### **Enlarged** Program

TT HAD BEEN the hope of many school patrons, and still is for that matter, that the musical program at the Junior and Senior high school could be enlarged and expanded in the months ahead.

It is still hoped, we say, that this can prove to be the case.

Many were hopeful that the orchestra and band practices could be worked into the regular schedule instead of having to be carried on before and after regular school hours.

Under the arrangements for the past two years parts of both orchestra and band practices were held outside of regular school hours.

Many have expressed the hope that there would be added to the musical program high school quartets, both boys and girls; dramatic reading, declamation and other events in the non-athletic activities of the high school programs.

But whether these can and will be done remains to be determined.

School officials have announced that the present instrumental music director is being reved of his duties because the budgeted teachers does not provide for the employment of a full time director. They have emphasized the fact that this job must be combined with a teaching job and such a director must either be able to teach mathematics or English in addition to being instructor in band and orchestra. That, of course, is an administrative problem which school administrators and board members must solve. But we can not forget or overlook the fact that parents have invested large sums in musical instruments; that these instruments were purchased because they felt that the musical training would be continued; and that the school board has a responsibility to these parents-one of providing musical instruction for those boys and girls who have purchased musical instruments at the suggestion of the school officials under the belief that the musical instruction would be continued.

This new building will house probably 480 students, still leaving about 560 to be cared for at the high school. Everyone, of course, is familiar with the in- they also are better observers of crease in population in Artesia. They know of the lack of houses and living facilities. It is a pretty well know fact that Artesia has doubled in population in the past five years. That means the population or enrollment in the school has doubled in this same period. Yet we have not doubled the facilities for taking care of these pupils.

This fact, we say, can not be forgotten or ignored.

The explanation has been given that budgeted teachers means the number of teachers employed and that the law only permits so many teachers. And with the growth and expansion future instrumental music instructors must teach high school subjects in order to accomodate all the students in classroom work. We do not understand all of this. If we could have full time instrumental instructor for two years why it can't be continued. Maybe we just can't grasp the situation or maybe we are not sufficiently posted on the school laws.

But anyway, we are advised that is the case. Nevertheless, we are still hoping that a solu tion to the problem can be found and that a well rounded non-athletic program of activities, including a full time instrumental instructor, can be provided and maintained for those children not participating in the school athletics .-- O. Treatment of Seeds Insures **Better Crops** With spring here, it is time for New Mexico farmers to start thinking about treating their planting seeds, according to C. P. Wayne, extension agronomist at New Mexico A. & M. College. Wayne claims that treatment of seed grain will insure as good a crop as possible and will also help to control most seed-borne diseases. Control of crop diseases is very important right now, as the world needs every bushel of grain that can be produced this year. It is good insurance, the agrono mist explains, to treat all seed wheat, oats, barley and sorghums every year. Treatment not only protects seed from organisms in the soil that cause rot and seedling blights, but it also improves the sun's light will cover a greater the stand, yield and quality of the grain The recommended treatment is a mercury dust for seed wheat, oats, barley and the sorghums. 

When foods are "fortified," nu trients that were not original present are added. Almost all margarine is fortified with vitamin A. Milk is sometimes forti fied with vitamin D-which the body needs to make the best use of the calcium and phosphorou
