

# New Safety Council Addresses Cooperation

Fred Brainard, acting mayor, said the general problem is divided into two parts, reckless and fast driving, and driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

On the latter part, Police Chief G. Kelley Stout pointed out that to date this year 32 convictions have been had in Artesia on charges of driving under the influence of liquor and that the fines therefrom amounted to \$3200. Likewise, he said, 32 drivers' licenses were suspended for a year in each case.

Chief Stout pointed out that on one day in September six wrecked cars were brought in here, while on another day in September 11 patients were at Artesia Memorial Hospital at one time from accidents. All were not, however, the results of drunken driving.

Judge J. D. Josey, city police magistrate and precinct justice of the peace, suggested that if the public were better educated as to the problems of law enforcement and that if the general subject were brought up in talks before the various groups of the city, with cooperation stressed, the accident toll should be somewhat curtailed.

ledge of violations and cooperate, the officers cannot cope with the situation, Judge Josey said.

He said that this week he invoked for the first time the limit under the new city ordinance regarding drunken driving, a fine of \$200 and 30 days in jail. The case involved a repeater, Judge Josey said.

Bill Lewis of the New Mexico State Police said that usually police and peace officers have to work alone, that when an officer attempts to gain information from a witness, the latter frequently takes the attitude he "does not want to get involved."

There are cases, Officer Lewis said, in which he has reason to believe a driver involved in an accident was under the influence of liquor, but that the driver is unconscious. And an unconscious man cannot be arrested, because he cannot be informed of the action at that time. In such a case the state officer said, a witness who has knowledge of the driver's condition prior to the accident should so testify.

"It is up to the general public and we can only go so far without help," he said.

## Firemen Seek Contributions For Iron Lung

Contributions towards the purchase of an iron lung for the Artesia community will be received by any member of the Artesia Fire Department, sponsoring organization, it was announced Monday evening at the weekly firemen's meeting.

The department decided two weeks prior to sponsor the purchase of an iron lung, but did not start an active campaign for funds until more information had been received from the manufacturer of the lung selected.

A letter addressed to Dallas Golden, secretary of the department, from the W. J. Mullikin Company, Washington, D. C., points out that the iron lung is not used only for infantile paralysis cases, but for suffocation, electrocution, drowning, and other emergencies dealing with the respiratory tract, in which artificial respiration is required.

The lung selected by the department will come equipped with a six-volt motor, which can be used while a patient is being transported or at some place where electric power is not available, as well as a 110-volt motor.

The manufacturer said that should the Artesia community purchase one of the iron lungs through the efforts of the Fire Department, a company representative will deliver the equipment and instruct firemen, police, hospital staff members, and any others concerned in its operation.

Literature accompanying the letter pointed out cases in which lives were saved, including one in which nine were saved in one community within three months.

The iron lung will cost about \$1100, which amount the firemen hope to raise by personal donations, some of which have come in. But if the public does not respond to that plan, they will work out other means, Golden said.

## Advocate's New Advertising Rates Are Effective Nov. 1

The Artesia Advocate, which has gone along through all the war years and the first post-war year without an increase in subscription or advertising rates, announces a new advertising rate starting Nov. 1. With the announcement of the new advertising rate, a new cash-discount advertising contract also was announced.

The increased rate was brought about by the steady increase in the cost of producing a newspaper. Newsprint, which is the largest item, which goes into the production of a newspaper, has increased approximately 100 per cent in the past four years. This includes the \$10 per ton increase, which was granted last week.

Newsprint, which formerly cost only about \$40 to \$50 per ton, will now cost more than \$90 per ton.

There also has been an increase in the cost of all other items going into the production of a newspaper, including the cost of labor, for presses, replacement parts on presses, ink, metal, and other items.

