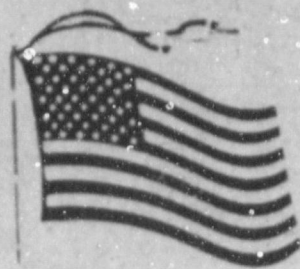

Other than Muleshoe, teams will be here from Canyon High School, River Road High School, Tulia High School, Dimmitt High School and Friona High School.

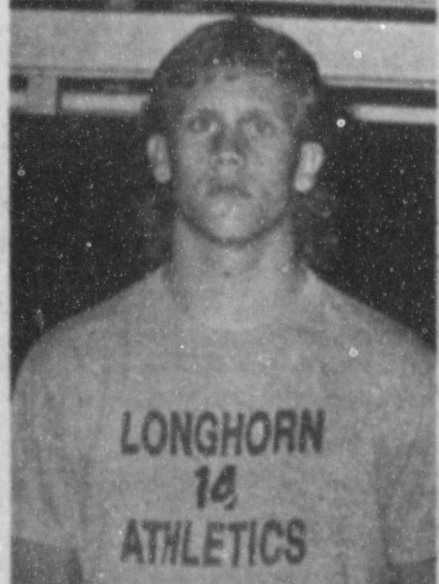

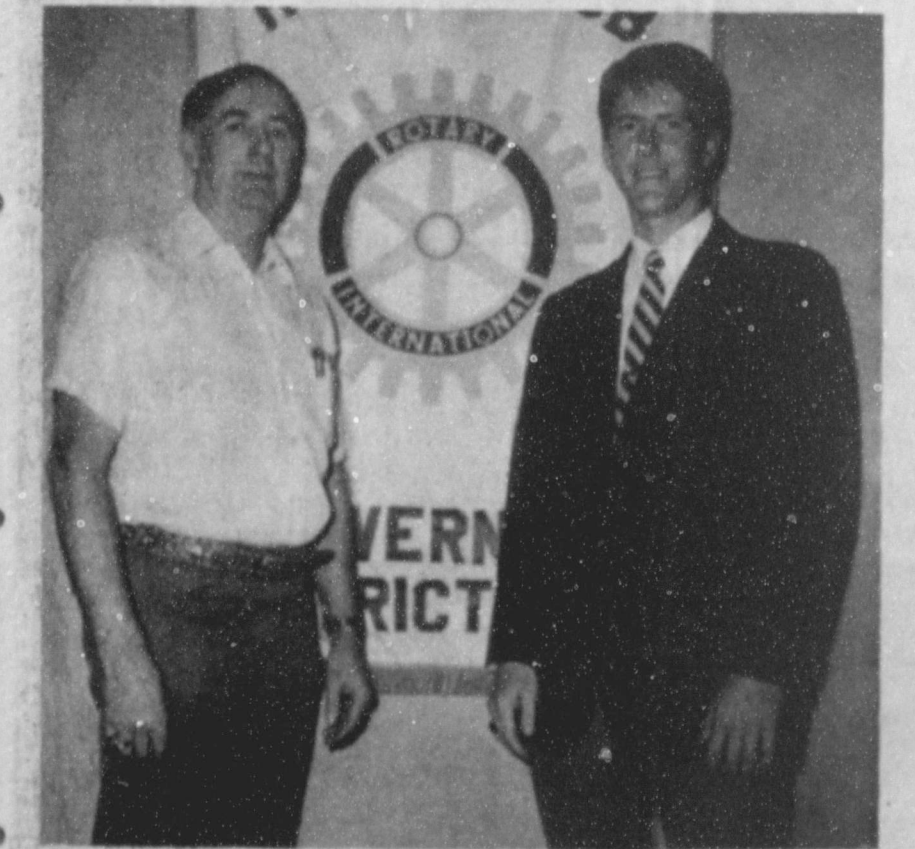

**Comptroller
Tightens Law
For Bingo**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced today that he is requiring all instant bingo cards to be sealed and clearly marked with an official stamp before he will approve the cards for use in Texas.

"This will stop any trickery with instant bingo games in Texas because customers can see at a glance whether or not the cards being used are approved," Bullock said.

Bullock is requiring that each pack of instant bingo cards be sealed or wrapped completely in a clear wrapping material.

The words imprinted on each card—Authorized by the Texas Bingo Regulation Division—must now be a larger type size.

Both changes take effect immediately, Bullock said.

The Comptroller's office must also approve all changes made to instant bingo cards, such as the design of the card or the colors of ink used.

Bullock said that his agency must reapprove all cards used in Texas at least once every two years.

"The public and the charities have a right to fair and honest games in Texas," Bullock said. "I intend to see that those rights are protected."

The Comptroller's office issues bingo licenses for charity games in Texas and is responsible for making sure the games are conducted in accordance with Texas laws.

During 1988, more than 27 million players were reported at charity bingo games in Texas.

