That would mean no dove hunting, which gives the hunters an excuse to be in the fields where pheasant are found. And hunters would hesitate to blaze away at LOCO HILLS BAPTIST CHURCH day of each month, 8 p. m. pheasant if there were no hunting allowed.

Some local sportsmen have proposed that the season on doves on the west side of the Pecos River and running a reasonable distance to the west be closed until after the pheasant season, thus making for better sport when it is legal to take the big game birds, as well as to protect them until that time.

Sportsmen are writing to Elliott S. Barker, state game warden, to this effect and they invite others to follow suit, calling his attention to the situation.

We are for it. We like to hunt doves, but we certainly don't have to hunt them in the pheasant territory, for in these big open spaces, there are plenty of places where the migratory birds may be taken, whereas the range of pheasant is limited.

And we hope Warden Barker will take kindly to our suggestion and the suggestion of other sportsmen. He is a conservationist and a believer in sportsmanship, who knows that if everyone plays fair -whether forced to by law or doing so because he believes in itthere will be more game for all in the long run.

Sheriff Fred Hill, Artesia's Chief of Police Kelley Stout, and Carlsbad's Joe Johns are frequently the object of parental ire whenever they take it upon themselves to run off the streets youthful delinquents. By the same token, should they take into custody children wandering on the loose at night, holding them until the parents can be contacted, the law enforcers are castigated by irate, alleged parents. Yet, when an accident occurs, such as the one on the Artesia-Carlsbad highway early Sunday morning, June 4, in which two were killed and seven youths were injured, the comment is heard, "The cops are lousy. What were they doing?" The job of law enforcement is just too much for the police to handle sans adult assistance. The cops aren't lousy, merely unable to cope with the problem of juvenile supervision without parental help and understanding.

The police should have parental assistance and no better case for a complete recreation program for Eddy County, juvenile and adult alike, could be made than accidents such as occured on last Sunday morning. Parents must help the cops.-Eddy County News, Carlsbad.