But with the increase in cost The Advocate is providing for its advertisers a guaranteed circulation because of its membership in the Audit Bureau of Circulation. The Advocate is the only weekly newspaper in New Mexico, which offers guaranteed circulation because it is the only weekly member in the state in the ABC.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Artesia, New Mexico: SECTION 1—That from and after the effective date of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to place or deposit any garbage, trash or refuse, or garbage cans or trash receptacles in any City Streets but shall place all such garbage, trash, refuse and garbage cans or trash receptacles within the boundaries of their own property line and near the property line so that the

garbage may be collected. SECTION 2 — Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in a sum not less than \$2.00 nor more than \$25.00 in the discretion of the Judge of the Municipal Court of the City of Artesia, New Mexico. SECTION 3 — This Ordinance shall be effective five days after its publication in the Artesia Advocate.

**Work Record Of Disabled Vets Is Above Average**

Only one out of every five disabled veterans applying for work at public employment offices found a job, although production records of disabled workers are

slightly better than those of able-bodied workers performing similar duties, John W. Oller, contact representative for Eddy County, announced.

Oller pointed out that a recent survey made by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor revealed these facts. The bureau studied the performance of 4000 physically handicapped and 6400 able-bodied employes working in 47 manufacturing plants.

"National Employ the Handicapped Week" was designated for Oct. 6-12 by President Truman to focus attention on the problems of the disabled veterans.

Disabled workers experience a third fewer serious accidents, and none of the injuries sustained during the six months covered by the survey resulted in additional permanent impairments, Oller added. Furthermore, no instances were reported of handicapped workers causing injuries to able-bodied fellow workers.

Oller said the survey showed that the production efficiency record of impaired workers was slightly superior to that of unimpaired workers. The efficiency relative for impaired workers was 102, compared with 100 for the unimpaired. He said that the high productivity record of the

disabled might be due to more careful placements, more earnest attitudes on their parts, or a combination of both.

The survey matched handicapped and non-handicapped workers as to sex, age, experience on the job, and kind of work performed.

The 47 manufacturing plants were classified in the machinery, aircraft parts, electrical machinery, steel works, and miscellaneous industries such as photographic equipment, food products, glassware.

Absentee rates for impaired and unimpaired workers were identical, 3.8 days off per 100 scheduled

work days. Industry failed to state reasons for in about half the cases, remaining half, most causes given were illness or personal business.

Some large firms, realizing dollar and cents advantage in employing handicapped workers, have hired disabled persons ever possible according to Oller. However, there are indications that some have turned to their prewar standards for employment.

Companies not employing disabled workers are passing up a valuable and efficient source of manpower, Oller concluded.





Supplies of fertilizers available to farmers for 1947 crops are expected to fall short of requirements by about 15 per cent for nitrogen, 17 per cent for phosphorus, and 6 per cent for potash.

**PMA Will Help Vets Get Fats For Businesses**

Veterans who are establishing or re-establishing themselves in business requiring fats and oils can now obtain assistance in securing such fats and oils from the Production and Marketing Administration, according to C. V. Hemphill, state director.

To be eligible for such assistance, a veteran must meet certain requirements. Primarily he must be sole owner and active head of the business and the operation of such business must be his principal occupation.

There are also certain provisions for assistance to businesses jointly owned and operated by a veteran and members of his immediate family or by two or more veterans.

The maximum amount of fats and oils which the Production and Marketing Administration will approve and will attempt to assist an eligible veteran in obtaining for business depends upon the kind of business which the veteran is engaged in and the annual amount of fats and oils required to operate such business.

Additional information concerning this assistance may be obtained from the State Production and Marketing Administration office or county ACA offices located in county seats.

**Farmers Need More Fertilizer Than Available**

Fertilizers have come to play a vital part in American farming. They are essential to conservation farming, as they help to establish and maintain stands of grass, legumes, and other plant cover which prevent water run-off and hold fertility in the soil.

In less than 10 years, farmers have doubled their use of fertilizers, and much of this gain resulted from the assistance and encouragement given by the Agricultural Conservation Program since 1936.

Fertilizers have come to play a vital part in American farming. They are essential to conservation farming, as they help to establish and maintain stands of grass, legumes, and other plant cover which prevent water run-off and hold fertility in the soil.

