HAITIAN-AMERICAN PROJECT, SHADA

Sharing with the Dominican Re-public the territory of the Island of Hispaniola where the first European settlement was established, Haiti is a country unique in many very few Negro nations of the

are small landowners. Because the country's political leadership believed that national economic problems could best be attacked with increased production of export crops, to be used in building up foreign exchange for the purchase of needed industrial goods, Haiti called upon the United States in 1938 for suggestions. A States in 1938 for suggestions. A survey of conditions in that co-untry was made, as the result of which a corporation known as the SHADA — "Societe Haitiano-Am-SHADA ericaine de Developpement Agricole" - was organized in 1941. The principal purposes of this pro-ject are the development of the rubber and lumber industries in Haiti, the growing and marketing of spice crops, bananas and other economic plants, and the fostering of handicraft industries. At the present moment, its chief concern is the production of strategic war materials such as rubber and sisal. The corporation is financed by the Export-Import Bank of Washington under the guarantee of the Haitian government, and is the product of an agreement of the United States with the Haitian government for cooperation between the two nations in develop-ing that republic's economy.

Taking into consideration the fact that the majority of farmers are owners of their land, SHADA whose own land holdings are relatively small — strives to pro-vide them with technical assistance and processing facilities and to supply them with planting stock. Under its charter the corporation was given authority for all the various types of activity necessary in carrying on a large business de signated to foster agriculture. It was authorized to grow any agricultural crop, to process, buy and export crops, to experiment in disease control and plant develop ment and to promote handicrafts related to agriculture. Three citizens of Haiti and three of the United States were chosen as directors. To develop lumbering, the corporation has taken over a forest unit, added a larger sawmil to the smaller one that the gov ernment was operating there, and generally stepped up production. It is now supplying Haitian buildrs with tropical forest products which in the past they either im


