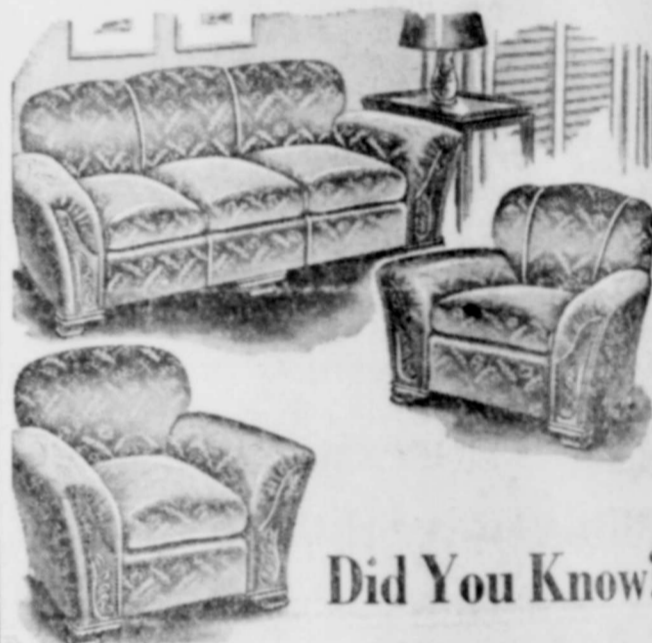

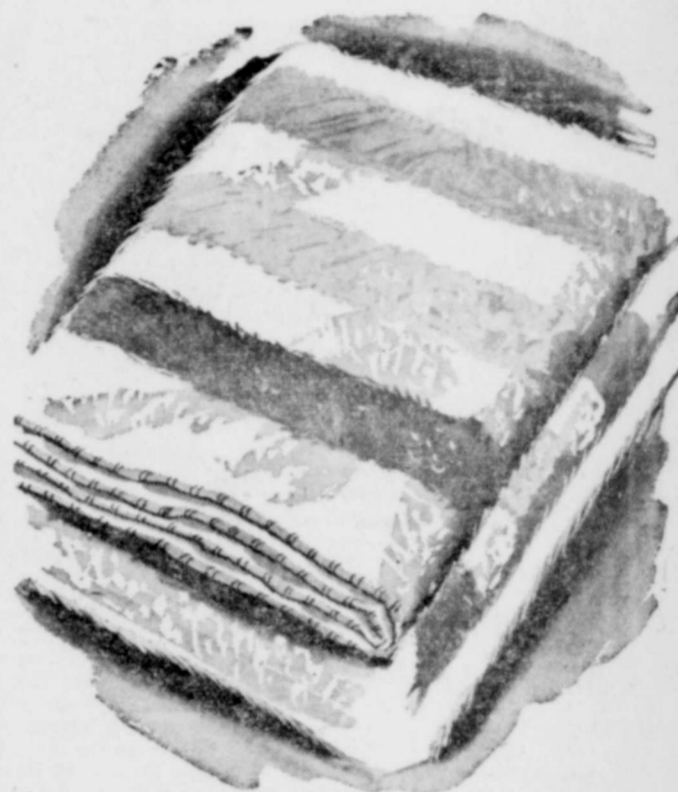

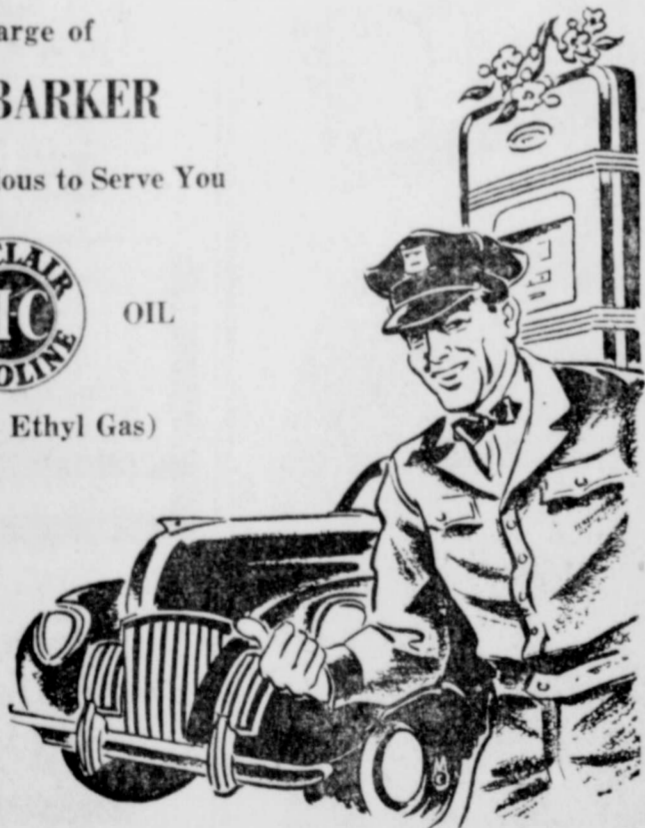

Company in Artesia. He also attended New Mexico A. & M. one and a half years before enlisting on April 12, 1943.

His brother, Cpl. Zane E. Smith, Jr., who enlisted in the Army during September, 1940, is stationed at Clovis.

Leland Wittkopp, Artesia tank platoon leader, is now a patient at William Beaumont General Hospital, El Paso, receiving treatment for wounds inflicted by a German artillery shell.

The shell burst near Lieutenant Wittkopp's tank, "Aneophletis," while he and his tank were in action with the 13th Armored Division. The tank was not damaged by the shell.

Lieutenant Wittkopp was wounded in the legs and back. Once before, "Aneophletis," gun, named "Little Lulu," was shot off by enemy fire.

Lieutenant Wittkopp was overseas six months. After he was wounded in April, he was evacuated to the states for treatment at William Beaumont, one of the Army's largest hospitals, where he arrived June 19.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Wilson of Artesia. He was a student at New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell before he entered the Army.

One of the many hospital corpsmen whose deeds have become etched deeply into the history of the war in the Pacific, Jack G. Harper, pharmacist's mate second class, USNR, son of E. M. Harper of Artesia, is stationed at a U. S. naval hospital in the Hawaiian area, the Eleventh Naval District revealed.

Along with the Navy doctors and nurses, the hospital corpsmen have performed deeds of mercy and have saved countless lives through the care they have given men returning from the battlefront torn in body.

Bluejacket Harper has been attached to the Pacific base hospital 15 months and prior to his trans-

fer to the Hawaiian area, was stationed at the U. S. Naval Hospital, Corona, Calif.

Along with other corpsmen at the Hawaiian hospital, Pharmacist's Mate Harper has been trained at a Navy hospital corps school and keeps step with progress in his work by attending weekly lectures given by staff medical officers.

Pvt. E. B. Wilson, 22, has reported to the Army Ground and Service Forces Redistribution Station at Santa Barbara, Calif., for assignment to new duties based on skills and experience gained during seven months' duty in England and France. The station, one of six established by the Army to receive service men and women considered essential to the prosecution of war, offers a comprehensive program of recreation, athletics, and entertainment to the returnee while he awaits new orders. Santa Barbara's famed vacation resort-hotels, now managed for the veterans by the Army, are under direction of the Ninth Service Command.