In the agricultural reconversion years immediately ahead the nation will need large amounts of fertilizer to restore the fertility drained by heavy cropping, which was forced by emergency wartime demands for food and oils.

**Bats Take Up Artesia Abode Flying Mammals On Increase**

No exact count has been made of late, but some Artesia residents believe the bat population in Carlsbad Caverns has been somewhat reduced, because bats seem to be rapidly on the increase in Artesia.

In fact, within recent months, great numbers of bats have come from somewhere, perhaps the famous caves, and taken up abode in various buildings in Artesia.

The increase in the numbers of bats has been especially noticeable at the First Baptist Church, the First Methodist Church, and the Ward building, inside the walls of which they are living during the daylight hours.

At dusk each evening they can be seen in great swarms leaving their artificial caves, so as to feast on insects. But they seem to be making little headway against the inroads of mosquitoes, which have likewise been swarming in the Artesia area in greater numbers than ever before noted.

Rev. C. A. Clark, pastor of the Methodist Church, reports that when the bats appear at dusk they come out of the small openings in the church walls in "puffs," one after another, making it look as though there were whiffs of smoke.

Whereas the bats at the Carlsbad Caverns make for an added attraction, Rev. Clark would be just as happy were the new swarms of them here to seek the famous caves or some other cave for their abode. They not only keep the janitor busy each day cleaning up the porch of the church, but it is not uncommon for a half dozen or more of them to be doing aerobatics in the church auditorium Sunday evenings while services are going on.

Rev. S. M. Morgan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, said the church has been pestered by bats a number of years, but that they have increased in numbers this year.

A few years ago, he said, an attempt was made to get rid of them by burning sulphur, but that the many crevices through which both bats and sulphur fumes could pass made it impossible.

And now both pastors are wondering what they can do to eliminate the bats in their belfries—or perhaps, it would be better to say, in the walls of their churches. Because of the unpleasantness after killing hundreds of them in the structures, poison would not be good, even though the ventilation were not so great that poison could be used. And the job of trying to seal the cracks and openings at night, while the bats are out after insects, would not work either, because the flying mammals can and do flatten themselves nearly paper thin and squeeze through cracks which could be easily overlooked by the plasterer.

In the meantime, Artesia seems to have gone batty and no one knows what to do about it, even though it might mean that the Carlsbad Caverns be deprived of one of the sideshow attractions.

son delivering mail, it has been pointed out by Postmaster J. L. Truett.

Postmaster Truett sounded an appeal again for all to have their mail addressed to postoffice box, rural route, street number, even to the zone number. He urged that everyone insist their incoming and outgoing mail be properly addressed.

Postmaster Truett also stated that when Christmas mailings

come along it is well to remember that all Christmas cards, which are not sealed, are 1 1/2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Such cards, he explained may have inscribed on them, "Merry Christmas," or other such greetings desired, but no personal message in the nature of a letter. The 1 1/2-cent rate applies to all cards mailed for delivery within the United States and in town and out of town. Many times patrons inquire as to the difference in rates of in town and out of town. The rate is all the same whether in cities where city delivery is in progress, he explained.

The Christmas cards bearing 1 1/2-cent rate cannot be forwarded or returned to the sender without additional postage. This, he stated, causes thousands to go astray every year. He pointed out that those who desire to enclose a letter with their Christmas cards or to write a special message, should place a return address on their

cards and use a 3-cent stamp. In closing his plea, Postmaster Truett said, "If a friend is worth your time and trouble to address him a card he will surely rate a first-class card or letter under the 3-cent rate. We urge you to mail early and we make this appeal in the interest of your personal service, as it is no more trouble for the postoffice department to deliver your parcels after Christmas than it is to deliver them in time for Christmas, but we cannot deliver them if you do not mail them. Please cooperate that we may serve you better."

### Local Man Plays Part In Support Of 'Dreamboat' Flight Over Top

First Lt. Donald J. Wolfe of Artesia is a member of the special team of flying weathermen who helped guide the AAF's B-29, "Dreamboat II," through the icy Arctic skies en route from Hawaii to Cairo.

