Patrons Urged To Vote Bonds

1945 and this includes husbands and wives. The city hall has been designated by the school board as the voting place for the election and the polls are to open at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning and to close at 6 o'clock that same evening.

The hope was voiced that every voter eligible to ballot would go to the polls and cast their ballot on Tuesday. The voting of the bonds for the construction of additional school classrooms is necessary and essential in order to accommodate the growth in the enrollment in the local schools, it was pointed out.

The proposal calls for one new 12-classroom building and a combined cafeteria, auditorium, and gymnasium; new rooms at the Carver School building; two new rooms at the Oilfield School; a shop for the high school; and a combined music room and cafeteria at the high school for use of the high school, junior high school and Park School.

At the present time with conditions crowded some makeshift classrooms are being used because these are all that are available. And the situation, it has been pointed out, will be worse next year if the bond issue is not approved and the additional facilities can not be provided.

Carlsbad Runs Away With District Meet

Carlsbad took all first place honors at the district No. 5 track and field meet at Artesia Saturday, making high score of 50 2/3 points winning the half-mile relay, and placing the high score individual for the day.

Third place went to T. Randolph of Hobbs, who took first in both 200-yard low hurdles and half-mile run for a total of 10 points. Points by schools: Carlsbad 50 2/3, NMMI 36, Hobbs 21 1/3, Dexter 12 1/3, Artesia 3, Roswell 2 2/3. Hope, Lake Arthur, and Monument failed to score.

Top Golf Engineer Building Nine New Holes

Dirt is being moved this week on the acreage northwest of Artesia at Artesia Gardens, Inc., for the proposed golf course with Ralph (Rab) Plummer of Fort Worth, one of the outstanding golf course engineers in the nation in charge.

Plummer, who has laid out and built what are conceded to be among the finest courses in the nation, started to work Wednesday last week and decided to sell all of the assets, including buildings, equipment and land, and to invest the funds received in stock of Artesia Gardens, Inc., or to distribute it among the members who were in good standing last Jan. 1, or to be held in the treasury of the club, as might be determined by the board of directors. A resolution passed in taking the action pointed out that the property

should be sold for the best price obtainable. By further resolution, the Artesia Golf Club members voted to lease from Artesia Gardens, Inc., the golf course, which is now in the process of construction, at terms to be agreed upon. A by-laws committee has been named by the board of directors of Artesia Gardens, Inc., to draw up by-laws for a new country club association. Upon their completion and presentation to the board, and if accepted, application will be made by the new association for lease of the golf course, and the proposed tennis courts, croquet court, clubhouse, and other recreational installations.

On the by-laws committee are Neil B. Watson, Walter B. Luck, Bill Linell, Bob Bourland, Bill Bullock, J. S. Ward, Howard Whitson, and Jack Spratt. It has been pointed out that although it is not possible at this time to obtain materials and equipment for the proposed country club building, the basement is being excavated and it may be that arrangements may be made to put in the locker and shower facilities, using the basement rooms temporarily until the entire club building can be built.

The board of directors of Artesia Gardens, Inc., has also appointed a membership committee, headed by Hugh Kiddy, who is to name 10 other members. They plan to strive in the near future to round out the membership of 200. Kiddy stressed that the organization will be closed at 200 members. During the last week response has been better than expected, Kiddy said. Other committee chairmen named by the board to work with Plummer are Bill Bullock, greens, and B. E. Spencer, irrigation.

The quality of "Rab" Plummer's work in golf course construction was disclosed in a feature sports page article by Amos Melton in The Fort Worth Star-Telegram last week. The article says Plummer at one time was a golf pro, but that he drifted into construction work. After working on a number of courses, he was engaged by the Air Corps in growing grass for air fields on the Rio Grande during the war. He estimates he has planted and nursed along hundreds of acres, the article says. More recently he had complete charge of putting in the new course at the Army's Ashburn General Hospital at McKinney, Tex., where he used German prisoners.

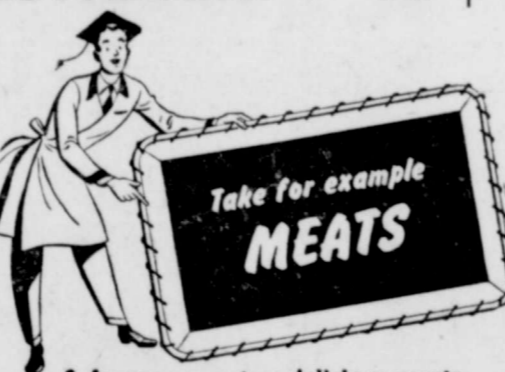

Meanings of Ford Labels Are Explained

Enriched—restored—fortified—are words often seen on food labels these days. Many homemakers think these words all mean the same thing. But actually, each one has a different meaning, explains Miss Edith M. Woodward, extension nutritionist at New Mexico A. & M. College.

