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Problem Of Taxpayers

THESE IS OCCASION after occasion, which develops in this nation of ours and in the various communities of the nation, when it appears that the citizens and the taxpayers will have to solve the problem despite the fact that a group of individuals has been chosen to handle these affairs.

We have seen more than one instance when an argument or a discussion prevailed between a governing body and perhaps a small group of citizens or perhaps another governing body.

The fact that the business, property, park, land, or service belonged to the citizens and the taxpayers was forgotten. And once it was forgotten then it was ignored.

Selfishness dominated the action of the individuals. They forgot that the problem was not just theirs and theirs alone. They became so engrossed and so involved they forgot others.

We recall an instance recently when such an affair developed. It got completely out of hand. On one side was constituted authority and the administrative officials. On the other side there was a group of citizens and taxpayers but they constituted only a small percentage of the property owners and the taxpayers of that community.

Their attitude, however, which was far from fair or just or reasonable, was that they were the community. They forgot there were far more taxpayers and citizens not involved and not taking an active part. And they presumed to try to force their beliefs and their ideas down the governing board's throat and down the throat of the other taxpayers. It didn't work.

It, of course, shouldn't have worked. In such events and such affairs the more level headed, fair minded, just, and reasonable taxpayers should have stepped into the picture and effected a compromise. It could have been done and it was their right and privilege to do so.

We are frequently reluctant to take positions and stands, however, which need to be taken because we are fearful of becoming involved and because we seemingly are afraid of being accused of taking part in politics.

But the fact does remain that all property of governing bodies is the property of citizens and the taxpayers. All institutions operated with taxpayers' money belong to the taxpayers and not to those directing these affairs.

When these discussions and arguments and misunderstandings between groups or between governing bodies and groups of citizens or taxpayers or organizations develop it is always the taxpayers who suffer or lose.

It is during such time that a group of taxpayers should step into the picture to assume a middle of the path and a compromise attitude to clear the way for an understanding and to eliminate the public and the taxpayers having to suffer because stubbornness and an unwillingness to meet others half way is prevailing.

Such times are the occasion when straight thinking, fair action, and honest efforts are needed in order to prevent the community from suffering when there is no occasion for this occurring.

And a few substantial, honest, sincere, and conscientious individuals can usually effect an agreement and a compromise if they will only take the trouble to interest themselves in the problem—a problem, which in the final analysis is the taxpayers' problem.—O.E.P.

Finish School First

WHEN A CRISIS DEVELOPES in our country or when there are indications that a war may develop it is a fine thing, of course, to see young men respond to the call of their country.

When our nation needs members of the armed forces it is a splendid thing for those young men to volunteer.

But it is also a fine thing when our young men complete their high school educations and better equip themselves to serve their country as well as to prepare themselves to return to college when their services are no longer needed in the armed forces.

During such days as these when a new draft law has been adopted and when it appears many youths may be drafted, there usually are many volunteering for service. Oftentimes this is out of loyalty to their country; other times it is because they feel they will have to go and they prefer to volunteer; and sometimes it is because they have been led to believe they can have or do certain things in the service.

There are those recruiting officers who are just as honest and sincere as they can be and they

do not misrepresent the service. Others more anxious to have a large number of enlistments aren't so careful in what they say in persuading young men to join the services.

And our plea to those young men who have not completed their high school education is to complete this work. Get your high school diploma and forget any idea of getting it after you enter service or after you return from service. The chances are you won't do it. The percentage of those who return to high school after serving in the army or navy is extremely small.

We recall a prominent educator once advising a group of 400 boys to continue in school. This man served in the Army in World War I and in the Navy in World War II. He told those boys that Uncle Sam would call them when he needed them and they would be able to render better service with more education.

That, of course, is true. The time you spend in the service will be a comparative small part of your lifetime. If you fail to secure that high school diploma there will be a day and a time when you'll wish you had. Get it before you enter service and you will be ready to enroll in college after you complete your hitch in the armed forces. And the easiest time to get that diploma is now—not a year or two years or three years from now.

Remember you have to have high school credits in order to enter college. Get those credits now and then serve your country and when you've completed that you can go on with your education in a college. Fail to get your high school diploma and you can't enter college until you complete that work.—O.E.P.

Never Another Like Him

WE NEVER SAW BABE RUTH and have never been a close follower of baseball, the game in which he won his fame.

He was a great man, but we do not believe his greatness lay so much in the long list of firsts and records in baseball—both as a pitcher in his earlier days and as home-run king in his later days—as in his devotion to boys and clean sport.

It is true that had he not become great in baseball, his greatness in playing the game of life squarely and fairly would never have been known to so many people. It was a sort of prerequisite.

Mr. Barker
Dear Sir:

I hear it rumored around here that the Game Protective Association is trying to get a bill or something of the kind passed to prohibit us from selling carp minnows. Is that so? If it is, they not only cut the Game department's throat, but the tackle shops,

bait dealers and a lot of other businesses. The way we see it, if the fisherman can't get bait he won't need licenses or tackle either. We bait dealers have had it rough this season anyway, on account of not being allowed to use minnow seines.

You are probably aware of the fact that as many as 5000 fishermen less or more couldn't get minnows in Hot Springs this spring. Many said they would never come back. That must be somebody's fault.

The last 17 years I have sold bait, and two-thirds of the fishermen have asked for carp minnows. The way we see it, why doesn't the Game Department prohibit the use of carp minnows in the ponds and branches that they have poisoned and give us bait dealers a chance to make a living, and furnish the fishermen with plenty of minnows?
