Forehand Tells How to Conserve Wheat for World

In an effort to assist Eddy county in making its maximum contribution to the national food conservation effort, Roy Forehand, county emergency food program manager, has made public a savings program for bakers and food distributors.

"On other occasions," Forehand said, "we have appealed to consumers and operators of public eating places and in an effort to help them carry out appeals out we have offered lists of specified food conservation suggestions. To

round out the program—which is a responsibility of all of us—we are now suggesting a similar group of actions designed to help bakers and food handlers." Like previous recommendations, the following list of measures that may be taken to increase the amount of food the United States will be able to send to the starvation-stricken countries of the world has been endorsed by the President's Famine Emergency Committee.

The baking industry of Eddy county can: Reduce by at least 10 per cent the weight of all bread and bakery products.

Feature smaller loaves of smaller weight and size, wherever practicable.

Slice bread thinner, thus getting more slices per loaf.

Save on flour and fats by avoiding spoilage and waste.

Food distributors and manufacturers were asked by Forehand to consider the practicality of the following measures to meet the crisis.

In advertising and salesmanship to push the use of alternate and currently plentiful foods such as poultry, eggs, potatoes, fish.

Assist consumers in their conservation efforts by providing

recipes calling for the use of the more plentiful foods.

Tighten and quicken food distribution channels thus making possible greater food conservation and less food waste.

Encourage consumers to conserve and prevent the waste of food and to reuse food fats and salvage waste fats.

To use more plentiful ingredients in the manufacture of food items in the place of wheat, fats and oils.

Manager Forehand announced that representatives of the baking and distributing industries of Eddy county will be contacted and asked to offer further suggestions designed to effect food savings.

Early indications, according to Forehand, show that bakers and distributors generally are preparing to place in effect these and other economies.

CCC Announces Premium Wheat Price to Be Paid

The Commodity Credit Corporation announced that 30 cents per bushel in addition to the market price will be paid at the time of settlement on any wheat contract of sale if wheat is delivered on or before May 25, provided date of settlement selected by the producer is on or before June 15. If settlement date selected is after July 15, or if delivery is made after May 25, no premium is offered by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Roy Forehand, chairman of the Eddy county ACA, said that the emergency wheat program was initiated to speed the movement of wheat off farms for the relief of the current famine emergency abroad. It is necessary that wheat be made available through markets either by direct sale or by delivery to the Commodity Credit Corporation under the program. The contract of sale is assurance that the government will pay the market price as of the date the individual chooses in accordance with the provisions of the offer.

The program was put into effect in order to give farmers an opportunity to receive a higher price in the event the market price advances between now and March 31, 1947. Payments under this program may be reported as income, for income tax purposes, for the year in which received.

Forehand urges all farmers who have wheat to dispose of it as early as possible, as wheat and wheat products constitute the principle diet of hungry people abroad.

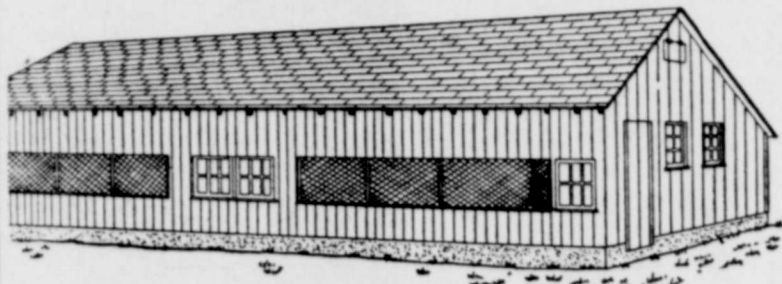
PRACTICAL FARM BUILDINGS Poultry Laying House

By W. J. Dryden, WNU Farm Editor.

The type of poultry house constructed on the farm should be determined upon the basis of economy in construction as well as adaptability to the use to which it will be put.

If eggs are to be produced for home consumption only, a portable type of colony laying house may be advisable. If eggs are to be produced for market, the continuous type, such as the Missouri house illustrated in this article, will prove excellent.

