

The Navajo Indians

THERE HAS BEEN A LOT WRITTEN and a lot said about the Navajo Indians, but there has not been a great deal done for them.

They have been a sort of football up to the present time, which has been tossed back and forth as the state government seeks to get the federal government to assume its responsibility. The federal government on the other hand has tried to pass the responsibility to the state government.

The result is absolutely nothing insofar as the Navajos are concerned.

Certainly the Indians are the responsibility of the federal government. Indians are wards of the federal government. That was the original agreement when the government took over the Indians' land and turned it over to the whites.

And the Navajo Indians are the responsibility of the federal government.

However, the fact remains they reside in New Mexico; they own their lands in our state; and as residents of our state they are our responsibility, too. The fact also remains that we desire to aid them in assuming their own responsibilities of life; we desire to see them become a part of our society; and as such then it becomes our duty and our task to aid and help them.

There are at the present time, so we are told, some 55,000 Navajo Indians. The population is increasing 1000 each year. Poverty is acute. In 1940 the average per capita income was \$81.19 (national average was \$861). Even including value of homegrown products, food consumed was only about \$1 weekly for each Indian - probably under 1200 daily calories.

The state of Louisiana requires a new registration every four years. This may cause a little trouble and inconvenience to the voters, but it also eliminates the names of those individuals from the book no longer in that state or who have died. It gives a new list of voters or a new list of the old

It purges the books of all names, which should have been removed.

Either we should provide for registration a little more often or we should at least purge the registration books of the names of those individuals, who are no longer voters in the precinct, county, or the state .- O.E.P.





severely eroded area its size in the nation. Annually it delivers only 21/2 per cent of the water that flows into Boulder Dam but 35 per cent of all the silt. Urgent Navajo neds include soil erosion prevention, water development, range and livestock improve-ments and development of irrigation.

Only 27,000 acres are now irrigable, but the proposed San Juan River and other projects would provide about 160,000 acres of irrigated farmland. After full development, the reservation should support about 35,000 persons; the others must seek employment elsewhere.

In the 1868 treaty, the U.S. guaranteed to the Navajos a teacher and classroom for each 30 children-a promise never kept. More than 80 per cent of the tribe is illiterate; about 57 per cent cannot speak English. Median schooling completed by Navajos is .9 of one year; the national average is 8.4 years. Old reservation board schools are decrepit and falling down. Closing of condemned buildings recently ousted 150 high school students -not less than 100 Navajo boys and girls are in high school.

Navajos have no coverage under state and federal social security public welfare, so they cannot obtain, aid to dependent children, old-age assist-ance or aid to needy blind. There are no institutions, no services for delinquents, crippled, deaf, blind or otherwise handicapped persons. Navajos should have the same benefits as other citizens.

Isn't it about time the two governments accept their responsibility and both step in to do all they can to aid these fine people, instead of both gov-ernments seeking to evade their responsibilities?--O.E.P.

Figure 3 shows the dynamite planted stick by stick at regular intervals so that whole sections are blown out at the same time. In this way, the earth does not fall back into a part of the ditch already dug. One of the advantages of digging ditches with dynamite is that there are no "spoil banks."






