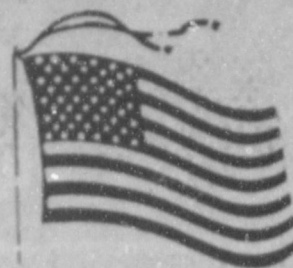

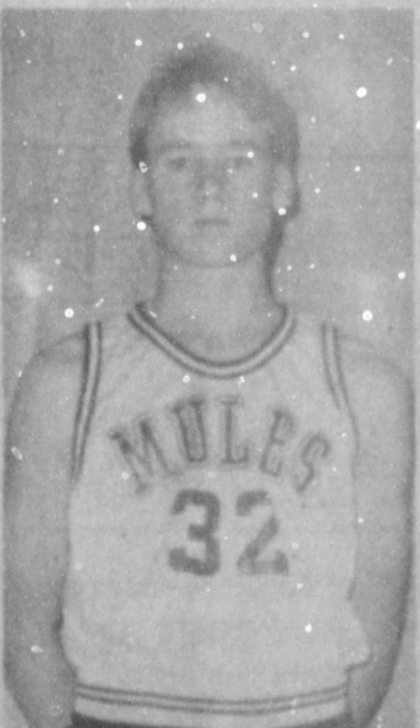

Rotary Hears Latest News On Renovation

R. A. Bradley, who is president of the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation. He asked to speak briefly to the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon, with an update on the renovations being conducted at the Heritage Foundation Center. Not only was he given time to speak, he was given the entire program to explain the renovations and ask the Muleshoe Rotary Club for assistance in the renovation efforts.

He said 14 people were at the Heritage Center last Tuesday night to work on the Janes Ranch House. "Some of them are not members of any organization," he said. "We would like for the entire community to set aside time to come out and help."

"The Heritage Center is yours. It does not belong to me or to the Heritage board." Bradley explained how they have invited different groups to go out to the Heritage Center on Tuesday night to help with the renovations, and at the same time, said anyone from the community would be welcome to help.

Some of the floors in the Janes Ranch House will be finished back to the original finish he said, and a lot of sanding is going on at this time.

He said they would like to be ready to start painting by April 1. He added that Mrs. McMurtry, the widow of Johnny McMurtry, and a former resident of the Janes Ranch House will be returning to Muleshoe around April 1 and will be advising on original colors, as they want to have the colors back as close to the original colors as possible.

Bradley said the house was built around 1915, and each day, the Heritage Foundation learns more about the ranch and its colorful history.

He said the Janes Ranch House will be a museum. Although it was originally planned to be a place where meetings, etc. could be held, they found they could not insure it. But, it could be insured as a museum.

He also said some doors will have to be replaced, and will have to be specially made, as they do not conform to present day doors. Also, light fixtures for the house will have to be made. The original lighting was by carbide, but electrical lights will

Born and raised in Bailey County, they started out in farming in southern Bailey County, they moved to Muleshoe where he is known as the 'Marathon Man.'

They are the Terry Hutton family, Terry, Drucilla, and children, Heather, Corley and Holly.

A brand new award was presented by Harvey Bass, representing the Muleshoe Activities Committee (MAC) and Pat Langfitt of The Jennyslippers.

The new award is the Merchant of the Year.

They first thanked all businesses in Muleshoe and then told about a couple who operated out of their home and garage in western Bailey County for 20 years before moving their business to town. They said it started out with 20 pair of boots, and then, when they moved to town, increased their inventory of boots to more than 7,200 pair. 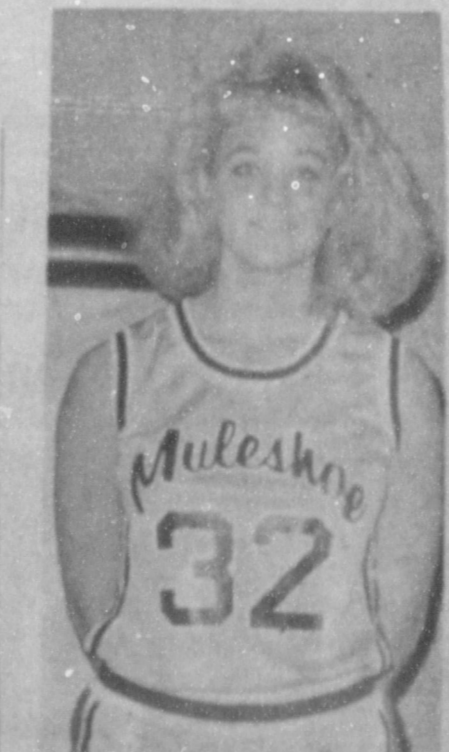

