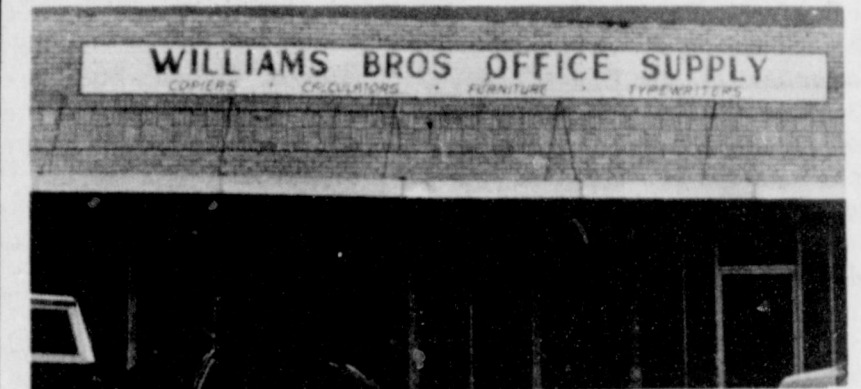
