Less than 50 per cent of the registered voters and only about 10 per cent of the citizens were sufficiently interested in the election to take the trouble to go to the polls and ballot.

BUILDING MATERIAL MEN, contractors and builders declare now that the building situation is worse now than ever.

The new government regulations halting all building except that falling into certain classes and homes for ex-service-men is to be halted.