Bingo games in Texas grossed \$465 million in 1988, Bullock said.

Farm Bureau Delegates To Meet On Policy Change

Texas Farm Bureau voting delegates will meet March 20 in Waco to decide whether to change their policy and work for an appointed or elected board rather than an elected commissioner to run the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The special called meeting will begin at 1 p.m. at the Waco Convention Center.

Resolutions coming in from county Farm Bureau special meetings call for an appointed or elected board to administer the agency, according to S.M. True, president of the 326,000-member organization.

The TDA is up for "sunset review" this year by the Legislature, and will not be up for review again for another 12 years.

Actions of TDA Commissioner Jim Hightower since the TFB convention in December have triggered a flurry of activity in the agricultural community to have him replaced.

Texas Farm Bureau policy calls for an elected commissioner of agriculture, a position that was reiterated at the organization's annual meeting in early December.

"Since our annual convention, Commissioner Hightower has taken a number of actions that have caused our members to question that policy," True said. "Some 150 county presidents, at a meeting in January, indicated overwhelmingly that they wanted TFB to hold a special delegate meeting to review the policy on the Texas Department of Agricul-

ture. The TFB Board of Directors met and voted unanimously to call the special convention for March 20."

On Dec. 27, Hightower publicly sided with the European Economic Community in its ban of U.S. beef imports over use of hormone growth promotants.

True wrote him, asking him to resign immediately.

"Instead of an advocate, we had an adversary," True recalls. "Besides, the issue was about an unfair trade barrier, and both sides knew the hormone issue was a smokescreen."

Hightower's response was to announce, in two different news conferences, that he would lead the effort to sell hormone-free beef to Europe, a scheme scoffed at by U.S. Department of Agriculture food inspection officials and leaders in the U.S. beef industry.

Then Hightower announced that he would not run against Senator Phil Gramm in 1990. He said he would instead run for re-election as agriculture commissioner, indicating that he would continue using the TDA to build a populist movement.

"The work of TDA is evidence that an unconventional, populist approach can work in the real world," Hightower said at the time.

Hightower has a long list of activities opposing commercial agriculture, True said. These included, he said, developing stringent pesticide rules without

letting growers have input, aiding a union boycott of California table grapes, and intimidating commodity groups in an effort to obtain funds for special "youth education" projects.

"Mr. Hightower has a right to any political belief," True said. "However, he should not continue to use the taxpayers' money to payroll a political-activist staff and to pay for a costly propaganda machine in furthering his own political ambitions. The real role of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to be an advocate for agriculture and regulate a number of areas to protect the consumer."

At issue, True said, is whether or not a little-known state office can remain elective and serve the best interests of the state.

"People can get to know the background of a candidate for Governor or other major offices," True said. "But, if a smooth-talking demagogue or charlatan gets elected to a lesser-known office, it is almost impossible to vote them out once they begin using the resources of the state to build their own political career."

Chronically Ill Get Rehabilitation Aid

One day four years ago, 13-year-old Johnny (not his real name) went from the normal activity of a teenager, to sitting in a wheelchair, with only the use of his hands.

Struck by a careless driver, the boy became a quadriplegic. And even though he remained mentally bright, he and his family faced the confusion of his long, complicated medical care and rehabilitation.

Then a case manager from the Texas Department of Health (TDH) entered the scene. The manager was from the TDH Bureau of Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Services (CIDC). The CIDC program assists children with certain severely handicapping medical problems.

The CIDC case manager assigned to help Johnny provide emotional support to the family and saw to it that their home was modified so Johnny could get around in it independently. In addition, through the CIDC program, the case manager arranged payment for an electric wheelchair and for most of Johnny's rehabilitation and medical expenses.

Today, Johnny transports himself from class to class at school in his electric wheelchair. He is

doing well in his studies, and in outside activities. He even has a part-time job as a disc jockey at a local radio station.

Johnny's progress is largely credited to the help offered by the CIDC program, and by the program's case management plan. Under this plan, each client is assigned a specific case manager. The manager creates an overall health program for the clients, coordinating CIDC services and other needed medical, social, nutritional, and educational services.

By assigning an individual case manager to coordinate the care for each patient, CIDC spares patients much of the frustration often associated with on-going medical care.

In 1988, the CIDC program served 16,000 clients. To be eligible for the program, a person must be younger than 21, be a resident of Texas, meet income guidelines, and have one of the

special health needs covered by CIDC services.

The CIDC program pays the medical costs for many chronic illnesses, including birth defects; bone, muscle, and joint problems; heart conditions; neurological disorders; cleft palate; cystic fibrosis; cancer; hemophilia; certain eye and ear disorders; and severe burns.

Some of the expenses paid for through CIDC include fees for physical therapy, speech therapy, transportation for the patient, 60 days or less in a hospital, and prescribed medicines, braces, and artificial limbs.


