Memorial Church at Loco Hills, of whom 29 cast votes for Briscoe and 12 for Aston.

Briscoe, who will enter public life for the first time when he assumes his place on the board, has been superintendent since 1941 of the oil interests here of R. R. Woolley, Artesia and Los Angeles oil operator. Prior to that he was connected with the Grayburg Oil Company about 11 year.

At the time the campaign was launched approximately \$30,000 in cash and pledges was raised in the drive, which was conducted in and around Las Cruces and the Mesilla Valley.

Now the campaign is being placed on a statewide basis and Aggie graduates, former Aggie students, and friends of A. & M. College and those, who may desire to assist in making a contribution to the fund, are being invited to do so.

In each town and city of the state, hopes are entertained that an Aggie stadium campaign committee can be named to assist in conducting a drive for the gifts, donations, and contributions to this In all instances, of course, stadiums cannot and

are not built by the state with state funds. These must be erected either with contributions and gifts from friends of the school or from revenues derived from the football games.

A. & M. College unfortunately hardly secures sufficient funds from its football games to carry on the football program. There are no extra revenues to construct needed facilities. It is hoped, however, if and when an adequate stadium is erected that the attendance will increase as the quality of the grid games is improved.

So it is going to be necessary if a new stadium to seat 4000 to 6000 spectators is erected, that the additional money needed can be raised. It is hoped the campaign will produce around \$200,000. In that event the stadium cannot only be built but the memorial tower with chimes and the memorial room can be provided.

A total of 120 Aggies lost their lives in the last war and some 19 are still unreported. The college seeks to honor these youths, who gave their all.

Pictures and the life stories of these boys will be placed in the memorial room to be visited by all, who visit A. & M. College.

Of the funds now on hand, approximately \$20,-000 of it is cash and the balance is in pledges. Confidence has been voiced that the greater portion of these pledges will be paid.

In that event, of course, the college will have about \$30,000 of the fund needed. The balance will have to be raised with large and small gifts by friends of the school; those, who would like to help perpetuate the memory of those youths, who lost their lives in the last war from A. & M. College, and by the former students and graduates of the college.

There are probably some in Artesia and Eddy County, who would like to make a contribution to this fund. And if they are not contacted when the special representative of the college calls, that gift could be mailed to Prof. Earl Beem, A. & M. College, State College, N. M., or to James Patton, A. & M. College, State College, N. M.—O.E.P.

Fleece From Ram Owned By Local Man Tops Show

A registered Rambouillet ram fleece owned by New Mexico A. & M. College was awarded the grand championship of the wool show at the National Western Livestock Show in Denver in January. The fleece, shorn from a 2-year-

old ram, was exactly a 12 months' growth-365 days. Shearing weight of the fleece was 221/2 pounds, and its show weight was 21½ pounds. A hand-scoured sample taken from the side of the fleece gave a shrinkage of 45.75 per cent, with a clean yield of 11.66 pounds. The