Regardless of the type of house, it must be economical to construct,

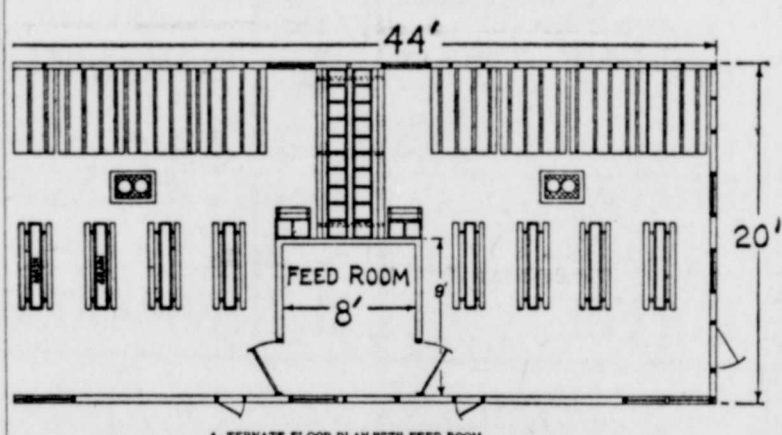


Missouri Type Laying House.

be well insulated as protection against heat and cold, well ventilated and dry to insure the health of the hens; must be adequately lighted, can be operated with the minimum of labor and it must be easily cleaned. In most cases it is advisable to build in sections, to aid in separation of young pullets from old hens.

Plenty of floor space must be provided. White Leghorns and other light breeds should be provided with 3 1/2 square feet per bird. For the heavy breeds, such as Rhode Island Reds, 4 square feet of floor space is necessary.

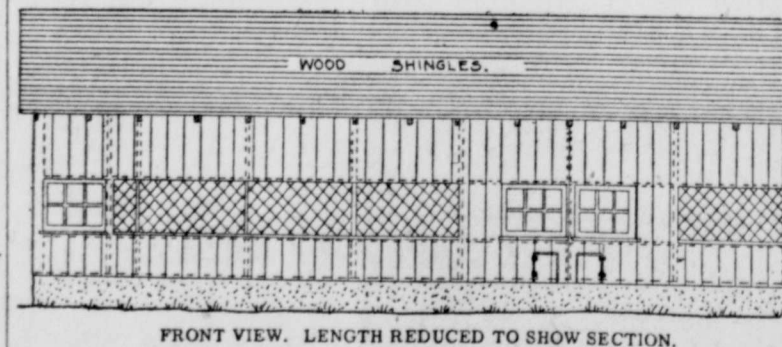
The importance of insulation should not be overlooked. Not only will proper insulation prevent excessive heat or cold, but will aid in control of dampness, which is usually caused by the condensation of

moisture on the cold floor, wall or ceiling. The type of insulation will be largely determined by local costs. The poultry house need not be elaborate or expensive, but to be economical and durable, it must be well constructed. Foundations and floors of concrete are durable, rat-proof, sanitary and easily cleaned.

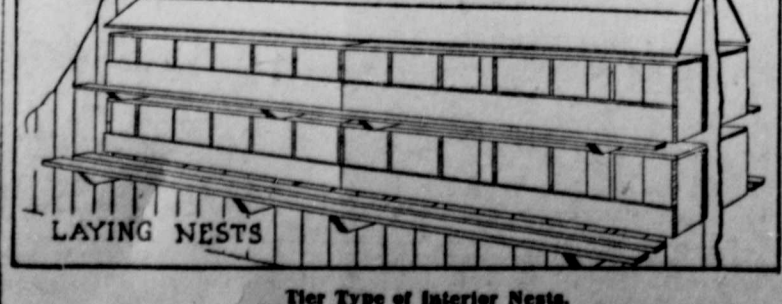
The size and depth of the foundation wall and footings will be determined on the size of building and soil conditions. In most cases, for a one story house, a foundation wall of 8 inches will be sufficient. The poultry house floor line should be about 10 inches above the outside grade line and should be four to five inches thick over a six to eight-inch sand and gravel or cinder fill.

