"NEGOTIABLE INSTRUMENTS"

The average person does not often use the term "negotiable instruments" in his everyday conversation, and the words may not mean much to him. Actually, it is just a mouth-filling term used in law to describe certain important pieces of paper that we normally call by simpler names.

Even though we seldom use the words, we deal with negotiable instruments all the time. Every check we write to pay the gas bill is a negotiable instrument.

ment, and so is your paycheck or pension check. The note you sign to buy a new car, the money order you purchase at the bank or post office, or the traveler's checks you take with you on a trip instead of cash, all are negotiable instruments.

It was all started by merchants who had to send large sums of gold or currency between cities or nations. They worked out a way to exchange money, or the value of money, by written messages, much of the time through a third party like a broker or bank. But when you deal in pieces of negotiable paper instead of hard money, there have to be certain standards and safeguards or the paper could lose its value.

Consequently, there developed a whole system of laws within nations and between nations, upon which all our business rests. Through the courts, if necessary, the owners of negotiable instruments may enforce the terms written on the paper.

In the United States things used to be confusing some times because of different state laws, but by 1924 all 48 states had adopted a Uniform Negotiable Instrument Law which sets up the same rules nationwide.

Since so-called negotiable instruments are so important; since they are ordinarily just like money in many ways; since they often are used like money, or are sold to other persons or companies, and since there are special laws defining the ins and outs of negotiable instruments which we wouldn't ordinarily have any reason to know about, there are one or two simple rules we should follow:

We should make certain we read what's on the paper, that we know what the words mean, and what the penalties and dangers may be, before signing our name.

Remember: You are the only person in the world with that signature, and the courts, as a rule, must take your signed promises at their face value.

But he emphasized that if he failed to see any voters, it was his misfortune, not his fault. "I just seem to keep missing some of them," he said, regretfully.

James Eubanks, tell at the First National Bank, said he had not noticed that dimes were more plentiful here, but he agreed the reason might be that neither Baird or Clyde has no parking meters.

In communities using parking meters the great demand is for nickles, and persons receiving dimes in change will almost invariably ask for nickles.

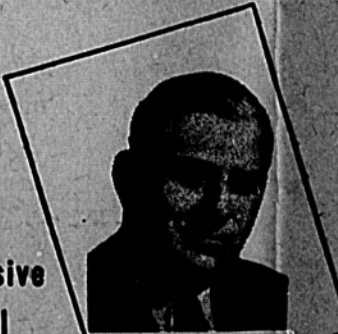

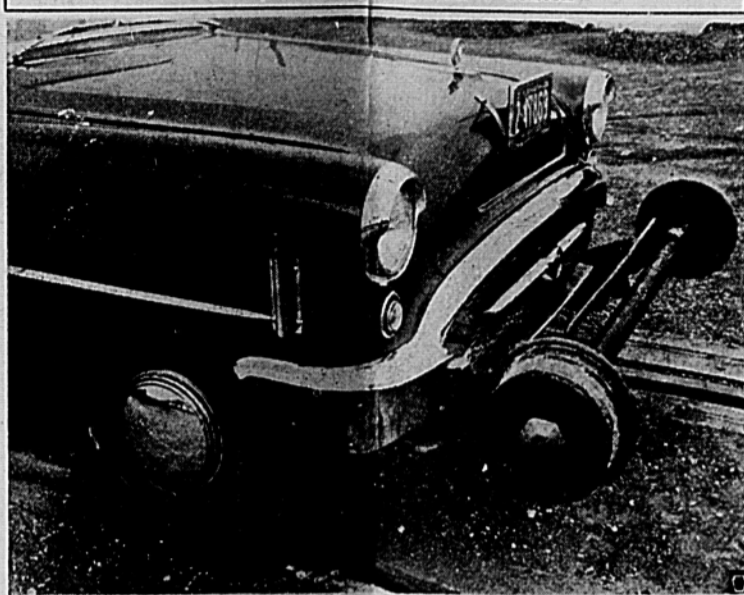

Soil Bank Rules Guessing Game Farm Bureau Protests To Benson

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has declared that soil bank regulations had subjected cotton farmers to a "guessing game" and discriminated against farmers who guessed wrong in planting their allotments this year.

