School Budgets of Artesia And County Are Increased

Local Maintenance Is Set at \$147,902-Every Item of Four Systems Is Approved At Hearing Friday—All Salaries Up

Every item asked for by the school systems of Eddy County for the 1944-45 budgets was approved at the annual hearing before the budget commission in Carlsbad Friday, at which the salaries of all principals and teachers in both municipal and county systems were given increases of \$120 a year, because of the rise in the cost of living.

The total of the school maintenance budgets for the Artesia, Hope, and Carlsbad municipal schools, and the county school system was set at \$568,170, as compared with \$465,847 a year ago.

Of the total, the maintenance budget for Artesia schools was set at \$147,902, up from the \$118,656 of a year ago.

The direct charge was raised from \$12,900 to \$16,250, of which \$2,500 was allowed because of increasing the building fund to avoid, if possible, another bond issue to carry out the building program.

The debt service part of the budget for Artesia was left as it had been, \$11,000 for the sinking fund and \$4,000 for interest.




