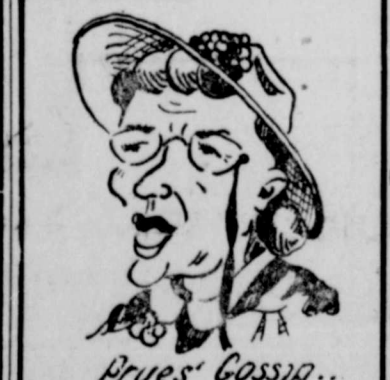

It Is Wise To Get Ready Now For Early Chicks

It's not too early to begin planning and preparing for the arrival of this year's baby chicks. Having the brooder house and equipment in good condition is a highly important factor in successful chick raising, and the time to see that there are no defects in the brooder layout is before, not after, the chicks are placed in the house.

If necessary, insulate the walls and ceiling of the house so that the brooder stove keeps the interior warm and comfortable. Clean the house thoroughly before the chicks arrive. After scraping, scrubbing, and sweeping the floors and walls with plenty of hot water, use a good disinfectant as an added precaution.

When the chicks are placed in the house, pace a guard of about 1 1/2 feet high around the brooder stove at a distance of about two feet from the hover, the purpose of the guard being to acquaint the chicks with the source of heat and to keep them from straying from it.

Geologists Are Not Atheists, Ports Declares

Contrary to a general belief that geologists are atheists, they are educated to be more Godfearing men than the average person, W. W. Ports, local geologist, declared last Thursday at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Artesia Kiwanis Club.

Speaking on the subject, "Theology vs. Geology," Ports compared the Biblical story of the Creation with geological findings and facts, which, he said, verify the Biblical account. Ports said the comparison begins with the six days as recorded in the Bible and the six geological periods. Although there is some conflict in the comparison, Ports said, there likewise is a definite parallel.

Geologists believe and confirm that there must be a higher, greater Power that created life, Ports said.

The Kiwanis Club met for the first time at the Masonic Temple, where members and guests enjoyed a family-style meal. Paul Dillard, secretary, urged all members to phone him each week the day before the meeting as to expected attendance, as reservations must be made under existing conditions.

Farm Briefs

Those of you who are blaming the livestock feeders for the high cost of meat should point your accusations in the other direction. While most people believe the price of livestock determines the price of meat, actually the reverse is true—meat prices set the pace and livestock prices follow. As proof of that fact, in 1938, when meat prices were low, the per capita consumption of meat was about 135 pounds. This year we will each eat about 157 pounds of meat—and prices are high. As long as people have the appetite for meat and the money to pay for it, chances are that prices of this commodity will be high.

New Mexico farmers who buy improved varieties of seed for this spring's planting will be taking unnecessary risks. For varieties of seed are bred and developed to fit specific climatic and other growing conditions. It would be just luck if a variety developed in Mississippi or Georgia proved to be adapted to all parts of New Mexico. The New Mexico Experiment Station is testing many varieties of field-crops seed to determine their disease resistance, yield, adaptability, and many other factors. Information based on these tests, including a list of recommended varieties for New Mexico, is available at the county extension office.

Today the cost of applying fertilizer is relatively low compared to the increased returns which farmers can expect by using it. So farmers should use more fertilizer now than they did before the war. As a result, increased yields will pay for the extra fertilizer, and the soil will be enriched against the day when the cost of fertilizers may be comparatively high.

Four Marketing Projects For State Approved

Four marketing projects for New Mexico were approved by federal administrators of the Research and Marketing Act. The project, which will be conducted by specialists of the state office staff of the New Mexico Extension Service, include educational and informational work in each of the following:

Certification and identification as a means of improving the marketing and use of superior varieties of irrigated cotton; preparation of wool for market; egg marketing and consumer education, and cream improvement, the marketing of cream according to grade, and consumer education.

J. Z. Rowe, state extension economist in marketing, is in charge of the projects, which may be completed by July 1. After that date, if more state and federal funds are available, and if results are favorable, the projects will continue for another six months, Rowe added.

"Unfortunately, during the last 80 years, we haven't devoted as much scientific research to the marketing of our products as we have to their production," Rowe explained. "We have a lot of catching up to do, and we hope that the project will enable us to get a good start toward a more efficient marketing of New Mexico products."

