


A DISC OF WHITE WITH CROSSED BARS OF RED

National headquarters of the American Red Cross has prepared a tableau for presentation by chapters in connection with the current drive for funds, a copy of which has reached our desk—and we rather like it.

The narrator's copy, written in blank verse style, tells the story of the Red Cross, and what it is doing. For presentation as a tableau there are a number of characters who appear. But we cannot show them here, and we will not even tell you who or what they represent, but we present the narration, which tells what we would say, but much better than we could say it:
