If none other, there are the Artesia gas system and the old Texas-New Mexico pipeline, concrete evidence that Colonel Woods passed

But there are others; never since he came to Artesia in 1927 was there any project for the advancement of his adopted community which did not find somewhere the backing and ideas of Colonel p. m. Woods.

He envisioned the Artesia Hotel, although it was for others to erect it. He envisioned a petroleum building for Artesia, which he saw take form when the Carper Drilling Company built its splendid home. He envisioned great oil production in Southeast New Mexico, and he had his part in that. And he envisioned a great oil field near Artesia west of the Pecos River, which, it appears, may soon come to

The death of Colonel Woods is a great loss to Artesia, one fully realized by those who have had the pleasure of watching his energy and sharing with him the fulfillment of his visions.

But they do rejoice that he chose to pass this way and give to this community the fruits of his labors.

Through the monuments he built for all and the advancements he helped to establish may his name long be remembered!

### **NEARLY 35,000 NEW MEXICANS IN ARMY**

Today's AP story carries the amazing statement that so far 33,446 New Mexicans have been absorbed in the Army personnel, which is a high jump from the previous guess that the number was between 15,000 and 20,000.

The summary showed that size of the Army increased from 513,-410 on Nov. 1, 1940, to 7,481,925 by the first of this year, with 8,-528,000 inducted and 1,290,085 discharged, resigned or killed in the month, at 7:30 p. m. 38-month period.

For New Mexico the figures were: Men-33,000 in Army on Jan. 1, 35,400 inducted, 213 separations.

Inasmuch as the original estimate was based on the number that might be expected to be taken out on the lines of the other states, it justifies the growing belief that New Mexico has had to bear more than its share of the draftage to the armed forces.-Roswell Morning

(Chaplain Henry S. Stout, who is now assigned to an Amphibian Regiment in the Southwest Pacific, has sent an account of his experiences to the General Commission on Army and Navy Chaplains, Washington, D. C. Chaplain Stout was born in St. Joseph, Mo., and in 1932 was called to the pastorate of the Second Presbyterian Church in that city, of which he was a member. In 1937 he became pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Artesia, from which he entered the chaplaincy in 1942. The account is similar in part to that which he wrote M. G. Schulze last month, but all is worthy of publication. Of his experiences in the Southwest Pacific, Chaplain Stout writes:

I have been in the Army now nearly two years, over half of that time spent in the Southwest Pacific. When one travels this far from home he cannot help but become my rambling around this part of and worked with these heroes of falling inside. Ham picked them wiser. I feel I have become so. In the world I have seen many sights: Strange lands, islands which are supposed to be romantic according to the jungle growth, shouting to the travel folders. I have seen the amicable gentleness of the New Guinea natives, fine stalwart fellows, who go about their labors for the white man, laughing, singing in the sticky, stinky, terrific heat of the jungle. I have talked in one hand and a gun in the othwith them and beheld their childlike amazement at the ways of the white man. I have visited in native villages and Christian missions, beholding the transformation of headhunters into gentle Christian people

I have seen strange tropical rees; vines that hang grotesquely from all manner of jungle growth; huge spiders that send a cold chill racing up your spine; lizards of all descriptions, huge and small; scorpions whose sting brings great pain and discomfort many strange, beautiful birds, multicolored. According to an old Indian legsprang up from the cast-off wings alighted on its highest branches, crowning the tree with the power of its radiance. The bird-whose scientific name is "Pharomacrus mocino"-is indeed worthy of such a legend. About the size of a large pigeon, the male boasts a magnificent plumage of crimson and brilliant green while its graceful tail coverts are "elongated into a golden train more than three feet long." 

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