Ranch Dam Does Three Jobs Of Major Worth

A dam built on the Hopkin Ranch in Rich County, Utah, was only one of 112,000 dams built under the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program, but this particular dam does three major jobs:

As an erosion control dam it stops the silt-laden waters from melting snow on surrounding hills from cutting deep gullies through valuable farm land below. This water no longer joins with other streams to become a destructive flood in the lower valley. As an irrigation dam it holds

back the water during the flush spring runoff for use later on in the summer when water from other sources is scarce. The even flow of water during the entire growing season, instead of only about six weeks in the spring, results in more hay, grain, and potatoes.

As a stock-water dam it permits a more even distribution of livestock on the range. Animals no longer have to trail long distances to get a drink. With more watering places there is less of overgrazing that results when watering places are few and far between. Livestock put on more economical gains. Less trampling and overgrazing means less erosion. There is more vegetation to check the rain and melting snow—the water remains on the land instead of rushing off and taking the soil with it.

Smaller Spring Crop Is Expected, Figures Of USDA Indicate

Farmers intend to farrow 7,732,000 sows next spring—about 11 per cent fewer than in 1947, the Department of Agriculture reports. This would be 8 per cent below the 10-year average and the smallest number of spring farrowings since 1938. If these intentions are carried out and the number of pigs saved per litter is about the same as the 10-year average, the 1948 spring pig crop would be about 48 million head, 9 per cent smaller than in 1947.

This estimate is based on breeding intentions reported by farmers about Dec. 1, taking into consideration the relationship of intentions to actual farrowing in other years of high hog prices and below average corn supplies.

Withers said one of the greatest single losses was to the contents of the warehouse, in which were the plant tools and thousands of replacement parts worth up into the thousands of dollars.

Fear was felt during the height of the fire for the contents of the laboratory, likewise valued in the thousands of dollars. However, although the roof of that building, adjacent to the offices, was damaged, the equipment was left intact. The damaged roof had been repaired by Wednesday night.

Walls were still hot Tuesday when the job of clearing the debris started, and by nightfall some of the walls of destroyed buildings had been razed and hauled away. And that job was virtually complete by Wednesday night.

In the meantime utility men were on the job early Tuesday morning, helping to hasten the reopening of the refinery, the largest in New Mexico. Withers said Wednesday the job of replacing the wiring and hooking up for power was all that was holding the plant up at that time and the job should be completed by Saturday.

All records of the company were in a safe in a vault and safe, but the office and printing supplies and equipment were destroyed.

While it is planned to replace the buildings as rapidly as possible, temporary office space has been rented in the Veterans Memorial Building from the United Veterans Club. The northwest room in the building, designed for banquets and small meetings, has been assigned for the office. Withers said the loss is covered by insurance.

AN AMENDING
ORDINANCE NO. 195 OF THE
CITY OF ARTESIA, AS
ADOPTED, TO EXTEND THE
LIMITS WITHIN
WHICH THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW
MEXICO, MAY BE INCORPORATED
AND TO CREATE
SEVERAL FIRE ZONE DISTRICTS
AND TO RECLASSIFY THE CITY
OF ARTESIA INTO TWO DISTRICTS
AND OF AN OUTER
FIRE ZONE AND AN INDUSTRIAL
FIRE ZONE, AND TO
REQUIREMENTS
FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF
BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES
IN THE OUTER FIRE
ZONE AND IN THE INDUSTRIAL
FIRE ZONE.
OBTAINED BY THE CITY
OF ARTESIA, AS
FOLLOWS:
That the fire zone
of the City of Artesia, New
Mexico, is hereby extended to
include the area on the south side
of the street from Fifth Street

