To Help Community

NEWSPAPER OPINIONS are voiced and expres-sed with the thought, hope, and intention of aiding the community in which that newspaper is pub-

It oftentimes would be far easier for the newspaper not to have or voice an opinion. There is chance to make readers, subscribers, and especially advertisers angry when opinions are not voiced. It is always far wiser from a monetary standpoint and a business standpoint not to get into a controversy or to remain silent on some

But we have always felt that the newspaper, which does not have an opinion and does not voice an opinion, hasn't much backbone. We have also always felt that the newspaper, which discusses those topics far away or which purchases what are known as "canned editorials" hasn't much person-

The personality of the newspaper is shown in the editorial columns. There the editor and publisher show what they are thinking along various lines.

And although it is perfectly possible now and then that some personal and selfish ideas may creep into these columns nine times out of 10 the newspaper is promoting some movement or opposing some project because they honestly and sincerely feel that this is for the best interest of the com-

And newspapers in Artesia and in other communities can render a splendid service. They can help build the communities and they can promote worthy movements, propects, and undertakings if they are willing to voice these opinions.

Newspapers are no more right every time they voice an opinion than individuals. Both people and newspapers can be wrong and yet they may even accomplish some good and promote some thinking when they voice their opinions or they publish them. In many instances the editorial is written solely with the hope and the intent of getting the people to think.

The suggestions made can be and sometimes are exaggerated soley for the purpose of making people think. They are overplayed to get the people's attention. Because even if the opinion voiced is not altogether right, it still results in some straight thinking and perhaps a better solution to the prob-

We know that this newspaper and all other newspapers are accused at times of wanting to run the city or run this or run that. We can assure everyone this is never true. Most newspapers have more than they can run now. They have no ambitions or desires to run something else. But they are hopeful and with the thought of helping their community, they can encourage the running of the business to the best interest of the greatest number and not

And opinions voiced whether they meet popular approval or not are voiced first because the paper has something to say on the subject and secondly because they are seeking to aid and help their

That is The Artesia Advocate's position and it will continue to be its position in the weeks and months ahead .- O.E.P.

A. & M. Needs Stadium

NEW MEXICO A. & M. COLLEGE needs a number of new buildings and included among those needed is a football stadium.

The state, of course, never provides this particular need of the institutions of higher learning. It is always necessary for the gridiron stadium either to be built with donations and gifts of friends of the college or former students and graduates.

More than a year ago a campaign was launched to raise funds for the construction of a memorial stadium at New Mexico A. & M. College. The campaign didn't spread out very far over the state but a total of some \$33,000 in pledges and cash was raised. There is approximately \$17,000 of this in

Now seemingly the campaign is to be revived with an effort to spread the drive out over the state and to invite all former students and graduates of the college as well as friends of the school to aid and assist in building the memorial stadium.

It is planned eventually to erect in connection with the stadium a memorial tower and a memorial room to honor former students and alumni members from A. & M. who made the supreme sacrifice in the World War.

\$30,000 in cash, issuing bonds to the extent of \$60,000 and with this \$90,000 start building the stadium. Eventually the structure will probably cost as much as \$200,000.

It is believed it will cost that much to provide the 15,000 seating capacity, which it is hoped and expected the college will need in time.

It also is believed that the providing of an adequate stadium there will result in better crowds and attendance for the Aggie games. This is expected to result in better games for the home fans.

Former graduates as well as former friends and students of A. & M. College in Artesia and North Eddy County doubtless will be invited at sometime during the next six months to assist in the construction of the new stadium at State College by making a substantial cash contribution. - O.E.P.

Upon completion of the 1-month period, each man will incur a reserve obligation to serve in the Enlisted Reserve Corps for five years or to serve 36 months in any organized unit of any reserve of any of the armed forces if offered enlistment therein. However, young men may discharge their reserve obligation by extending their enistment for a year or by re-enlisting in the Regular Army for a period which will make his total active federal service equal to 33 months or more under such terms of enlistment as are authorized by

the Army. "This authority is in addition to current Regular Army enlistment opportunities, all of which remain in effect," Sergeant Triplett said. 

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
