

may not appear on the face of the order but it is evident when possibilities of "embellishment" are considered.

In the last war (and in other wars, including our own Civil War) hundreds of ingenious devices were resorted to in an attempt to convey important information to

A few of the schemes developed included:

Sketches of butterflies, all neatly and scientifically tabulated, which contained almost microscopic outlines of fortifications in the wing designs.

Musical compositions which, in

Pen, pencil, water color, and oil "sketches" of individuals whose hair or clothing was so cleverly depicted as to show military information.

Songs and poems included in ordinary letters home that, properly interpreted, told military secrets.

Packages of miscelloneous items packed in such a manner as to reveal, by the method of packing,

And, of course, scroll work and fancy embellishments such as often surround initial letters in "illuminated" manuscript which con-

The censors sometimes are fooled, and instances already have been noted in letters from abroad. One man, writing from an internment camp in Germany, praised the food, the people, the camp and general conditions but added, "as fine as all this is, I still would prefer to be in Green Hollow." Green Hollow was the name of the cemetery near his home town.
