It is better to make an entire application, but if the old one is used, it should be accompanied with a note showing the present employer, where working, and the mileage rationing needed, they

Likewise an applicant should tell whether he needs more or less gasoline than previously, and why.

One reached in his pocket and produced a match; the other merely said, "Trim trees."

The latter, of course, was referring to our frequent tirade about Wednesday in each month: Wotrimming trees, so pedestrians may walk along the sidewalks of Artesia without danger of losing their eyes from the low limbs.

The former probably had no idea where he might lead us, or that we would even mention the match. But we decided to fool him.

The invention of the match was a great step forward in the progress of man. Since the early days of civilization, when man discovered that cooked food was better than raw food, he employed fire in his living. But for many centuries he had to depend on lightning to kindle his fires, which he had to tend continuously in order to have heat when he needed it, or he would rub sticks together or employ flint and tinder.

Leg of Lamb Used Well Costs 2 Points Per Serving

A six-pound roast leg of lamb with browned potatoes and fruity gelatin salad crowns any table. And it will extend into three delicious leftover dishes - good for lunch at home, lunchboxes, dinner or a midnight meal. Following are several tested lamb recipes, including two leftover dishes:

LEG O' LAMB

Select a leg of lamb weighing $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 6 pounds. Do not remove fell. Rub with $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons salt and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon pepper. Place roast, fat side up, on a rack in uncovered roasting pan. Roast at 325° F. for 35 to 40 minutes per pound or to 175° to 180° F. on the roast meat thermometer. If desired, insert tiny slivers of garlic into deep gashes before roasting, and remove before serving.

LAMB TURNOVERS

I cup chopped cooked lamb 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce I tablespoon parsley 11/2 tablespoons lard or drippings

11/2 tablespoons flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup milk Plain pastry for I-crust pie

Combine lamb with Worcestershire sauce and parsley. Mix with white sauce made of melted fat, flour, salt and milk. Blend pastry in usual manner, divide into four parts and roll on floured board into six-inch squares. Place a spoonful of meat mixture on a triangular half of pastry square. Fold pastry over meat, corner to corner, and press edges together. Place in a baking pan. Brush tops with milk and bake at 400° F. about 30 minutes or until brown. Serve with brown gravy or mushroom sauce, if desired. Serves 5.

LAMB CURRY

11/2 cups cooked lamb 3/4 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 1/2 cup chopped celery Lard or drippings for browning 1/2 clove garlic, minced (optional)

I teaspoon curry powder 11/2 teaspoons salt
2 cups lamb broth (stock made from roast bone) 2 tablespoons flour

I tablespoon Worcestershire sauce Cut meat in ½-inch cubes. Brown onion, pepper and celery lightly in drippings, then add garlic, curry powder, salt, Worcestershire sauce, broth and meat. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Mix flour with ¼ cup cold water and stir into mixture to thicken. Serve curry in a ring of fluffy
