Since the first Annual Meeting in 1986, the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation has made giant strides toward the restoring of the historic landmarks that are now a permanent part of the Muleshoe Heritage Center.

The old Santa Fe Depot has been completed and is being used daily by Senior Citizen organizations, and other groups for activities such as 50th wedding anniversaries, wedding receptions, bridal showers, and numerous other occasions. A hostess has been employed, who will take reservations and help plan meetings or parties at the depot.

Presently, the Janes house is

undergoing a facelift. The existing stucco on the outside will be completely replaced and steps and a porch will be added just as it was originally.

The City Council of Muleshoe has given \$7,500 in matching funds from the Hotel/Motel Tax Fund. This will be used toward the restoration of the Janes House.

Everyone is invited to attend the third annual meeting of the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation, Monday, September 19, in the old Depot, 2200 North Ash Street at 7 p.m.

Four new members will be elected to fill the vacancies on the Heritage Board, and new officers will be elected.

A review of the accomplishments, preview of goals for 1989, recognition of members, workers at the Thrift Shop, organizations of Friends of the Heritage Foundation and a summary of memorials, will all be a part of the program.

Entertainment will be provided and the SCAC committee from Muleshoe High School will serve refreshments.

The goal of the Heritage Foundation is to have the Janes House restored and furnished by July 4, 1989.

What a tourist attraction for Muleshoe! It can be done if everyone catches the spirit of promoting Muleshoe and becoming a part of the Heritage Foundation by contributing time, ideas and donations.

Issue Warning

On Insurance Scam

According to investigators from the Bailey County Sheriff's office and the Muleshoe City Police Department, General Life and Accident out of Fort Worth is a legitimate insurance company.

However, it has been alleged that a former employee, Robert Reyes Subia, Jr., age 29, has written several insurance policies locally since the latter part of June and first of July.

Deputy Richard Bonham is asking anyone who has taken out a policy with the company during the last two weeks of June or first of July to contact either the Bailey County Sheriff's Department or the Muleshoe City Police Department.

A spokesperson for General Life and Accident in Fort Worth said Subia was terminated on June 7. He is 29 years of age, 5-8, 150 pounds, a burn scar on his chin, and said to be neatly dressed.

Deputy Bonham said someone purporting to be a representative of General Life and Accident would call by telephone, and tell the prospect they were representatives of the company and discuss their insurance, telling the prospect someone would be by the next day.

The false representative would go by the residence on the following day, write a new policy, collect a year's premium and leave.

The scam came to light when two victims contacted the home company in Fort Worth asking about their policies.

The deputy sheriff said loss to the two known victims in one day of the bogus policies was more than \$1,500.

"We suspect there are other victims around here," said Deputy Bonham, "and they may not even realize yet they have fallen for an insurance scam."

Mules Traveling To Meet The Denver City Mustangs

This Friday night, the Mules will travel to Denver City to take on the Denver City Mustangs for the first time in several years.

Hosts Denver City may be just a little hostile and eager to prove their 'mettle' as they lost last week by one point, 21-20 to Kermit.

However, the Mules should be fairly healthy and reasonably confident, coming off a comfortable 14-6 victory over the Shallowater Mustangs.

The Mules will be going out for a repeat performance of last Friday night's game where they had 112 yards rushing and 165 passing yards for a total of 277.

As they are racking up statistics, the tough Muleshoe defense is holding opponents to an average of 284 total offense yards per game.

Also, the Mules will be trying to cut out some of the penalties that hurt them in their second game, with 12 for 110 yards. The Mules also lost one fumble, but Shallowater lost two fumbles and the Mules' quarterback Jeff

Hicks had two interceptions.

Opponents have managed to fairly well contain speedy Daniel Olivias, holding him to 48 yards on nine carries and one touchdown; Michael Dunham had 45 yards on eight carries; Timmy Shipman, nine yards on four

carriers; Jeff Hicks, 35 yards in nine carries and Eric Richardson 12 yards in three carries. Jeff Hicks also had a touchdown to his credit.

