Who's At Fault?

FDUCATION, we are firmly convinced, has three purposes. Maybe there are those, who will not agree with us, but we still believe these are the fundamental purposes of education. First, we believe that education has as one of its purposes better preparing an individual to make his way in life-in other words, to earn money. Another purpose is to prepare an individual to serve better his fellow man and humanity. And in the third place, we believe that education is to equip and qualify individuals better to live a happier, more pleasant and more enjoyable life.

Those, we say are fundamentals. And the test of education is whether education is doing exactly that. If it is not then we would of the opinion that education is failing.

But we are finding many arguments and many discussions today concerning education. The arguments are not so much about its aims or the goals but rather how it is to be taught and what is to be taught. There are a few discussions on the process to be employed.

It is rather interesting to note that those in the public schools are being accused of two things to apply these facts in life and in living .- O.E.P. -organizing to secure for themselves increases in pay and failure to do a teaching job in the grades and in high school. This, we say, is what college educators are saying about teachers; it is not what we are saying.

On the other hand some of the public school teachers aren't too enthusiastic about the college professors and instructors. They point out that the college instructors teach psychology and psychology of education, but they don't practice it. And they even cite the fact that some of the pro-

As the bull is half the herd, he cutting out those he must be better than the cow herd. The speed with which herd improduces a calf every two or these as compared with about 2 per cent in the North and 15 per cent in the West. provement is carried on is in proportion to how much better the bull is than the cows.

What is the best bull? His se lection is not as simple as the answer. The best bull is the bull that produces calves that weight the most at shipping time and top the market for quality-the ones that net the rancher the most money per head.

The only real test of the good bull is his offspring. Some excellent appearing bulls get poor, runtly offsprings. cows produce poor calves regardess of the bull used.

So, before he purchases a bull, a rancher needs to analyze his herd and answer at least two questions: First, what type of bulls, of the same breed, will, when mated to his cows, produce the most valuable calf? Second, what serious faults do the cows have that is reducing the value of the calves that can be corrected by the use of a better type of

The answer to those two ques-tions will clarify what kind of bull will do the most good. ranchers will not come to the same conclusion. Some will decide they need to increase the milk-producing ability of cows. Others may decide to increase the size of bone. Yet both may be When one knows what kind of bull he needs, every effort should be made to secure him. Once he is purchased, the best possible use should be made of

Now let's talk about selecting heifers at weaning time. Year-byyear improvement in replacement heifers is the yardstick by which to measure the value of your

Only the very top end of the heifer calves should be kept. The calf is the indication of the productive ability of the cow and bull. If a good calf has inherited the good characteristics of her parents she should be kept. Selecting heifers really starts

at calving time and ends at shipping time. Both cow and heifer calf, where the calf is exception-ally good, should be marked at any time before weaning - the calf for use as a replacement, and the cow because she has proved her ability to produce good calves. The first requirement for a replacement would be a thrifty calf. That indicates a rustler that will find what feed is available. It may also indicate that
