Warnings were issued here Tuesday to all owners of automobiles with out-of-state license plates on their cars and who have established residences in New Mexico to purchase New Mexico automobile licenses. The warning was issued by State Patrolman Bill Lewis.

Officer Lewis stated that the law permits visitors to the state to remain 90 days without a New Mexico license. however, he said, many come to the state, establish their residence; go to work here; yet fail to purchase New Mexico license plates for their cars.

He urged all, who have moved to the state to make their home, immediately to buy New Mexico license plates. He explained that last year during the deer season a hunter with a resident hunting license had out-ofstate license plates on the car. It cost the hunter \$150 and could have cost him as much as \$300.
