An amended order affecting New Mexico users of domestic silver—mostly native craftsmen and manufacturers of Indian type jewelry—was announced by Murray Sprague, district manager of the War Production Board. The changes provide operation under a quarterly rather than a monthly basis, exclusion "from quota calculations the amount (of silver) used in the base period to fill order rated A-3 or higher" and elimination as hand crafts those who use in addition to hand tools "dies, jigs, molds or any mechanical apparatus." Sprague said the definition of small manufacturer had been altered to apply to firms having "not more than five employees, excluding clerical workers."

Zia Sun Symbol To Be on State Tobacco Stamps

New Mexico's famed emblem—the Zia sun symbol—will adorn tobacco packages when the tobacco tax becomes effective.

This was disclosed by Gov. Dempsey, who said that Victor Salazar, director of the School Tax Division of the Bureau of Revenue had gone to Chicago to make arrangements for the initial consignment of stamps to be affixed to cigaret and cigar packages when the law becomes effective in July.

The governor expressed a preference for sample stamps which have a yellow background with the Zia symbol and printing in red.

Salazar has been receiving "numerous requests" for stamps, the governor said, and will probably order fifty million stamps in the initial outlay.

The stamps will be in 1, 2, 5, 25 and 50-cent denominations.

Vacations are fine, but there will be no extra gasoline for vacation travel this year, says Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown. Both rubber and gasoline supplies are too critical to allow motorists any "luxury" gasoline rations.

Brown pointed out that gasoline coupon in an "A" book could be saved, and that gasoline could be carried over in the tank of an automobile from one period to the next. In this way, a motorist may save fuel for 180 miles for a vacation trip by car.

Although a continuing drop again was reflected in the out-of-state motor traffic in New Mexico in April, the one-day traffic count again showed that motorists are sharing their cars more than formerly, State Tourist Bureau Director J. A. Bursay reported.

## Women Dieticians Are Needed In The Army Air Forces

Add to the WAAC's and Army Nurses a third opportunity for women who wish to serve their country in uniform: The Army Air Forces are now in need of dieticians to serve in the Medical Detachment.

Status as officers and a grade equivalent to second lieutenant, with an annual salary of \$1,800 plus quarters, subsistence and uniform, are offered women who qualify.

Requirements are graduation from accredited colleges with major in nutrition or institutional management, plus completion of an approved dietician training course. Two or more years experience in the latter, provided that the experience includes practical work in diet therapy, menu planning, employee supervision, ordering of food supplies and equipment and cost control. Only American or allied nation citizens who are under 45 years of age are eligible.

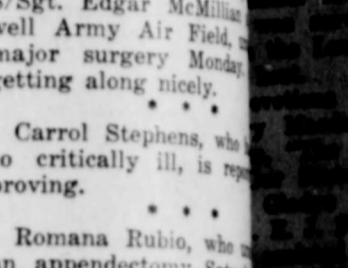

Sauce Steps from Sidelines to Take Important Place as Food-Stretcher

See what the War has done to sauces!

Page Webster, Funk-Wagnalls, to revise that definition of sauce as a "composition of appetizing ingredients eaten with food as a relish".

No more a mere accessory, no more a fancy trifle with a tony tag like "Soubise", "Piquante" or "Mousseline", sauce is the liquid that holds the heart of the dishes' flavor.

Be a saucy cook—to your own benefit—and find here some snappy ideas for expanding good flavor into hearty meals:

Dried Beef in Quick Sauce (Mayonnaise Stretches Points) One-fourth lb. dried beef, 1 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup milk, few grains pepper, 1/2 cup minced green pepper.

Shred dried beef; scald with hot water, draining immediately. Place mayonnaise in top of double boiler over hot water; add milk gradually, stirring constantly.

Quick Dessert Sauce (Rich in Dextrose) One and one-half tbsps. cornstarch, 1 cup dark syrup, 1/2 cup chopped Brazil nuts.

Egg-Onion Sauce (Made by "Gravy Method") One cup milk, 2 tbsps. flour, 3/4 teasp. salt, 2 tbsps. margarine, 2 hard-cooked eggs, 2 tbsps. chopped parsley, few drops onion juice.

Louisiana Sauce (Easy Shrimp Sauce) Two tbsps. margarine, 3 tbsps. flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 teasp. salt, few grains pepper, 1 No. 1 can (7 oz.) shrimp, 1 egg.