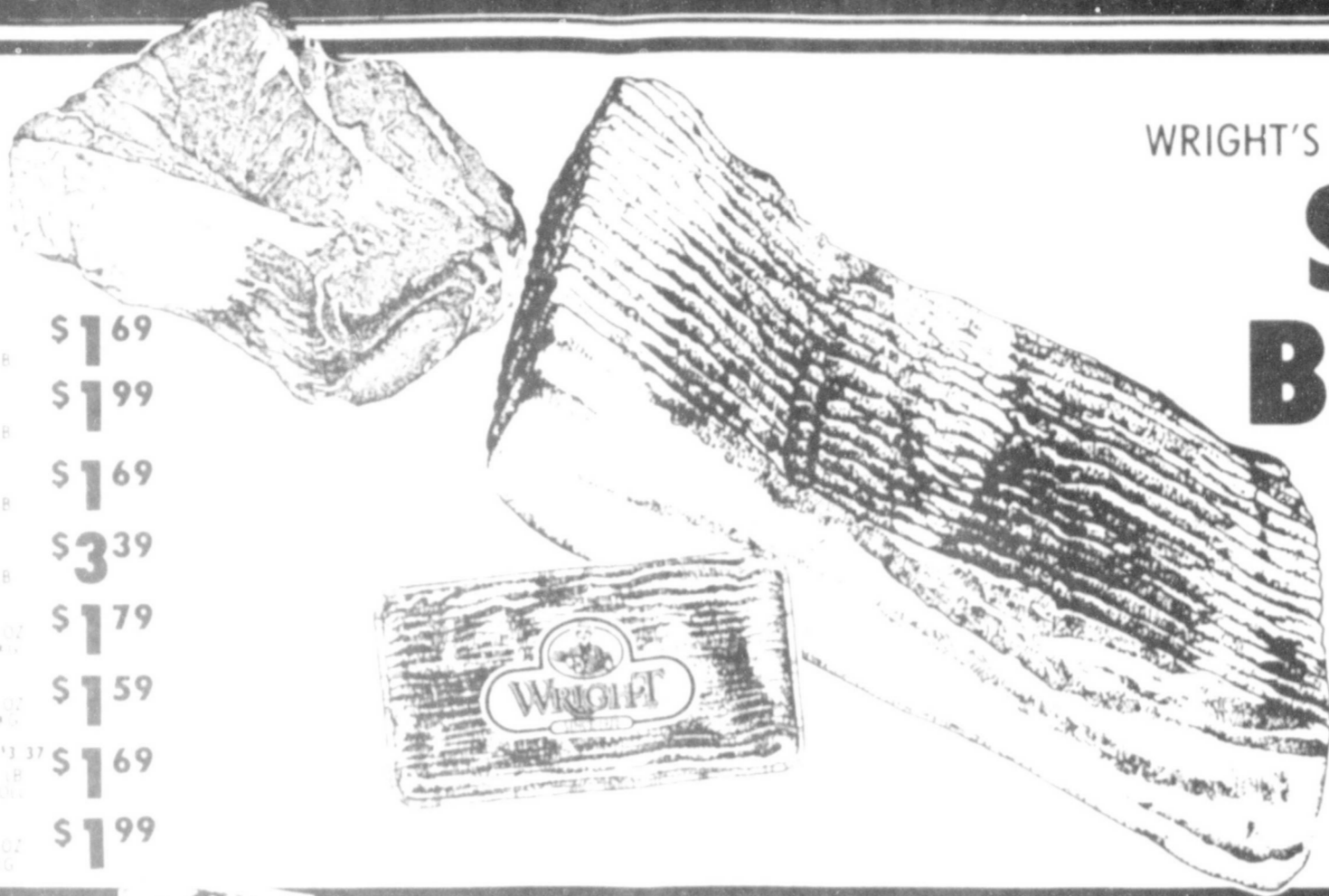

Clerks who took part in all sessions of the seminar were awarded 1.2 continuing education units (CEUs) or 12 credit hours by the office of Continuing Education at Texas A&M. The clerks are required to earn 20 hours of continuing education every two years.

Doris Lange of Fredericksburg, Gillespie County Clerk, is second vice president; and Johnny Appleman of Beaumont, district clerk in Jefferson County, is secretary-treasurer.

