RACKING UP DRILLING TOOLS

NOTHING IN the oil industry, so well informed oil men declare, has racked up so many drilling tools and halted drilling activity as the recent ruling of a United States Circuit Court judge in New Orleans.

The ruling upheld the commissioner of internal revenue, who taxed the intangible costs in the drilling of oil wells. This extra tax, it has been explained, with the present cost of oil not only makes it prohibitive to drill wells, but if the action should become retroactive, it would break a number of the large oil companies or impose taxes, which they would find impossible to pay.

In other words the court ruling permitting the taxing of intangible costs and the requiring of the oil companies to capitalize this cost, not only will halt new drilling activities and oil development but it endangers the petroleum supplies of the United States, even for the armed forces, it has been declared.

Estimates and figures vary as to the number of rigs being shutdown or not started; the number of drilling contracts concelled and the number of tools stopped. There is no disagreement, however, among oil men as to the ultimate result. There will be no new drilling when present contracts have been completed with the exception of where obligations to drill prevail.

Little needs to be said here in Artesia and the northern part of Eddy County as to what this will mean to this section if drilling is halted. It will not only affect those employed in the drilling of oil wells, but it will affect the citizens, business people, merchants, and the residents of this area.

What will happen here will happen in every other section of the nation where oil activity prevails.

And when oil production is halted; when development is stopped; when the taxes assessed against oil operations become so heavy it is no longer profitable to search for new oil pools, then not only those communities, which profit from these activities, will suffer, but the people of the nation will suffer because of the lack of petroleum supplies, not to consider the great need for these today by the armed forces of the Allies.

Yet the industry has gone along for years with no tax on the intangible costs of drilling. They have found new fields; they have provided the petroleum needs of America and most of the world.

Now the new ruling makes it prohibitive for them to continue. The matter is being brought before Congress.
