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# Mahone By 6-4, Bonds Carry 10-1

(Doc) Mahone was elected of Artesia by a vote of 4 to 4 over D. D. Archer biennial municipal election while the hospital bond carried by a vote of nearly 10 to 1.

Mahone polled 471 votes by unofficial count to 296 for Archer to succeed Mayor Emery Carper. All incumbent members of the Artesia City Council and Police Judge J. D. Josey were re-elected to office.

The unofficial count showed Judge Josey polled 457 votes in the four wards to 294 by George W. Johnson.

In the four-way race for alderman in the third ward, the only contest in which there were more than two candidates, Councilman Fred Brainard was re-elected, polling 404 votes to 177 for Vernon Bryan, 114 for Marvin H. Sanders, and 23 for Carl Wiese.

The only other contests were in the first and fourth wards. Frank Smith, incumbent, was re-elected councilman from the first ward by a vote of 542 over Mark T. Walters, who polled 161, while Councilman H. D. (Dude) Dunn was re-elected in the fourth ward 458 to 227 over Louie Burch.

Walter Nugent, alderman in the second ward, who was running unopposed for the full four-year term was given a complimentary vote of 589, topping the election.

In the same ward, Ralph Pitt, who was running for the unexpired two years of the term of the late W. H. Gilmore, was given a complimentary vote of 582. He was appointed to serve until the election by the council after the death of Mr. Gilmore.

In the hospital bond election, votes by wards and totals were: For the bond issue 119, 41, 169, 106, 435; against the bond issue 10, 3, 29, 14, 56.

For Mayor — Mahone, 142, 45, 166, 118, 471; Archer, 60, 39, 120, 77, 296.

For Alderman first ward — Smith, 166, 55, 178, 143, 542; Walters, 29, 23, 79, 30, 161.

For alderman second ward — Nugent, four-year term, 166, 63, 204, 149, 587; Pitt, two-year term, 166, 71, 203, 142, 582.

For alderman third ward — Wiese, 7, 0, 11, 5, 23; Brainard, 131, 43, 126, 104, 404; Sanders, 20, 12, 56, 26, 114; Bryan, 34, 20, 85, 38, 177.

For alderman fourth ward — Dunn, 127, 48, 162, 121, 458; Burch 62, 27, 92, 46, 227.

For police judge — Josey, 140, 49, 152, 116, 457; Johnson, 60, 35, 125, 74, 294.

The \$90,000 in bonds voted by qualified electors who paid 1945 taxes will go towards the erection of a badly needed addition to the hospital, the total cost of which it is estimated will cost at least \$130,000. The remaining \$40,000 will have to be obtained from other sources.

It has been pointed out that the present hospital is far from adequate to meet the needs of the community at this time and that as Artesia continues to grow the situation would become more acute, were it not for the 30-bed addition.

### Artesia Community Hall Is Proposed

Suggestion, which if carried out would eventually provide for one of its greatest needs, a community hall, has been advanced here this week.

Mayor Emery Carper in a brief speech before the Artesia Chamber of Commerce, emphasized the need for such a hall as one of Artesia's needs. He pointed out that the community center where banquets and dinners can be held is a necessity.

Some funds have been raised here for a youth center. It has been hoped for sometime that such a center could be provided. It is believed that if an adequate community center were constructed that it could serve all these purposes. It is also believed that it would be in use most of the nights of the week.

Many cities have constructed large city halls and placed in these large auditoriums. These, of course, can be used for dances and meetings, but they do not serve for the banquets or dinners.

But on several occasions recently there has been a desire to accommodate as many as 300 at a banquet and that cannot be done in Artesia with the present facilities.

In one nearby city the Woman's Club has provided the Woman's Pipe Line building. This not only has a real large auditorium where meetings can be held, but it has a fine, large dining room in the basement where dinners and banquets can be served to 400 to 500.

If all of the various groups here would unite in raising funds to construct and erect such a building it is believed that ample funds could be raised; that these would be available when the building materials are obtainable; and that such a center could not only serve the adults but the youths as well.

### Thompson Resigns as Athletic Coach at Artesia High School

Alan Thompson said Wednesday he had resigned verbally as an Artesia High School athletic coach, effective at the end of the current school year.

However, he said, he plans to continue teaching in the school system here, but not in the capacity of athletic coach.

At the same time Thompson said spring football training will end Friday, in order to clear the air for the field and track team, preparatory for the district meet to be held in Artesia April 27.

### Plans Speeded up for Music Festival in Artesia Next Week

Members of the Artesia Lions Club, which is sponsoring a music festival and field and track meet here this month, are concentrating more at this time on the music program, for it is to be Saturday of next week, April 13, whereas the field events will not be until April 27.