The importance of the roof must be considered. When composition types are used, provide matched roof sheathing. Use a good quality, and lay according to the manufacturer's specification. When wood shingles are used, common rough boards can be spaced 1 1/2 inches apart.

In damp sections of the country it may be advisable to use under-floor heat. Experiments at Washington State Experiment station

New Varieties Of Vegetables Recommended

"Home gardeners who are interested in getting the best from their gardens shouldn't overlook some of the new vegetable varieties," County Agent Dallas Rier-son said, in reviewing gardening prospects for the area.

Among the more recently developed varieties are new tomatoes, bush limas, lettuce and squash.

Pan-American, a new tomato, is a cross between the Marglobe and certain wilt-resistant tomatoes from Peru. Combining the good eating qualities of Marglobe with the wilt-resistance of its South American grandparents, it produces in 100 days from seed and 74 days from plants. It bears heavily—bright red fruit with thick walls, which stand marketing and canning—in ground where Fusarium wilt limits tomato growing.

Pearl Harbor, developed in Hawaii is a tomato much like the Bounty but is resistant to spotted wilt. Its dwarfed plants produce a round, smooth uniform fruit that is scarlet colored.

Fordhook 242, a new bush lima-bean, produces heavier and for a longer time than the regular Fordhook, in spite of extremely hot weather.

Sloboldt, a new non-heading lettuce, was developed by USDA plant breeders at Beltsville, Md. Principal advantage of the new variety is its ability to withstand heat longer than the usual leaf lettuce without going to seed. In quality, Sloboldt is better than Grand Rapids and at least equal to Black Seeded Simpson.

Butternut is a new, late autumn or early winter squash variety that was developed at the University of West Virginia. Immune to the attacks of the squash vine borer, it produces a small, yellowish fruit, which is bottle shaped. While the flesh of the new squash is fine textured and flavored it does not keep as well as the Hubbard.

Rams Consigned To Sale to Have Wool Certified

Rams being consigned to the annual sale sponsored by the New Mexico Wool Growers' Association, the Sheep Sanitary Board, and A. and M. College in Albuquerque Aug. 13-14 will have their wool production certified on staple length.

"We have every reason to believe that this year's rams will be the best ever offered in a New Mexico sale," Ivan Watson, extension livestock specialist and sales manager, said after returning from a visit to consigners.

Watson, Peter Mocho of the Fernandez company, San Mateo, and Prof. P. E. Neale, State College, made up the sale certification committee which visited consigners' breeding establishments, and clipped a lock of wool from

the right hip of each buck accepted for the sale. Just before sale time the stubble growth made will be measured and certification of 12 months' growth made. This growth will be published on the sales sheet by lots.

In addition to the sale of registered range rams which will be held the afternoon of Aug. 13, the first rams will be paraded in full fleece, and then they will be shorn in the ring. Fleeces will be weighed, staple length will be certified on a 12-month basis, and an estimate made of the shrink and clean content of wool.

With this information in hands, prospective buyers will then have an opportunity to place their bids.

The program to stimulate wool exports through payment of four cents per pound to the producer has been extended through Aug. 30, 1947, by the USDA. The program began in November, 1944, it has been responsible for export of 1,884,935 bales.

ORDINANCE NO. 92
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION THREE OF ORDINANCE NO. 48 OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO, TO ESTABLISH THE LICENSE FEES FOR THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS WITHIN THE CITY OF ARTESIA, ON AND AFTER JULY 1st, 1946.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO:

Section One: That Section Three of Ordinance No. 48 of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, adopted and approved the 31st day of May, A. D., 1939, be, and it hereby is amended to read as follows:

"SECTION THREE
On or after July 1, 1946, the license fees for the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be as hereinafter set forth: PROVIDED HOWEVER, that no license shall be issued to any person who shall not, as a conditional precedent, secure a license from the Division of Liquor Control of the Bureau of Revenue of the State of New Mexico as provided by law; and further provided that no license shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation, for the sale of intoxicating liquors if the building or room and the contents thereof, occupied by said person, firm or corporation, in which intoxicating liquors are offered for sale, or displayed, does not conform with the requirements and specifications of this article.

