

Congress doesn't build this or that. Congress can't reduce taxes and create unheard f amounts before the New Deal administration to provide pay for the unemployed. Congress can't continue to build this and that and yet reduce tax-

For instance Congress spent millions of dollars over the nation constructing air fields. One of se millions was spent here. Now there is a clamor for Congress to spend more millions to improve, enlarge and keep in repair the very airports it constructed with the understanding the cities or counties would take them over and main-

tain them The City of Artesia is prepared and ready to do exactly that.

And we don't believe that we want the government to spend any money on our airport here and likewise we don't want it to spend any more money

But very definitely if she does spend money elsewhere then we want our part of it here.

We believe Artesia and North Eddy county want taxes reduced and less from Uncle Sam instead of a continuation of the present tax rates or nore taxes and the continued spending.

We also believe that if Congress does decide o do more spending and less reducing of taxes back. then some thought and some effort should go into spending. We believe that we have had all the weed cutting and the ditch digging we want. We believe if we go on another spending spree then we want something left when the spree is over besides an unbalanced budget.

There are certain expenditures within reason carried on from year to year. Our new proposed postoffice is in that category. But the sum appropriated here isn't sufficient to justify the spending. It wouldn't provide what the city now needs let alone taking care of is future growth and expansion. And it should do that.

Building and constructing of highways should be among the top ranking project. The last war should have taught us that with all our highways we still haven't sufficient to meet the need of a peacetime nation and very definiely we haven't sufficient highways during a war.

We are firmly convinced that Artesia is more interested in a federal tax reduction program than it is in a federal spending and building program but if the wild spending spree is going to continue Artesia wants her part of it .- O. E. P.

ET'S GET THE RECORD straight once and for all in regard to the increasing number of felws who are wearing discharge buttons and shirt atches.

On the street the other day, a man was heard tell another, "One of those damned soldiers me back and took my job away from me." To which the other replied, "Yes, they're get-ng mighty thick around here."

As the old saying goes, "Them's fighting

In the first place, everybody should be thank-

ful that the boys can come home and that they are coming home every day-because the war is over. That alone should be sufficient cause for thanks-

In the second place, when the boys went to war, they were assured they could return to their old jobs when they came home. Therefore, anyone else holding down a job which a man left to become a soldier, sailor, or marine should know he must step aside, and he should be more than happy to step aside. During the war, the fellow who took the job undoubtedly made more money in a week than the man he displaced made in a month in the service. Besides, the fellow away at war was subjected to dangers to which the substitute was not exposed.

In the third place, the chances are that the fellow who is griping because he lost his job would have been fired months ago, had it been possible to replace him. We all know that inexperienced, incompetent, unskilled workers have been holding down jobs in which they were far from efficient, merely because someone had to do the work. The fact that they did not really do the work, but merely went through some motions—as few motions as possible-did not get them fired, because the next fellow who might come along probably

We recall hearing an assistant cashier in a bank once say, "I can spend my money where I please. I work hard to earn it. No one gives it to me; I haven't any obligation to anyone.

And if the bank didn't have any business it couldn't continue to operate. And if it wasn't operating then this particular employee wouldn't have a job.

He was just wrong. He did owe something to his job and something to his community.

And we can't escape that if we continue to take out of a community we must put something back. If the community has been kind to us-then we in turn should be kind to the community. We owe our success to the community where we have enjoyed that success.

And in our community when we work and toil together for the common good we can have about what we want.

And we have in our community men with vision; with courage; with faith; and with a willingness to invest their money and employ their credit to build our future. We owe them loyalty, support and co-operation. And we owe them our en-

and a half feet deep, four feet watering each layer of leaves. Alternate a layer of leaves and a leaves is known as a compact pile and should be kept moist. In four or five months the leaves should be sufficiently decomposed for spread on lawns or gardens like yearbook, "Soils and Men," leaves alone when dry are about twice as rich per pound in plant food as barnyard manure. Now is a good time to begin soil conservation in Artesia and reduce the need for barnyard manure fertilizers each spring.

Some of the highest yielding wheatland milo in the vicinity of Artesia was grown by W. B. Wilbanks this year on R. M. Sallee's farm. An estimated yield of 4,000 pounds of grain is expected. The milo rows are almost level from one end to the other and was watered from both ends.
