





Trailers carrying the ensilage are equipped with let-down sides which when dropped let the silage fall over the edge of the silo into the trench pit saving considerable labor.





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ASCS Releases Program Guidelines

1988 DISASTER **ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

The newsletter dated October 13, 1988 is corrected to read as follows: wheat producers that lose in excess of 65 percent of expected production needs to act now because the final date to request FCIC insurance is October 31, 1988 (not 1989).

ASCS requires proof of insurance for 1989, only on the farm that loses in excess of 65 percent of expected production for that crop. Once you get insurance on a program crop, FCIC requires that you insure the total acres of that crop on all farms in which you have an interest within the

1989 WHEAT AND FEED

GRAIN PROVISIONS USDA has announced the 1989 Wheat and Feed Grain Program

provisions. They are as follows: 1. A required 10 percent acreage reduction for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, and barley. A required five prcent acreage reduction for oats.

2. Producers will be required to maintain in acreage conservation reserve an area equal to 11.11 percent of the program payment acreage for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, and an area equal to 5.26 percent of the program payment acreage for

3. A paid land diversion program will not be implemented on wheat and feed grains.

4. The 0/92 program will be available for wheat and feed


