#### **Our Great Need**

ONE OF ARTESIA'S GREATEST NEEDS is a community center — a building where banquets and dinners can be served; dances can be held; programs and speakings can be presented; and a general meeting place.

Such a building could not only serve the needs of the adults but it could serve the needs of the youth and provide for them a center where they could hold their dances, programs and their entertainments.

It could serve as a center for scouting activities, girls and boys; it could serve for civic clubs and civic group meetings; it could provide a place for farm meetings, farmers' dinners and banquets. It could fill a thousand and one needs here.

Many communities have them. They provided

If we ever have one, we will have to provide it. The day may come when we feel such a structure is of sufficient importance that we will include it in public funds. We have not done that gift. up to the present time.

Roswell has such a center. A building adequate not only to accomodate a record crowd for meetings on the first floor but a dining room in the basement which permits the serving of 400 to 500

Artesia needs such a center. The only way we will ever have it is to provide it.

We provide funds for our city hall; we donate Serving All funds for the erection of church buildings; we vote taxes to provide school buildings and for hospitals; we contribute funds for the erection of Legion homes; we hold entertainments to raise funds to build a Masonic temple; we pay in cash to build a country club.

All of these are needed. There is no question about that yet in all of these what have we provided for our boys and girls? It is true they attend the schools. They were built for them. It is true they attend the churches. But on the whole we have not built anything

for them.

But in Artesia it is possible for us to erect a community center - a building devoted to our youth, to the adults and to the use of our citizens. Such a building could be an elaborate affair or it could be a less expensive structure.

But it should be well built and constructed to serve our needs now and in the weeks and months and years to come Such a structure could be built with far less

effort than we think. Such a building could be provided with all participating in its construction. Such a building is needed, badly needed.

If each of the various civic groups and movements here would agree to participate in the providing of the funds for the construction of such a building - it could be provided. Funds for paying for such a building could be

raised through giving of dinners; presenting programs and entertainments; and the giving of various shows, etc.

Attendance at the events given here has clearly indicated that the public enjoys such events. Attendance shows the public desires these be given.

Every one of them makes money. Why couldn't each of our various groups pledge a set sum to the construction of such a community building in Artesia and then choose their own method of raising those funds.

If the Woman's Club in Roswell raised the funds and paid for their large building used almost as a community center, why couldn't all of our organizations join hands in such a program and provide this great need for our community? -O. E. P.

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

#### **Atomic Residue Is Radioactive Currier Has Souvenir of Test**

George E. Currier has received a sample of fused sand from the test site west of Alamagordo of the first atomic bomb, which he and Dr. H. H. Nininger have proved is radioactive.

It was received from his son-in-law, Jano W. Haley, who worked on the development of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos The sample is enclosed in a metal desk paperweight, the top

of which is glass, so the sample of fused sand is visible, but cannot

In determining that it was radioactive, Currier and Dr. Nininger placed a tightly wrapped film, sealed against rays of light, on a desk. On the film package was laid a key and on top of it, the paperweight, glass side down and on top of the key.

After the three objects had been undisturbed for some time, the film was developed, and on it, plainly defined, was the print of the key, around which was a halo of light, caused by the radioactivity

An interesting sidelight on the sample is the fact Currier was one of the few people in Artesia who saw the flash from the release of the first atomic bomb in the history of the world, the same one which fused the sand he has received from his brother-in-law.

Awakened, possibly by a sesmic impulse from the site, Currier looked out his west window from his bed and saw the sky lighted as the tremendous detonation was released and released light and a cloud for many miles into the sky. The light was seen over the

And a second interesting sidelight came about a few days later, A sound motion picture was one when Mr. and Mrs. Haley were visiting her father. He told them about having seen the flash in the west, which was vaguely described in the press as an explosion of ammunition. Haley, who was employed at Los Alamos merely smiled and made a polite answer to the effect that it must have been interesting.

It was not until after the two atomic bombs were released in Japan and the secrecy of the project was made public did the Artesia man realize what he had witnessed and that his son-in-law had known all along what it was.

> Fruit Growers Urged to Apply Dormant Spray

New Mexico fruit growers are arged by Extension Horticulturist L. C. Gibbs of New Mexico A. & M. College to apply a dormant spray to apples, plums, and peaches early this spring. The best time, according to Gibbs, to apply ne spray is when the apple buds are in the green tip stage and after the temperature is above 40

Dormant sprays can be expected to control European red mite, San Jose scale, apple red bug, peach leaf curl, and, when a poison is added, rosy aphis on

The spray recommended by the horticulturist for general use on apples and plums is a 4 per cent il emulsion, which can either be mixed at home or purchased commercially. When bought, the mixture should be used as directed but in all cases thorough coverage