Clear Lemon Sauce (Easy Does It) Follow the directions for pie filling on the package, using, however, 2 1/2 cups water instead of 2 cups.

THE MIGHTY AMAZON

A hundred miles at sea, passengers sailing along the coast of Brazil are surprised at the change in the color of the water. No land is visible, but it is obvious that something has occurred to alter the water from the dark, clear blue of the ocean to a dull, turbid yellow.

Majestic indeed is the Amazon. Flowing in an easterly direction across northern Brazil, and with its tentacles represented by innumerable tributaries extending northward into Colombia, Venezuela and Ecuador, and southward into the heart of the continent, the Amazon basin embraces an area of 2,772,000 square miles.

Gov. John J. Dempsey once performed a courtesy for a stranded motorist and last week he heard about it. A letter bearing the signature of Katherine A. Stephens, of New York, told how the writer's car was stalled on the Santa Fe-Albuquerque highway.

No less interesting than its physical features is the history of this mighty stream. Discovered in 1500 by the Portuguese navigator, Vicente Yanez Pinzon, it was first traversed by Francisco Orrellana, who left Quito, Ecuador, in 1539, and after crossing the mountains descended the river and reached the Atlantic on August 26, 1541.

Expeditions from the United States also have explored the Amazon basin. One of the earliest of these was that undertaken in 1851 by Lardner Gibbon and William L. Herndon.

Today the Amazon basin is again the center of interest and activity. Economists, engineers and doctors are seeking to overcome the natural barriers and to realize some of the great potential wealth of this vast area.

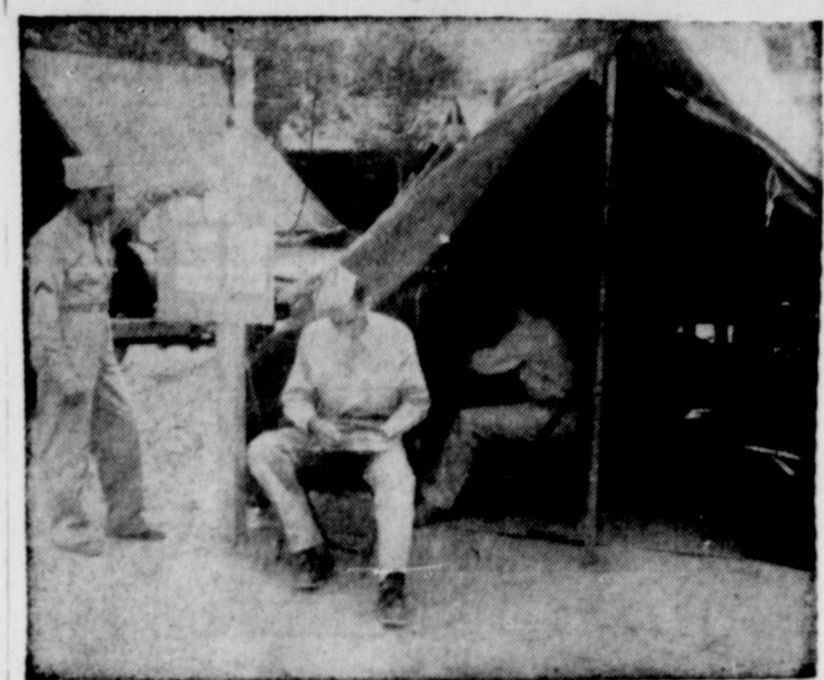

Information has been received from the Office of Price Administration that extra sugar for home canning of fruit and making jams, jellies, preserves, and the like again will be available, according to Mrs. Dorothy Y. Hanny of the New Mexico Extension Service.

Motor vehicle registrations in New Mexico up to April 30 totaled 94,466, a drop of 7 per cent from registrations of 101,735 at

the same time in 1942, State Revenue Commissioner J. O. Gallegos reported. Gallegos said corresponding figures on revenues were not yet ready for announcement but that there obviously would be a drop. Officials of the Motor Vehicle Registration Department said the percentage of decrease in revenue was expected to be greater than the drop in registrations. This, it was explained, was partly due to the virtual absence of license fees levied in the first category—new vehicles. Between 75 and 80 per cent of registrations this year, it was said, were those in which fees were paid in the minimum category.
