

Two years ago it was so wet they they had to replant three or four times, and the farmers claimed the young plants couldn't push through caked soil.

Shucks, we surely are disappointed and disgusted. Here we ordered a load of cotton burrs, or husks, or whatever you call them, along with the other waste parts from the cotton gin-and it seems there must have been a fair percentage of cotton seed therein.

We may be having trouble with our peas and beans and other garden truck, but we can show any farmer in the Pecos Valley how






