

In spite of the crude petroleum price hike of 35 cents a barrel recommended by Secretary Harold L. Ickes, petroleum administrator, in spite of the sensible arguments advanced by all of the principal oil men's organizations, in spite of the pleas of the governors and senators and representatives of the oil-producing states, in spite, even, of our humble efforts, Fred M. Vinson, director of economic stabilization, came forth with some double talk Friday in rejecting

He did, however, instruct Ickes to prepare a program giving more financial incentive for the drilling of wildcat wells and for the p. m. development of new fields, and to formulate, "if feasible," some program "other than a general price increase" to give additional support for the operation of marginal wells and for recovery of secon-

All of this, as we see it, means only one thing-subsidy-some thing none of the oil operators, big or little, desires.

Vinson did lower the sights a little, when he said the price increase would cost the consumers half a billion dollars annually, as compared with the proposed "steal" charged some months ago by some bigwig, which he said would be two and a half, or three and a half billion dollars, we don't remember which, but what difference does a billion dollars make?
