The War Production Board has determined that construction of a second elementary school for Artesia is essential, the Artesia School Board has been notified, W. E. Kerr, superintendent, announced this

Kerr said no changes were made by the WPB in the application, announcement of which was made a month ago. The application calls for an elementary school of nine rooms, which the board proposes to build south of Morris Field and west of the high school plant.

when plans were made in 1941 for a second elementary school. That project, however, was deferred because of the war. Because of the great increase in the population of Artesia and

the greater number of school children, the school classroom situation became increasingly acute, leading to the action of the board the latter part of last year. Enrollment during the current school year reached an all-time high. At present every available room

in the school system is being used for classes, including the girls' gymnasium, which was partitioned to house three elementary groups last fall. Nine elementary rooms are housed at this time at the high school plant.

Kerr said it is hoped a priority rating may be obtained promptly and that construction can be pushed, so the new building will be ready for classes next fall.

Declares Lumber Than Is Steel

Lumber is a more critical material at this time than steel. Boone Barnett declared Tuesday noon, speaking at the weekly meeting of the Artesia Rotary Club.

And more startling than that statement was the one that there are more tons of wood used on the fighting fronts than tons of steel.

Barnett, by way of explaining why it is so difficult to obtain lumber for ordinary civilian uses. said that in the Western area of the United States, the total capacity is twenty-seven billion feet a year, whereas the government is using for crating alone seventeen billion feet of Nos. 1 and 2 dimension lumber and boards, of which the maximum production from the entire cut on the West Coast is 60 per cent.

It therefore has become necessary that lumber products be severely restricted, Barnett said.

The speaker pointed out one paradoxical condition, that Mexico, one of the United Nations and an ally, is on a "building spree." and it is possible for anyone there to build what and when he pleases, out of what he pleases, and that is likely to have come from the United States, where the same material is under restrictions.

WHAT D'YA MEAN IT'S ALL OVER?

Once again we quote an advertisement for an editorial. Under third Thursday; brotherhood, third the caption, "What D'ya Mean It's All Over?" and accompanied by Thursday of each month. a picture of a grimy, dirty, unshaven, marine, it told the story of War Bonds and the Fourth War Loan better than we could. It reads, the marine speaking:

"If you ask me, too many people are looking at this war through rose colored glasses! But it doesn't make sense. Don't call me a pessimist. I'm plumb in the middle of the fight-and although like you, I can see Victory in sight, there's still a long, tough battle ahead!

"Maybe you think of war in terms of glorified blood and thunder. But when you've dragged your feet through mud, and tried to keep your rifle dry no matter how you feel; when you've watched LAKE ARTHUR-COTTONWOOD your best friend drop from enemy fire, and not even been able to stop to see if he's alive; when you've seen a company of Yanks machinegunned out of existence trying to take a little hill of earth; you know that every minute of war must be counted in so many more Sunday.

"That's why I feel tough about over-optimism. That's why I'm here to tell you to keep up your end of the fight; and above all buy more War Bonds-yes-till it hurts! All it will be hurting will be your wallet-but if you don't shell out for War Bonds you may be bringing to his death a fighting man you love-whose life might be spared if your War Bond purchases help shorten the war by so much as one day."

AN EXCHANGE OF INNUENDOES

Some of our readers may have been surprised and somewhat confused by two parenthetical paragraphs at the end of our story last week about the coming President's Ball, in which were named the members of the various committees.

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




