place among the nations of the world because of our way of living, part of which is the football and other athletic games we play, learning to play hard and fair with a smile," members of the 1946 Artesia High School Bulldog grid squads were told here Monday evening by Dr. Martin Flack of the University of New Mexico at a banquet sponsored for the Boosters.

Dr. Flack was the principal speaker at the banquet, attended by about 130 boys and men, the latter of whom bought two tickets each to the affair and were hosts William Houghtaling, Alton to the Bulldogs. It was held on

In his address Dr. Flack pointed out that the American way of life would not be what it is were it not for athletics, which play an important part in any educational curriculum. Anyone to be successful in life needs not only a healthy mind, but a healthy body, he said, the latter of which is helped through athletic activities. Americans, he said, are not born better than other peoples, "but we hold our own because of our way of living.

Dr. Flack stressed five thing which athletics help Americans learn, while receiving a portion of their education through field sports. He said the athlete learns how to compete, to lose fear of bodily contact, cooperation with his teammates, fellow citizens, tive, and fair play.

In the game of life, Dr. Flack said, in learning to compete the athlete discovers that hard work makes for success, that he cannot depend upon luck, and that he must do things in order to get results.

The loss of fear of bodily contact among American boys was demonstrated during the war, in which it was said the American soldier was the most feared handto-hand fighter. The American soldier has come to love sports and athletics in his way of life, as he makes a game out of every-thing, Dr. Flack declared.

In his lessons in cooperation, the athlete learns that "it does not matter who makes the touchdown, but to make it,' the speaker said. But on the other hand. he learns that when he does lose the cooperation of his fellows and assistance has ceased, to go



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

Most civic and community projects do not return anything material to one or two individuals for more than 1900 Christmases. We have seemor even a group of individuals.

They are not designed to help promote some one individual or his business or his income. They are created to help the community and in helping the community then the individual is aided and helped.

For instance when a water extension program is carried out here to provide water for all property the value of each individual property owner is increased. When improved fire protection is provided then the property becomes more valuable. When other civic improvements are made to improve the city then each individual's business and property becomes more valuable because of this improvement.

Often times we do not see this or we are not able to recognize this fact. Far too often, our vision extends only about as far as the end of our nose. The result is that we measure all undertakings on the basis of what they mean to us personally. And when we do that we can't see any reason why we should aid or help in these movements or these undertakings.

Again we approach the Christmas season ignoring and casting aside the real meaning of this occasion while we strive to promote ourselves, our own aims and our own goals in life.

We live in a universe filled with strife, misunderstandings and differences. We live in such a world becaues we have not yet joined forces with those, who have learned to live the way He taught

Santa Claus, Christmas, the green holly, the bright lights, the beautiful packages, the holiday spirit, the prancing reindeers, the dancing eyes and bright faces all have a meaning but a meaning we have missed.

We have let skepticism replace the faith, which the day should bring to us. We have accepted doubt instead of confidence.

He has not failed, we have failed. His way has not failed but we have refused to accept His way. We go on stumbling and blundering through life.

Monthly Pay **Goes To 6907** Vets In State

Approximately 6907 New Mexico veterans are receiving monthly payments as a result of disabilities incurred in the armed forces during World War II, Gene A. Robens, manager of the New Mexico VA office, announced. The average monthly payment for the disabled veterans is approximately \$42, Robens said. Compensation payments for service-connected disabilities range from \$18.30 to \$360 a month, depending on the degree and type of disability. About 25 per cent of the veter-ans of World War II have filed claims with the VA for disability benefits. Of the claims received and adjudicated, approximately one out of every two have resulted in an award.

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to Our Telephone Customers in New Mexico...

THE PAST YEAR has been the busiest we've ever known. During that twelve-month period we gained 9922 telephones in New Mexico-over twice as many as in any twelve-month period before in our history!

At the first of this year there were 5250 New Mexico families whose orders for service had not been filled. 3947 of those applicants now have service.

In spite of every effort we have been unable to catch up with demand, however, for as old orders are cleared new orders for service pile up. We want the 6255 families who are now waiting, to know that we are doing our best to serve them soon.

Not only are there more telephones in use, but people are using them more. Local calls in New Mexico are running at the rate of 342,000 daily. That's an increase of 31% over last year, which had been our busiest year. Long Distance calls too are at an all-time high.

As your telephone needs have increased, we have increased our forces to take care of those needs and we now have more employees than ever before. In 1940 there were 547; today there are 933. They have been resourceful and competent in meeting unprecedented demands for service. There has been no time when what we call the "Spirit of Service" was more important.

We are carrying out the largest construction program in New Mexico in our history this year. Despite material shortages, our gross construction program in this state in 1946 will amount to approximately \$1,672,000.

All of us in the telephone business look forward to the day when there will be no one waiting for telephones; better, faster service for local and long distance calls ; fewer people on party lines; and greatly improved service in rural communities. We are making steady progress toward that goal.