This team, the 59th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron, engaged in its own special Arctic flight in support of the "Dreamboat" flight, flying a B-17 weather plane from Elmendorf Field, Anchorage, Alaska, down along the Alaskan Coast and then inland for several hundred miles to run interference for the "Dreamboat."

In flight weather reports obtained by the special flying weather laboratory were radioed di-

rectly to Colonel Irvine's "Dreamboat II" to keep him informed of the weather that lay ahead. Lack of weather stations in the far North made it essential to lay heavily on aircraft weather reconnaissance to avoid stormy regions with severe icing hazard, such as are frequently encountered in the Arctic.

In the "Dreamboat" flight, which was designed to test the feasibility of long distance transpolar flying through Arctic weather conditions, the value of aircraft weather reconnaissance was indisputably demonstrated. In addition to the supporting flight over Alaska and Canada of the weather plane of the 59th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron, other weather planes on the other side of the North American continent flew out to gather vital weather information.

A B-17 of the 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron flew out across the Greenland icecap to sample the weather ahead of the "Dreamboat" plane to find out what weather was in store for the giant B-29 that followed. This B-17 also sent weather messages direct to the B-29 in flight.

The men of the 59th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron had been preparing for the all-important "Dreamboat" test flight since early July. Making long weather reconnaissance runs from Anchorage, Alaska, at regular intervals since that time, they gained valuable experience in Arctic weather flying conditions. For the last two and a half months they provided vital weather observations garnered from the skies

Loans On Cotton And Wheat Are Offered By CCC

Commodity loans are being currently offered on cotton and wheat by the Commodity Credit Corporation through the Production and Marketing Administration and county ACA offices. These loans give agricultural producers the advantage of immediate money for operating and other necessary expenses. Producers have the privilege of redeeming the commodities at any time to take advantage of any increase in market price. The government's purpose for establishing loans on certain commodities is to eliminate the risk of a low return in case of a market depression. In the event of a rising market, the producer may at any time pay off the amount of the loan plus interest, and redeem the commodity for sale on the market. Cotton and wheat under loan are insured by the Commodity Credit Corporation against loss through fire, storm, theft, and other external causes. Cotton and wheat farmers who wish to take advantage of these commodity loan features may obtain full particulars from county ACA offices.

Custom Swing Of Logs For Use Farmers Allowed

Farmers can have logs custom sawed by mills for their own use, according to a directive of the Civilian Production Administration, provided such lumber does not exceed 5000 board feet during a calendar quarter. However, another change may reduce the amount of lumber available for farmers' use in repair and maintenance on farms. Previously, lumber distributors had to set aside 75 per cent of their lumber for rated orders — mainly veterans' housing — until the end of the calendar month. Now they are required to set aside 80 per cent for rated orders, and to hold any surplus over until the next month for filling rated orders. Lumber not used to fill rated order was previously released to farmers and others. However, this new provision does not affect the majority of rural lumber yards. Farmers hold ratings from the Department of Agriculture to buy lumber from dealers only for essential farm construction and not for maintenance or repair work on farms.

Ag Secretary Anderson Views Month Ahead

Here is the price score for farmers in the months ahead, as seen by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson: "Congress directed the secretary of agriculture to recommend new ceilings when ceilings in force impede production. Ceiling prices do not seem to be impeding the needed production of any agricultural commodity, and we in the department feel that price adjustments are now behind us and that there should be few if any additional recommendations for upward ceiling prices. "Some adjustments, of course, may become necessary. The law may require some due to changes in parity and the like. But, barring entirely unforeseen circumstances which might affect agricultural production, there are about the only price adjustments contemplated, and whatever they may be or when they come, they will be held to the minimum required by law. "The period ahead will be difficult at best. Farmers have a stake in the home market which they must not jeopardize. They can help themselves capture more of the home market by doing their part in seeing reasonable prices maintained for full production, by making sure that America loses none of its love for nourishing food, and by avoiding restrictions on production by inviting constantly greater consumption at every table in the land."
