He even intimated that he would oppose the constitutional amendment, hinting that he might even come down or send down representatives to fight the amendment.

President Green, of course, has forgotten or is ignoring the fact that this is an affair of the citizens of the state of New Mexico. He is ignor- Endangers Life ing the fact that he is neither a citizen or a taxpayer in the state and that after all in the final analysis it is none of his business what the people of the state do or what they want.

That fact, of course, won't prevent him from osing the measure, even if it is true.

He is arguing at some length that the amendment is unfair and unjust to labor and it will cause them to lose certain gains. He condemns the proposal at great length.

He probably has opposed such other amendments over the nation at some length but his opposition has failed because the proposal is certainly an American proposal and one, which guarantees freedom to the working man.

It prohibits the unions from requiring that he, the worker, join the labor union and pay dues in order to have a job. It does not prohibit the union member from working and having a job likewise a violation, as the law County Agent Rierson offers a but it does halt the union from requiring the non-union laboring man to join the union.

And we are firmly convinced that all Americans are entitled to earn a livelihood, to work where they please, and to have jobs without paying dues into a labor organization or to any other

But New Mexico citizens will have to be alert and active if they maintain their American rights and liberties. They will have to halt outside interference in their state affairs; and above every-thing else they will have to go to the polls and support this constitutional amendment if they exet labor in this state to be free to join or not to

Metal Nipple Bucket



The metal nipple bucket was proven satisfactory for feeding young calves by Montana agricul tural experiment station. The bucket is six inches in diameter, seven inches high, and is graduated in pints by indentations in the metal one inch apart which serve as a guide to the feeder in determining the amount of milk to feed. The nipple is 21/2 inches long, made of 1/2 inch copper tubing, soldered securely into the bucket as shown. It is rounded at the end with solder.

Precautions Advised To Prevent Hog Flu

To keep flu from getting started Iowa State college recommends that hogs be brought in at night from hogged-down cornfields to keep them from getting chilled. Overcrowding should be avoided. Quarters should be planned so that sufficient space and adequate equip ment will be available during bad weather, but the buildings should not be shut tight, making hogs too warm.
