

THE LAST STATE LEGISLATURE, of course, left many things to be desired. That, perhaps, has been true of many of the legislatures.

But there is always another legislature.

And the only way that the things, which could and should be done will be done is for the citizens, the taxpayers and the voters themselves to put forth the necessary effort to organize the program they desire before that next session. After they have done that the necessary pressure will have to be applied to get the job done.

We know, or at least feel, that the majority of the citizens and the taxpayers desire and want a fair representation from all of the counties in the state. Bills providing for these were introduced into the legislature this year, but they were defeated by the politicians. But each year the vote is a little closer. It wouldn't have required much work to have put over the measure this year.

But the next legislature should provide fair representation for every county in the state. Every county should have one senator and one repre sentative and as many more as they are entitled to have on the basis of population.

That will become a reality when the people demand it.

We also are firmly convinced that the taxpayers of the state are a little weary of the "hired hands" of the state telling the legislature what to do. One such instance developed during the last session but leaders of the state senate were sufficiently strong to oppose it and block it. But the "hired hand" seemingly was not satisfied with being on the state payroll-he wanted to tell the finer things in life .-- A.L.B. legislature how to run the state.
