

If you have any left-overs from that cherished fifty-four point roast from last Sunday's dinner-and if von have any lard in the larder-you can still serve a meat dish without using additional points. Lard is a rick source of unsaturated fatty acids so necessary for health, so use it for its nutrients as well as for its shortening power in this novel recipe.

MEAT PASTRY RING

8 cups sifted flour 2 tablespoons baking powder 3/4 cup water or milk I teaspoon salt

2/3 cup lard Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in lard, add water until dough will hold together. Roll into rectangular shape 5 inches by 12 inches. Spread meat filling over entire surface. Roll up like jelly roll and shape into ring. Cut into two-inch pieces, reassemble in ring shape on greased baking pan. Bake at 375 degrees Fahrenheit for 25 minutes.

MEAT FILLING

21/2 cups chopped, cooked mest 1/2 cup mashed, cooked carrets 1/2 cup cooked peas

I tablespoons chill seves 2 tablespoons Worcerteraline seure, desh of Tobesco saure

Blend chopped meat with seasonings and vagouables, add age to bind together and use for filling pastry ring.

This recipe may also be used for stuffing green peppers. Choose well formed peppers of uniform size. Be sure they are not hot ones. Remove all of the seeds and membrane. Fill with meat and vegetable filling and bake at 375 degrees Fahrenheit for 45 minutes. A tomato sauce is quite essential with this pervice.
