Roberts Defeats Mayor Mahone 831 to 597

Oren C. Roberts defeated Mayor A. P. (Doc) Mahone for mayor by 234 votes by unofficial count in the biennial municipal election Tuesday, and all other members of the Roberts "Progressive Ticket" were swept into office by big majorities in the most hotly contested city election in the history of Artesia.

Every member of the "Progressive Ticket" polled a majority in all four wards, while the closest count was for mayor in the third ward, where Mayor Mahone received 178 votes to 179 for Roberts. Their totals for the entire city were 831 for Roberts and 597 for

Women Receive Most Of Old-Age Benefit Checks

Women are the recipients of most of the benefit checks paid under the federal old-age and survivors' insurance program, says J. Hassler Strickland, manager of the Roswell Social Security office which administers the program in Southeast New Mexico.

Widows of workers insured under the program receive monthly benefits while they have minor children in their care, or when they are past 65 years of age, he explained. Women wage earners receive retirement when they are past 65, and wives of retired workers also may be come beneficiaries.

When a man past 65 retires and receives Social Security benefits, his wife may also be entitled to payments if she is 65, or when she becomes 65, Strickland said.