However, committees are hard at work on both programs, as well as an amateur contest for high school students, to be held on Thursday, April 18, and a dance on the evening of the track and field meet, both of which were planned for the purpose of raising funds for the district meets.

The program for the music festival and clinic Saturday of next week calls for mass band at Central School from 10 to 11:30 o'clock in the morning, with a music clinic from 11:30 o'clock to noon.

There then will be a recess until 1 o'clock, when the orchestra features will start, to run until 2:30 o'clock. From that time to 5 o'clock there will be more mass band features. In the meantime, from 3:15 to 4:45 o'clock there will be baton twirling.

### Artesia Pipe Line Buys New Mexico Stock

In a stock transaction effective Monday, April 1, the New Mexico Pipe Line Company became the property of the Artesia Pipe Line Company. The properties include about 107 miles of pipelines, including gathering lines.

Stock of the New Mexico Pipe Line Company was owned by the Continental Oil Company and Flynn, Welch & Yates, whereas the stockholders of the Artesia Pipe Line Company, purchasers, are the same as the stockholders of the New Mexico Asphalt & Refining Company, which the lines are to serve.

The pipeline runs from Artesia through the old Artesia pool, and to the Loco Hills, Grayburg-Jackson, and Square Lake pools.

Operation of the new lines acquired by the Artesia Pipe Line Company is to be in conjunction with the lines previously owned by that company.

Consideration for the transaction was not disclosed.

### School Bond Election Is Called For May 7

The Artesia Board of Education last Thursday called an election for Tuesday, May 7, for voting on a proposition to issue \$271,000 in bonds to expand the school system.

The resolution for the election was passed by the board, after canvassing a petition signed by 206 bona fide signers, asking that the election be called.

The board announced the polling place will be the Artesia city hall.

Under the law, it was explained, such a petition must be signed by at least 10 per cent as many persons as the number of votes cast at the last general election for candidates for governor and within the same political subdivision.

All signers must, however, be qualified voters and be taxpayers.

### Effect of CPA Regulations on Housing Is Unknown as Yet

Just how many new homes can be erected here or constructed under the new regulations of the Civilian Production Administration remains to be determined, but it is believed that most of the houses now under construction can be completed.

Some weeks ago a survey of Artesia proper showed more than 50 houses under erection here. Many of these, of course, have now been completed. Other new residences have been started and in many instances are nearing completion.

Many of those, who have planned to erect new homes, are ex-servicemen and under the rules and regulations can secure materials and construct their homes. It is also expected those desiring to build homes for veterans will be able to do this during the coming weeks.

But in the meantime the building work has continued here with the business dwellings started being continued.

It's Patriotic To Eat More Spuds, Chickens

It's patriotic these days to serve less bread, but more potatoes and chicken. Here's why, the USDA declares:

Potatoes are the traditional substitute for bread, and U.S. potato supplies are currently plentiful. Wheat is needed to feed the desperately hungry people in Europe, and Americans can get along nicely by eating a little less bread. Ingenious cooks can use spuds in many ways to save bread.

Chicken is good food and eating it will help poultrymen who can't get enough feed. A lot of red meat and wheat is needed for Europe. If Americans eat more chicken, less wheat will be consumed as livestock and poultry feed, and more wheat and red meat can be exported.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson says: "The food situation in many foreign countries demands the direct use of grain, principally wheat, for human food to save millions of people from hunger and starvation in the next few months. The emergency developing in poultry is caused in part by the need to conserve wheat for this purpose. The consequent shortage of feed comes at a time when storage holdings of all poultry are at record levels and when current supplies of broilers and fryers are moving into consumer channels in record

numbers from major producing areas.

With current freezer stocks of poultry amounting to more than 356 million pounds and with public freezer occupancy now about 83 per cent of capacity, the need for increased consumption and home canning or storage of chickens for future use is plain."

Poultry Prices Are Supported by U.S. Government Program

The government price-support program now in effect for dressed chickens is designed to help poultrymen market their chickens at a fair price in the present feed emergency.

Under the program, the government will buy dressed chickens from cooperatives, dealers, and processors at prices designed to reflect a U.S. acreage farm price for live chickens of not less than 90 per cent of parity. Currently, this will mean support for live poultry at a U.S. average farm price of 183 cents a pound, with variations for type, weight, and location. No support, however, will be given for young chickens

weighing less than 3 1/2 pounds alive (broilers).

The public is being asked to eat lots of chicken. The faster poultry is consumed, the more feed will be saved, and the better prices poultry producers will receive.