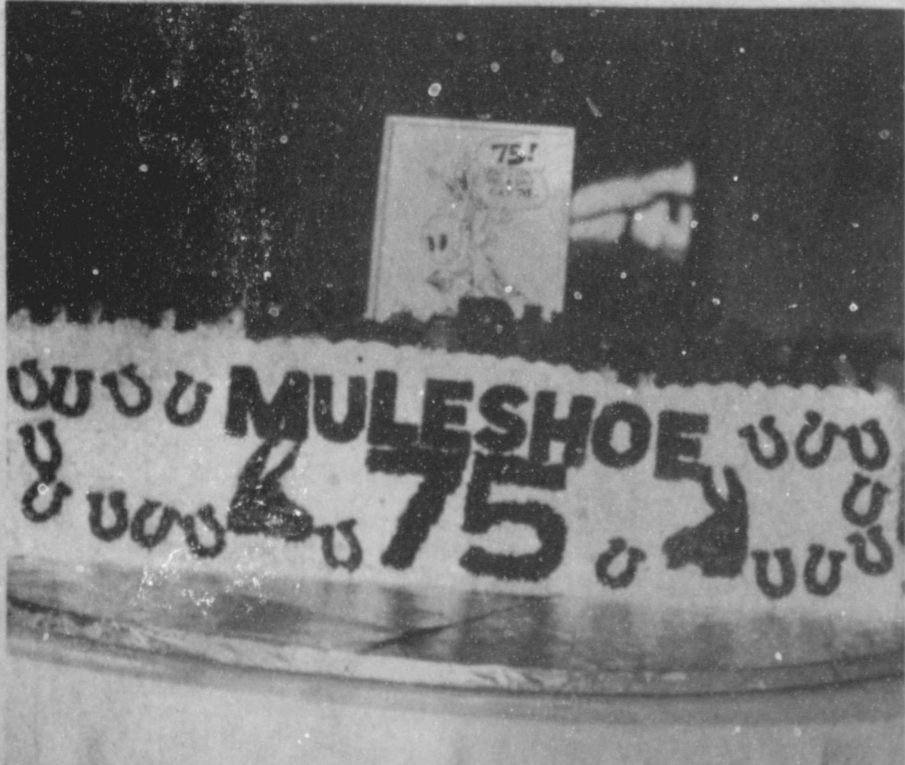
At presstime, Ruben Leal, Jr., 17, was still listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit of St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock.

