

LOCAL FLYERS SHOULD BE ENCOURAGED

As is frequently the case, just about the time the dozen and a quarter local people who have started to learn to fly are becoming quite enthusiastic about flying, it appears cold water may be thrown on their fun, because the old municipal airfield is not approved.

They started a few weeks ago learning to fly, in a plane which is flown to Artesia by the instructor at appointed times, and so far tice, 8 o'clock Wednesday evening. (II Corinthians 9:8) about half of those who have become interested have soloed.

Now they are informed by an inspector that they may be precluded from further flying from the field here, for lack of approval of the port. However, he said they may continue until official word comes from Washington.

And that is what they are afraid will come!

It is true that there is no armed guard at the Artesia port, a prerequisite for having a field approved. But, the local enthusiasts point out, they do not keep a plane here—they do not even own one -so what danger is there from saboteurs or enemy agents? The plane they use for learning, they say, is taken to the approved port p. m. at Carlsbad when it is not in use here.

If they are precluded from further flying here, it is probable The public is invited to attend their enthusiasm will wane, and the majority will drop flying, for each service. they cannot drive to Carlsbad for lessons and the pursuit of their new hobby, which will be in keeping with the general trend when the war is over and flying grows by leaps and bounds.

And if they are precluded from flying, that will help extend the period during which the Artesia post is still unapproved, for it is likely the Artesia flyers would form a club, purchase a plane and provide a guard, so as to meet government recognition.



THANKSGIVING CARROT PUDDING

Sift 11/4 cups enriched flour; measure;

sift again with 1 tsp. soda, ¼ tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, and ½ tsp. cloves. Cream ¼ cup shortening

with 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed; add 2 eggs and beat well. Dredge 1 cup grated, raw carrots, 1

cup grated, raw potatoes, 1 cup raisins, ½ cup finely chopped candied lemon peel (optional), and 1

candied lemon peel (optional), and 1 cup finely chopped walnut meats in ½ cup of the flour mixture, and beat well; add fruit-nut mixture. Fill well-greased 1½ qt. mold ¾ full; cover tightly. Steam 3 hours or until done. Serve with lemon or hard sauce. Serves 10 to 12.







Farmers May Wait to Dec. 15 To File Estimate

S. P. Vidal, collector of internal revenue for the district of New Mexico, has called the attention of New Mexico taxpayers to that portion of the Current Tax Payment Act of 1943, which provides that farmers may wait until Dec. 15, to file their estimated declarations.

Vidal said that qualification as a farmer means that at least 80 per cent of the estimated gross

ncome must come from farming. He further announced that the requisite gross income must come from the operations of a stock, dairy, fruit, poultry, or truck farm, or plantation, ranch, nursery, range, or orchard. The term, therefore, will not include a farm manager or assistant, who is employed on a straight salary, but will include both the owner of the farm and the tenant where the farm is rented on shares. It will not include the owner if the land is merely rented for an annual rental but will include the tenant farsation is based on production.