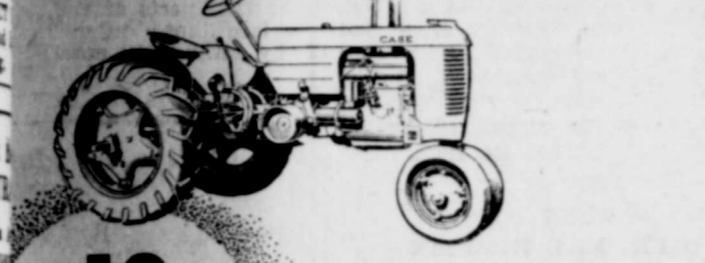

**Atomic Residue Is Radioactive Currier Has Souvenir of Test**

George E. Currier has received a sample of fused sand from the test site west of Alamogordo of the first atomic bomb, which he and Dr. H. H. Nininger have proved is radioactive.

It was received from his son-in-law, Jano W. Haley, who worked on the development of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos.

The sample is enclosed in a metal desk paperweight, the top of which is glass, so the sample of fused sand is visible, but cannot be touched.

In determining that it was radioactive, Currier and Dr. Nininger placed a tightly wrapped film, sealed against rays of light, on a desk. On the film package was laid a key and on top of it, the paperweight, glass side down and on top of the key.

After the three objects had been undisturbed for some time, the film was developed, and on it, plainly defined, was the print of the key, around which was a halo of light, caused by the radioactivity of the fused sand.

An interesting sidelight on the sample is the fact Currier was one of the few people in Artesia who saw the flash from the release of the first atomic bomb in the history of the world, the same one which fused the sand he has received from his brother-in-law.

Awakened, possibly by a seismic impulse from the site, Currier looked out his west window from his bed and saw the sky lighted as the tremendous detonation was released and released light and a cloud for many miles into the sky. The light was seen over the Sacramento Mountains.

And a second interesting sidelight came about a few days later, when Mr. and Mrs. Haley were visiting her father. He told them about having seen the flash in the west, which was vaguely described in the press as an explosion of ammunition. Haley, who was employed at Los Alamos merely smiled and made a polite answer to the effect that it must have been interesting.

It was not until after the two atomic bombs were released in Japan and the secrecy of the project was made public did the Artesia man realize what he had witnessed and that his son-in-law had known all along what it was.

**Cull Loafers From Flock to Cut Egg Cost**

Cull, cull, cull might well become the accepted watchwords of New Mexico poultrymen who expect to break even on their 1946 operations," according to E. E. Anderson, poultry specialist with the Extension Service of New Mexico A. & M. College.

And besides assuring income, the specialist adds that a 13 per cent reduction in laying flocks has been asked in order to conserve scarce, precious feedstuffs for near starving people overseas.

Anderson points to the results of experimental work which show that when only a third of the flock is laying, it takes eight pounds of feed to produce a dozen eggs. With half the flock laying, the feed requirements for a dozen eggs drop to five and a half pounds, while when all but a third of the hens lay, it takes but four pounds to produce that dozen eggs.

"Any careful poultryman in

New Mexico should be able to have 66 2/3 per cent of his flock laying now," Anderson said.

Besides being wasteful of feed, Anderson said that the feeds costs of producing eggs from a flock which has a high percentage of loafers should be considered.

The specialist figures that with feed at \$4 a hundred, it costs 32 cents a dozen for feed alone to produce eggs in that one-third laying flock, and just half as much per dozen when two-thirds of the hens lay. And it takes the profits of several layers to take care of one boarder.

"Regardless of its source, it's poor business not only from a dollars and cents point of view but also from the humanitarian angle to pour expensive feed into the crops of hens which don't produce," concluded the poultryman.

**Fruit Growers Urged to Apply Dormant Spray**

New Mexico fruit growers are urged by Extension Horticulturist L. C. Gibbs of New Mexico A. & M. College to apply a dormant spray to apples, plums, and peaches early this spring. The best time, according to Gibbs, to apply the spray is when the apple buds are in the green tip stage and after the temperature is above 40 degrees.

Dormant sprays can be expected to control European red mite, San Jose scale, apple red bug, peach leaf curl, and, when a poison is added, rosy aphid on apples.

The spray recommended by the horticulturist for general use on apples and plums is a 4 per cent oil emulsion, which can either be mixed at home or purchased commercially. When bought, the mixture should be used as directed, but in all cases thorough coverage is needed to control the red mite.

On peaches, a combination of 3 per cent oil and a 6-8-100 Bordeaux mixture is recommended. To be effective against leaf curl, the spray should be applied when

## Extension Service Will Ask Boys and Girls to Help Farmers Produce Food

New Mexico's boys and girls 14 to 18 years old have an opportunity to pitch in and help with a job in 1946 that will prove just as vital as any wartime tasks young Americans were asked to help with.

"This job," said Woody Wilson, assistant state supervisor for emergency farm labor with the Agricultural Extension Service, "is to help farmers and ranchers produce more food than ever in 1946 with less help. Farmers worked long hours during war years to produce food for victory, but during that time they had from two to four thousand prisoners of war to assist them."