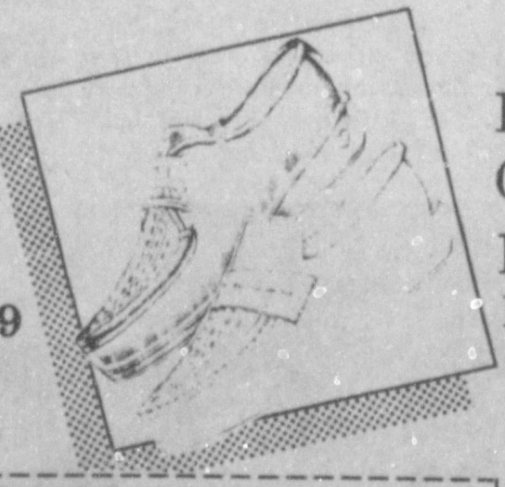

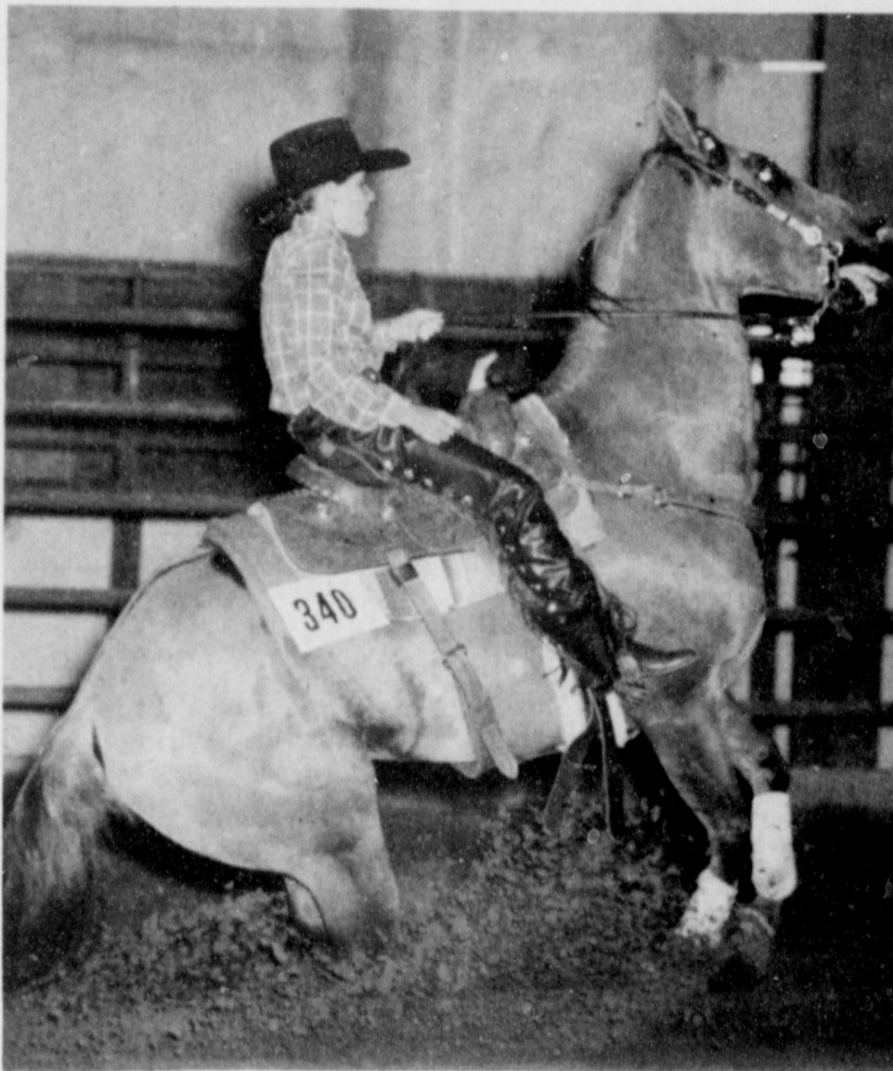

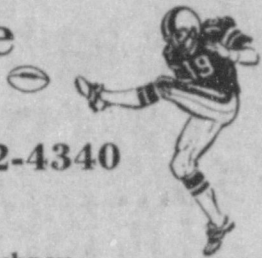

A more detailed description of the project and a map showing the specific locations of the proposed improvements is available for public examination at City Hall, 215 South First Street, Muleshoe.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Muleshoe has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The Reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

STREET IMPROVEMENTS-It is the major intent of the City of Muleshoe to improve access for area residents within the neighborhoods and into and out of their neighborhoods. Unpaved streets in the target areas create safety hazards and air pollution. The project will eliminate these problems. Minor grading and clearing will occur in regard to street improvements, but no long-term change in land characteristics will occur. Construction activities will produce certain amounts of very limited air and noise pollution over a short term. No major increases in traffic or auto exhaust pollution are expected.

An Environmental Assessment respecting the project has been made by the above-named City of Muleshoe which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Assessment is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request in the office of the City Manager between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON FINDING

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Muleshoe, to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at City Hall on or before October 3, 1988. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Muleshoe, will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

The City of Muleshoe will undertake the project described above with Community Development funds from the Texas Department of Commerce under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Muleshoe is certifying to TDOC that the City of Muleshoe and Darrell E. Turner in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Muleshoe may use the Texas Community Development Pro-

gram funds and TDOC will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

OBJECTIONS TO STATE RELEASE OF FUNDS

Texas Department of Commerce will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by TDOC; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (234 CFR Part 58.75) and may be addressed to Texas Department of Commerce, P.O. Box 12728, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.
