Unselfish Service

AS A PEOPLE it now begins to appear that we nation which stands a chance of becoming just one have become more liberal and more generous of the soviets of a worldwide government.—A.L.B. but we can't help but wonder as individuals whether we haven't and aren't becoming more

We used to be more neighborly, more friendly, and had more time for our friends. Today we have little time for anyone including ourselves. And today we are more inclined to measure things and to check things on the basis of what they mean to us personally rather than on the basis of wheth-

er they mean anything to our communities.

We used to be willing to consider things on the basis of their merit and on the basis of whether they would aid and help our community and some definite movement in our community. We don't do that today.

If you will observe and watch various groups, you will know what we mean. For instance check the resolutions or the recommendations made by some profession at its state convention. A careful check will show these groups are seeking something for themselves rather than for their state. It will show they are desirous of grabbing all funds to promote only their professoin or their particular program—they are unconcerned about the rest of the groups in the state.

We don't consider things any more on the basis of the whole good of our community-no, we check them on the basis of how much good

The same greed and selfishness, which we find among individuals and among groups, also prevails in our legislative bodies, state and national.

resenting the people aren't concerned about the give. citizens and the taxpayers but they are very much concerned about their own interests and the inter ests of their political party; their political friends; or their personal friends.

They judge things on this basis rather than on the basis of value or merit.

We believe this is more and more apparent in the American Congress. We are firmly convinced that far too many members of Congress, representatives and senators, are so busy with their own personal interests; the interests of their personal and political friends; and seeking either to promote themselves or some of their political friends, they actually haven't time to devote to the problems of the nation.

They are permitting personal credit; personal glory; their own political welfare and their own personal greeds, desires and ambitions to determine what they will and won't do. And so when a question, which concerns and involves posed on the people.—O.E.P. the more than one hundred and forty million people in the nation they have never the time or the Prizes For Lights interest to act on the matter.

The result is that our Congress instead of devoting time to things, which matter, we find them party or their personal friends.

And when our governing body reaches that point; when it is willing to sacrifice the welfare of the nation for the benefit of party or individual -we are treading on dangerous ground.

All of us need to take a new view of the situation. All of us need to realize these are some things, which come first, and that this is not the welfare of our party.
