Don't call the telephone operator, when the fire siren blows, asking her where the fire is, for she won't give out the information.

The information was announced this week jointly by Ralph G. Roberson, Jr., local manager for the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph Company, and Fire Chief Albert Richards, who said the new rule would go into effect Friday morning.

Roberson said the practice of dozens of people calling the operators when the siren blows jams the switchboards and sometimes retards the work of the operators in calling firemen, officers, or prop-

erty owners concerned. And Richards said the lack of information to the general public regarding fire locations should help keep many people from rushing to the blaze location and hampering the arrival and work of fire-

Are Great Possibilities Here, Clark Tells Commission's Workpile Committees Friday, as Outline of Work Is Given Members, Who Have Started Big Research Task

The Artesia Chamber of Commerce's commission on post-war planning is pitching into its stupendous job on two premises, that there will be one great city in the Pecos Valley and an oil capital in this section after the war, and one idea, that Artesia should be both.

This was disclosed Friday evening to members of the commission's committees, appointed a week prior to assist in the great task of making surveys and compiling figures for a post-war workpile, by the Rev. C. A. Clark, commission chairman. The committees were instructed to increase their own

Prospects are good for a large and profitable production of both crops and livestock this year throughout the Ninth Farm Credit District, including New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Colorado, Frank M. Butcher, president of the of Wichita, reported to the Farm Credit Board.

Winter precipitation has been above normal in all four states of the district. More moisture fell in Western Kansas in January and February than in the first two months of any year since 1903, Butcher said.

Winter wheat prospects have improved steadily since Dec. 1 and the crop is generally in good condition, except where seeded in dry ground last fall. Spring planting has begun over most of the district and oats have been seeded




