

#### Progress of Pharmacy Is Told in Ťalk

(Crowded out last week)

The progress of pharmacy and pharmacists and the related proessions of medicine and nursing through the centuries was described Tuesday noon by C. E. Mann, Artesia pharmacist, at the weekly Rotary Club luncheon.

In a paper, he pointed out that pharmacy is an ancient profession and that in the British Museum is prescription 6,000 years old.

By contrast, pharmacists in the United States last year filled 250, 000,000 prescriptions, but by dwindling number of members of the profession. Mann said that because of the raising of standards for practicing in that important profession, fewer persons are studying for it, and he forsees a shortage of pharmacists.

Mann told the many lines which have originated in the shops of pharmacists. They were the first to handle sugar and spices and many other items, which some peole today think are sidelines. The first candies were made by pharmacists, as well as toilet soaps, soda water, and many others. And the drugs themselves represent items from all over the world, found on the shelves of the phar-

The progress of medicine and he use of drugs was described by Mann, who said that in former vars more men died because of disease than from bullets, whereas in this war there has been no cholera, tetanus, or typhus among the troops of the United States.

#### Livestock Goals In 1945 Call For Reductions

State livestock goals for 1945 emphasize the necessity of bringing New Mexico's livestock population into line with feed supplies, range capacity, and probable postwar demand, according to A. D. Woofter of the State AAA Com-

The War Food Administration is asking for 1,100,00 cattle and calves on Jan. 1, 1945, a decrease of 320,000 head. USDA analysts also believe that if present trends continue, the state's sheep population will be about 1,800,000 head in another year, a drop of 308,000. in another year, a drop of 308,000.

State goals also call for 12,000 sows to farrow in the spring, a drop of 3,000, and a reduction of 331,000 in the hen population between Jan. 1 and March 1. Poultrymen are also expected to raise about 10,000 fewer chickens next year, 1,297,000 as compared with the 1944 indicated production of

Peanut Clusters



It is suggested that in 1950 the United States should import one billion barrels of petroleum, Zook said in citing the NPA report.


