But laws, which are on the books, were placed there for the protection of all, not the few or the minority: Officials elected to office were named to those offices to serve all the people and not just their own little group and clan.

For instance, in our own city, those legally qualified and licensed to operate and to sell intoxicating liquors agreed to abide by the laws and regulations and the rules. They agreed not to sell to minors; not to sell to those intoxicated; not to sell to habitual drinkers; and they agreed to conduct an orderly place of business.

And if they don't it is the right of every citizen or any one citizen in that community, to register his objections. And when the conditions become such that they demand and require attention and if officials fail to give attention, then any or every citizen has a right to register their protest and not be insulted or subjected to punishment merely because they ask that the law be followed. And we need to speak out a little more often

than we usually do .- O.E.P.

GOV. THOMAS J. MABRY has not had to send the state police into North Eddy County or had a hard time reaching the scene of a blaze into Artesia to halt gambling.

He hasn't had to send in the state police to needless traffic. halt gambling because the job is being done by

the local peace officers, city and county. These officers took a solemn oath to uphold and

enforce the law. And there is a law, which prohibits gambling.

It shouldn't be necesary for the state police to have to go into any community or any county to halt gambling. Governor Mably knows that and he emphasized that fact. But when the local officials refused to perform their solemn and sworn duties, he did the job for them.

But the citizens in every community where officers have failed to do their duty should speak out in protest against it. They should demand that these duties be carried out. They should see that gambling and all other illegal practices in so far as possible are halted.

But Artesia can be proud of the fact that her officers are seeking to halt gambling. They are seeking to keep the city clean and to regulate it in keeping with the desires of good citizens.

And a few words of appreciation for this from the citizens of the community always lends encouragement and results in the job being done reads: and continued to be done.

Let's show our officers we appreciate the fact they are halting or preventing gambling and that we want this continued in the days to come.