"Enriched" is a word properly used only for bread and flour, the nutritionist says. Definite standards have been set up by law as to just how much of certain food values must be added. Iron and two B vitamins—niacin and thiamine—are put back in about the amounts lost in milling white flour from the whole grain. A third B vitamin—riboflavin—is added in even larger amounts than are found in whole wheat. Standards are also set up for calcium and vitamin D, though addition of these is voluntary.

Under War Food Order No. 1, all bakers' white bread and rolls must be enriched. This will apply to bread baked with the new 80 per cent extraction flour, so that Americans daily bread will be even better than the enriched bread now eaten. Enrichment of white flour is still voluntary in most states, but the flour must meet government standards if it is labeled "enriched."

In "restored" foods, nutrients originally present in the food, but lost in processing, are put back. Breakfast cereals are sometimes restored to the whole grain levels by the addition of thiamine, niacin and iron. However, this is voluntary on the part of the manufacturers.

When foods are "fortified," nutrients that were not originally present are added. Almost all margarine is fortified with vitamin A. Milk is sometimes fortified with vitamin D—which the body needs to make the best use of the calcium and phosphorus in milk.

Representative Frank A. Alford Seeks Re-election

Frank A. Alford, present member of the State Legislature from Eddy County and who has completed his first term, has announced as a candidate to succeed himself. He was in Artesia on last Thursday for a brief visit with

friends and in the interest of his candidacy for re-election. He has filed as a candidate for state representative from Eddy County and seeks nomination at the June primary on the Democratic ticket. Representative Alford has been a resident of New Mexico for 29 years and has been a resident of Carlsbad for the past 12 year. He is in the employment of the United States Potash Company there. During his first term in the State Legislature he was chairman of the committee on mines and he was a member of the judiciary, labor, railroads, and oil and gas committees.

EGGS AND POULTRY APPEAR PLENTIFUL

Priorities for Farm Buildings Delegated to ACA

Responsibility for authorizing construction and repair of farm buildings—including dwellings—and issuing priorities for farm housing has been delegated to ACA committees. The job of granting these authorizations and priorities thus is placed in the hands of those directly concerned with maintaining farm production, the Civilian Production Administration points out. Authorizations are to be granted under the Veterans'

Housing Program. Designed to divert critical material to veterans' housing, this order forbids the beginning of construction or repair work without authorization, except dwellings costing \$400 or less or other farm construction costing \$1,000 or less or for reconstruction after fire, flood or similar disasters.

Here's how an application for authorization for farm construction will work:

(1) The prospective builder will file an application with his county ACA committee.

(2) The application, together with county committee recommendations, will be forwarded to the State AAA committee.

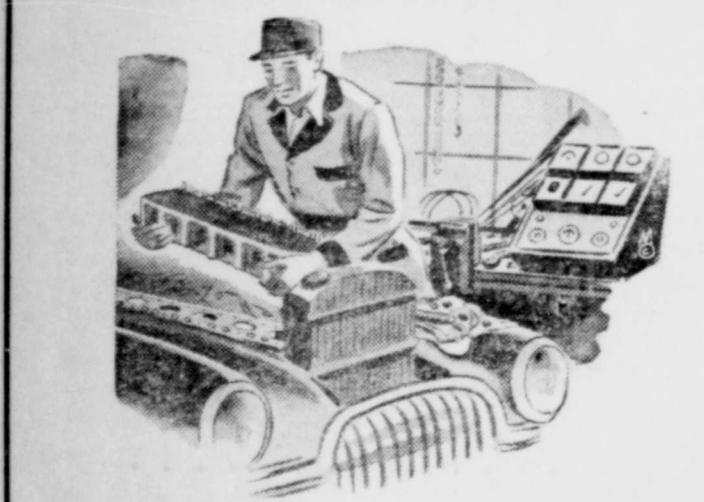
(3) The state committee will approve or disapprove the application on the basis of essentiality. Priority ratings on housing materials may be issued in certain cases.

(4) The applicant will be notified of the committee's decision. If the authorization is granted, he will be sent an appropriate placard to be posted on the construction site. The state committee will take final action in all cases except those of dwellings costing more than \$10,000 for a single family house or \$17,000 for a two-family structure. These will be referred to the regional director of the Field Service Branch.