er Fire Zone after the effective
date of this Ordinance shall be
built of the materials necessary to
conform to the fire restrictive
standards set forth in Chapters
42 and 43, part VIII of the Uni-
form Building Code of the State
of New Mexico, and as outlined
below, to-wit:
Fire protection of structural
parts
Fire resistive walls 0 hours
Fire resistive partitions 3 hours
Fire resistive floods 1 hours
Fire resistive roof and
ceiling construction 1 hours
Fire resistive doors
and shutters 0 hours
Fire resistive windows 0 hours
Roof coverings (fire
retardant) 15 hours
PROVIDED that metal buildings
may be constructed in the Indus-
trial area from the north side of
Moseley to the North side of
Eagle Draw on the north, and
from the south side of Dallas to
the north side of Centre Street
on the south, as hereinafter pro-
vided.
Section 4: No existing struc-
tures or buildings in the Outer
Fire Zone shall be repaired, re-
modeled, altered or re-constructed
after the effective date of this
Ordinance unless the assessed val-
ue of the building or structure to
be repaired, altered, remodeled or
re-constructed exceeds the sum of
\$2,000.00 and the physical depre-
ciation of such buildings or struc-
ture does not exceed forty per
cent (40%), as appraised by three
qualified architects, engineers or
contractors appointed by the City
Council to make such appraisement.
Any extensions or additions
to existing structures or
buildings shall be made in ac-
cordance with the requirements
hereinabove set forth for new
structures or buildings in the
Outer Fire Zone area, and any ex-
terior walls rebuilt shall meet the
requirements herein for any new
buildings or structures.
Section 5: New buildings may
be constructed of all metal con-
struction in that part of the Outer
Fire Zone defined as the Indus-
trial Zone, to-wit: on First Street
from the north side of Moseley
to the north side of Eagle Draw,
and on First Street from the
south side of Dallas to the north
side of Centre Street, and to a
depth of one hundred feet (100')
on each side of the street, subject
to the following conditions with
respect to said new buildings of
all metal construction:
(a) They shall be all prefabric-
ated type of standard approved
manufacture
(b) Said buildings shall have
fire resistive windows, doors and
glazing
(c) No all metal type building

shall be placed nearer than twenty-five (25) feet from any exist-
ing street line
(d) All metal type buildings
must have installed an Underwrit-
ers approved overhead sprinkling
system for fire protection.
Section 6: No contractor, per-
son, firm or corporation shall
commence the construction of any
new building or structure, or the
remodeling, repairing, altering or
re-construction of any existing
building or structure in the Out-
er Fire Zone, or in the Industrial
Fire Zone, as herein defined,
without first obtaining a building
permit as required by the Ordina-
nces of the City of Artesia, New
Mexico, and each days violation
of this Ordinance shall be consid-
ered a separate offense.
The City Clerk shall issue with-
in three days a notice for posting,
stating that a building permit has
been issued by the City of Ar-
tesia, and the contractor, person,
firm or corporation constructing
any new building or repairing, re-
modeling or altering any existing
structure shall post such notice
in a conspicuous place at the lo-

Section 7: Any contractor, per-
son, firm or corporation violating
this Ordinance, or any part or por-
tion thereof, shall be fined in any
sum not exceeding \$50.00, and each
days violation of this Ordinance,
or any part thereof, shall be con-
sidered as a separate offense.
Section 8: This Ordinance shall
be published once in the Artesia
Advocate, and shall be in full
force and effect five days after its
publication.



Scientists Now Use Sugar As Furniture Finish

Finishing furniture, walls, or woodwork with sugar may sound fantastic, but it's a possibility, says Miss Wynona Swebston, county home demonstration agent. A new product known as allyl sucrose has been developed from sugar by chemists at the Eastern Regional Research Laboratory of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This new substance, used as a finish for interior surfaces, will withstand marking by water, heat, alcohol, acids, and grease.

When first prepared, allyl sucrose is a heavy, light yellow liquid that can be dissolved in many different liquids, Miss Swebston says. "Exposure to air or oxygen and heat gradually hardens it and makes it insoluble, so that it can withstand immersion in hot oil and is not affected by heat up to about 400 degrees. When used as a coating or finish, it has a high gloss and is extremely hard, yet flexible enough for use on wood. Because it is transparent,

it may even be used to coat glass. The chemists do not know yet whether this substance will also be suitable for finishing kitchen and bathroom surfaces, the agent adds. They have not made sufficient abrasion tests to tell how it will stand up under the usual wear and friction on kitchen counters, and they do not know how it will be affected by long exposure to steam or water. The product is still in the experimental stage, and no samples will be available for another six months or longer.