Serving as the general chair for the seminar was John A. Gilmartin, while the program chair was Joe M. Rothe, Extension Service specialists with the V. G. Young Institute.

2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) frozen succotash (lima beans and corn)

1/4 cup BBQ sauce

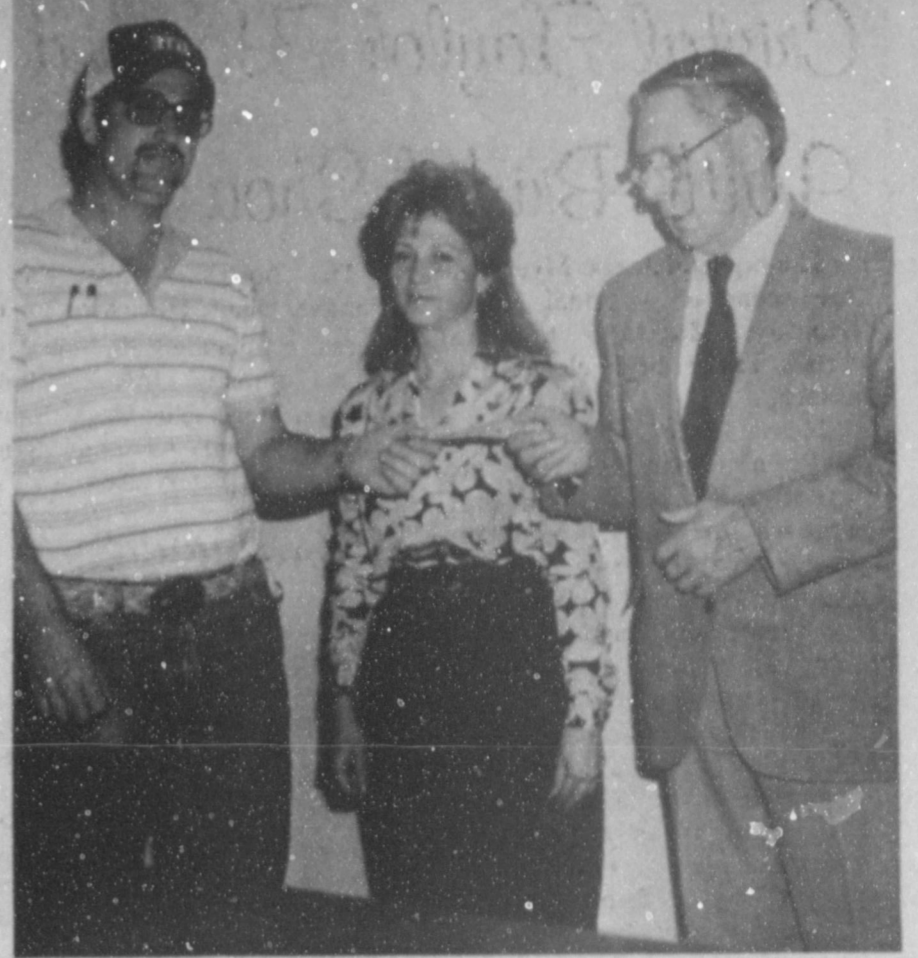

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1989.

The deadline

for applications is April 30, 1989. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.


