Fire Crackers Go On Taboo List

An ordinance has been passed the Artesia City Council making it unlawful to sell or to fire or set off fire crackers or fireworks within the corporate limits on or after next Tuesday, May 21.

The ordinance, which is being published in this issue of The Advocate, provides fines of not less than \$1 or more than \$50 for unfractions of either section No. 1, which makes it unlawful to fire or set off fire crackers or fireworks, or section No. 2. which prohibits their sale within the corporate limits.

The action by the council was prompted by the indiscriminate shooting off of firecrackers and other fireworks in Artesia at any time and without regard to the peace and comfort of other

Farm Canvass Made to Hasten **Grain Movement**

Farmer committeemen in key grain-producing states in the nation have started a farm-by-farm canvass to stimulate movement of wheat and corn form granaries into channels which will take it to the starving in Europe and Asia.

Armed with the government's plan providing a 30-cent per bushel bonus of wheat and corn delivered before May 25, the committeemen are explaining both the program, which provides payment by draft from the county AAA office, and the desperate need overseas for each kernel of grain in American farmers' bins.

Two-thirds of the national goal of 110,000,000 bushels of wheat needed by May 25 will be raised in Western states, with North Dakota carrying the largest burden -about 40 per cent of the national goal. State goals also have been of Eddy County Demo- Idaho, Oregon, Utah, Washington,





The poultry house need not be elaborate or expensive, but to be economical and durable, it must be well constructed. Foundations and floors of concrete are durable, ratmit their announcements, subject to the nation of the Demogration termined on the size of building and soil conditions. In most cases, for a one story house, a foundation wall of 8 inches will be sufficient. The poultry house floor line should be about 10 inches above the outside grade line and should be four to five inches thick over a six to eight-inch

laying house be constructed of lumber, building blocks or concrete should be largely determined by price, considering durability.

The construction of proper nests, roosts and feed equipment should be well planned. This work can be done ahead, as rain and show day chores.

All equipment in the poultry laying house should be built off the floor, not only as an aid to cleaning, but as it will provide more floor space for the fowls. By raising the drinking fountains and food hoppers at least 18 inches from the floor, exercise is encouraged by forcing the birds to jump or fly up.