In a letter to Sec. of Agriculture Benson, Texas Farm Bureau President J. Walter Hammond said that "the only possible means of dealing fairly and justly with cotton farmers would be to take soil bank payments on the basis of normal yields, regardless of whether or not cotton was planted."

He referred to drouth areas where some farmers had dry planted cotton in order to maintain their acreage history. These farmers, he said, could receive only the minimum payment of \$6 per acre for land put into the soil bank. On the other hand he pointed out, other farmers in the same drouth area who did not plant any of their cotton allotment acreage could receive payments based on their normal yields.

Appraisal committees ascertain yield of planted areas put into the soil bank. In areas where cotton did not come up, the yield is automatically appraised at zero. The \$6 per acre is a minimum payment for cotton under soil bank regulations.

Hammond said that his office has received many complaints from drouth areas protesting the "discriminatory" regulations

of Kid's Lake here. They hope it will reduce by at least half the loss of water through evaporation.

Six governmental agencies and North Texas State College are collaborating in this pioneering study of hexadecanol, a chemical found in many cosmetics and hand creams.

It was spread over the 5.82 acres of Kid's Lake July 7 by a team of 13 NTSC biology students under the direction of Dr. J. K. G. Silvey.

The study was set up by the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation with the cooperation of the U. S. Geological Survey, U. S. Public Health, Weather Bureau, Oklahoma State Health Department, Oklahoma City officials, and the NTSC linnology group.

Stormproof Seed Available Soon

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has announced that planting seed for Blightmaster, a disease resistant, stormproof cotton and Crockett, a new high test weight, early maturing, good quality, hard red winter wheat for Texas, will be available for 1957.

Available from the Agricultural Information Office are publications, L-292, Blightmaster and L-288, Crockett which describe these new and improved crop varieties for Texas.

Tests indicate that Blightmaster will yield as much under blight-free conditions as other stormproof varieties now grown in Texas, and greater yields may be expected under heavy blight conditions. Staple length is 15-16 to one inch. It is adapted to stripper harvesting; is medium in maturity; semi-spreading in growth habit and is recommended for areas of the state where stormproof variety is desired.

The new hard red winter wheat for Texas has good disease resistance, early maturity, high yields, high test weight and high milling qualities to its credit. Crockett wheat is recommended for the Panhandle and South Plains wheat areas and also for the Rolling Plains and north-central Texas wheat areas. Individuals interested in producing certified seed of Crockett during the 1956-57 crop year may obtain foundation seed from the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas.

Warning Sounded In Cotton Spraying

Warning that incidental after effects of a new cotton insect spray may involve prosecution because of damage to wildlife has been given by the assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

"It might be well for persons connected with these spraying operations to consider state laws which provide penalties for endangering wildlife," the assistant executive secretary said.

Texas Egg Business Has No Protection

Egg production is big business in Texas -- 187 million dozen each year to be exact.

Yet Texas, John C. White, commissioner of agriculture, pointed out, stands alone among the 48 states with no legal means of protecting its egg industry. As a result, the housewife suffers through unrestricted shipment of inferior egg products from other states, as well as frequent misgrading and labeling which sells her poor-quality eggs branded as "top quality."

Farmers and egg industry men alike are now asking that the state legislature pass a uniform grading and labeling law. Such a law would have a double purpose:

It would protect the consumer. The industry wants to guarantee the housewife that she will get 12 good eggs in every dozen she buys -- and that the eggs actually are of the size and grade which the label claims.

It would assure the producer a fair price for the grade of eggs he sells, by encouraging and promoting payment according to quality.

Such a law is a strong possibility in the next sessions of the legislature.
