IT'S TIME TO SLOW DOWN AGAIN

MANY DRIVERS have become quite lax in their driving, in spite of warnings about gasoline and rubber and pleas that they conserve these two precious items, and they whiz about with utter disregard to their future driving as well as to their lives and the lives

We could go into lengthy discourse on various phases of fast and useless driving, but what we are most concerned about at this moment is careless and fast driving in town, especially in the vicinity of schools at any time on school days and at corners where children have to cross going to and from school.

There is a law which provides for slow driving in the vicinity of schools, but many drivers pay no attention to it.

They do not seem to realize that a child, no matter how well he has been trained, does not even stop to think when he darts out into the street for a ball, or to cross, or for no reason at all.

In fact, the driver who pays no attention to children is paying less attention to training than is a child, when he whizzes merrily down the street, expecting the children to look out for themselves, for he is supposed to have more judgment.

But the fellow who does that sort of thing is lacking in judgement and is not fit to drive an automobile.

It is only natural for young minds to wander and fail to realize p. m. danger and function orderly; when an adult's mind works that way, something should be done with him.

BARKER EXPLAINS ENFORCEMENT DIFFICULTIES

WE HAD AN editorial some weeks ago addressed to State Game Warden Elliott S. Barker, in which we suggested that the hunting of doves be restricted from the pheasant areas, an idea with the merits

In a reply to us, the game warden said the matter would be brought to the attention of the State Game Commission when it met. However, the commission did not meet until Sept. 2, the day after the dove season opened.

Now we have another personal letter from Barker, in which he refers to our former correspondence. We believe his explanation covers the matter well, and we are passing that part of his good letter on to you:

"Some time ago you wrote me relative to closing the dove season in areas where pheasants are found. This matter was discussed at the commission meeting on Sept. 2, which was the first one we had held since your recommendations came in. Of course, by that time the dove season had already started and the commission felt that in view of that p. m., Mrs. Reed Brainard, presfact and especially in view of the fact that we just do not have suf- ident. ficient personnel to enforce such a regulation this year that it would not be wise to attempt to close the pheasant area to dove shooting. We feel sure, also, that there would be vigorous complaint from many sportsmen because it is within the pheasant areas where some of the best dove shooting is found. We do realize that some pheasants are killed by dove hunters just as quail are killed in some areas each year. That seems to be a matter of enforcement which, although difficult, we hope to be able to accomplish when this war is over and we hope to get our normal force back again. Meanwhile, we sincerely hope there won't be too many pheasants killed, and we will certainly appreciate information from any sportsmen who observe any shooting of pheasants by dove hunters."

SO THERE'S TIME TO APPLY FOR PERMIT

WHILE WE ARE speaking about Game Warden Barker, his letter referred to in our editorial above was actually in reply to one of ours, in which we related that there was a rumor in Artesia about sermon. names already having been drawn for the antelope season.

Perhaps you didn't hear the rumor, but it was floating around early last week that the deadline had been Aug. 31 and that permits m. were being issued as of that day.

We were certain that had not happened, for Warden Barker and the State Game Department are mighty good about sending out game information to the press and dealers who sell hunting licenses in ample time, unless, as in the case of the dove season, the commission does not meet far enough ahead of time for the publicity to come out.

The commission meets only four times a year and, in the case of seasons for migratory birds, cannot anticipate at the meeting usually the last Saturday in May what the dates will be, for they depend on the Biological Survey's action.

At any rate, we wrote to Warden Barker about the rumor, and he said in reply:

"I don't know how rumors get out like the one you refer to that we had had our drawing on Aug. 31 for there is absolutely no basis whatsoever for such a rumor and, as you know, the commission had not even yet set the seasons on Aug. 31."
