





VERY COMMUNITY has those, who seeming ly enjoy poisoning dogs, cats and other pets.

Dogs, of course, are a nuisance in one sense of the word, yet they are wonderful pets; a real friend of man; and deserve something better than to be poisoned.

Fact is that those, who are guilty of putting out poison to kill dogs and cats are far worse than those, the dog, which roams free and sometimes does damage plants, flowers and shrubs.