(a) **RETAILERS LICENSE:**
The City Council of the City of Artesia may issue to any person who is the proprietor or owner of any mercantile business, or shall desire to start or continue a business for the sale of alcoholic liquors, a retailers license for the sale of all alcoholic liquors, the fee therefor which shall be charged per annum and which shall be payable in advance, to be as follows:

RETAILERS LICENSE for the sale of all alcoholic liquors \$1500.00
No person licensed to retail alcoholic liquor under this provision shall allow or permit any alcoholic liquors to be drunk or consumed on his licensed premises, nor shall he maintain or keep in close proximity to such licensed premises any place for the consumption of alcoholic liquors purchased from him, nor shall he sell at any other place than his legal place of business; and all alcoholic liquors so sold shall be sold at said retail store in the original packages or other containers of less than five gallons, in which they are received from the wholesalers, and upon which the United States tax is affixed.

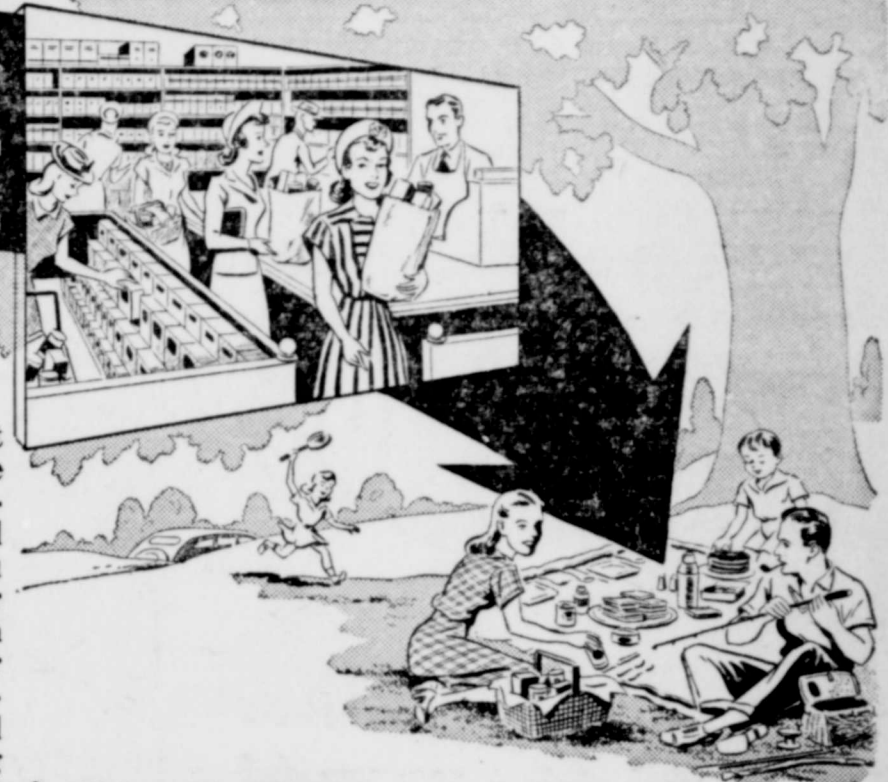

On Cottonwood**

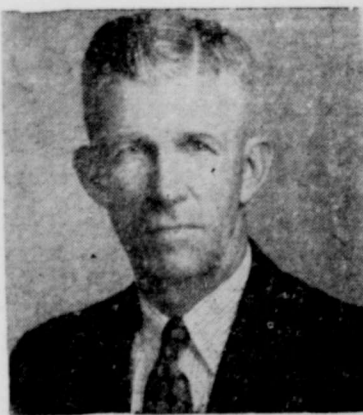