The farm labor man says that the POW's are now gone, along with other temporary workers, and its up to the 14-18 year group in towns and cities to lend a hand if the state is to do its part in keeping thousands of innocent people from starving to death.

In 1944 victory farm volunteers drove tractors and combines and helped materially in harvesting the wheat crop in Quay, Curry, and Roosevelt Counties. They also shocked many acres of feed crops and assisted with the broom corn harvest. In Otero County they picked most of the cherry crop and helped harvest the vegetables grown in the Penasco and other valleys around Mayhill.

Other volunteers picked 90 per cent of the pea crop in Socorro County and the green bean crop in Roosevelt County, while in Quay County 90 per cent of the wheat, bean, and potato workers

were boys and girls of the victory farm volunteers.  
The same kind of help is needed in 1946. Plans being formulated now call for the use of some of the volunteers near their homes during the summer months. This will involve transporting them daily to and from their jobs. In other areas, they will be housed in camps and used in areas away from their homes.

Wilson, an Artesian, who has just returned to the Extension Service after two years in the Navy, says that camps will be set up under strict supervision with organized work and recreation periods and all the other camp activities that go with camp life. Camps will offer boys and girls an outing, healthful work, and a chance to make money at the same time, he said.

Wilson plans soon to start visiting the schools of the state to enroll young people before summer vacation starts. In the meantime, county agricultural agents are contacting farmers to determine what their needs may be.

"Only through the full cooperation of farmers needing labor can this program help them in producing and harvesting their full quota of crops for 1946." Wilson said.

Stooping is the cause of much washday fatigue, yet most of it is unnecessary research studies among more than 400 farm homes show.

The study, made in Illinois, and reported by Miss Veda A. Strong, Agricultural Extension Service of New Mexico A. & M. College, showed that in doing the family laundry homemakers often stoop to sort clothes on the floor and again to pick them up from the floor. They also stoop over tubs, washing machines, and clothes baskets...

All the work of sorting, removing stains, and starching can be done at a large high table or counter that allows the worker to stand erect without strain. If there is no table that can be used for this purpose, one can easily be improvised by placing boards across trestles or sawhorses...

Washing or rinsing can be done with little stooping if washing machines, tubs, and baskets are raised to a comfortable height, and if the worker uses a sturdy stick to lift clothes out of suds or hot rinse water instead of bending over and lifting them out by hand...

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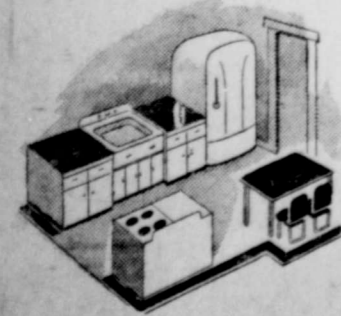

Mrs. Marvin Yates, Jr., a Rotary Ann, and Mr. Yates, a Rotarian, gave an interesting account at the weekly Rotary Club luncheon Tuesday of their recent visit to Fulton, Mo., the birthplace and boyhood home of Mr. Yates, at the time Winston Churchill and President Truman were presented honorary degrees at Westminster College.

But in spite of being jostled about and peered at and frowned at by Secret Service and FBI men, Mrs. Yates was pleased that Churchill passed within a few feet of her in the hall and that he smiled as their eyes met.

In his part of the program, Mr. Yates said Churchill emphasized the need for a strong world organization, strong enough to keep any one strong nation in line.

## Conservation Work of Local Farmers Will Be Aired on Monday

Conservation work accomplished by Roy Angell and L. J. Lorang, Eddy County farmers, will be described on the radio program, "Soil Conservation Reports," at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening, April 8, over station KOB.

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## Rierson Warns Wind Erosion May Be Serious

Indications are that unless emergency tillage measures are carried out in various parts of the state, wind erosion may become serious. So warned County Agent Dallas Rierson, who said that recent windy days have reminded many eastsiders of the disastrous dust bowl days. Lack of rainfall last year is blamed for the condition.

Rierson points out that experience has shown that leaving stubble and listing at right angles to the prevailing direction of the wind, or on the contour, are the best methods of preventing soil blowing. However, last year's drought was so severe that there is no stubble. So land owners are left with the only one means of stopping the blowing, providing of a rough, cloddy surface. It is essential, however, that the listing be done before soil blowing starts or as soon as small areas begin to blow.

Rierson says the type of implement used in emergency tillage is not important, but that the type of surface produced by the implement is extremely important. What is needed is a rough, cloddy surface until vegetation can be re-established.

If the land is very sloping, contour listing is generally best unless, because of the slope, the furrows would extend almost in the same direction as the prevailing wind.

The county agent said listing is not a cure-all, only a temporary preventive at its best. The only real solution is vegetative cover, which may require the seeding of what was intended to be wheat land this year to feed crops.
